A-M Baseball Loop Plays Familiar Financial Dirge

January 14

With seven cities reportedly ready to go, the league will meet to learn whether Globe-Miami will stay in the circuit or drop out.

A February 1 deadline for payment of \$3,000 dues will have to be extended if the league is to operate in 1956. Officials of four teams indicated that they would seek an extension of time. If an extension is not granted, they said they could not field teams.

January 15

A bleak picture of finances around the league was presented on the eve of a meeting to organize for the 1956 baseball season. Officials of the Douglas, Globe-Miami, Mexicali and Cananea clubs said they just didn't have the cash to make the \$3,000 dues payment. The deadline is February 1, and they said they would ask for an extension.

Globe-Miami, embroiled in financial difficulties dropped out of the league and the Class C circuit immediately went to work seeking an eighth member.

January 23

Tucson lose Jim Peete to San Diego. Peete, outstanding Tucson Cowboy pitcher who compiled a brilliant 24-11 record in his rookie year, will apparently go to the San Diego club of the Pacific Coast League because of an alleged verbal agreement made between the Cowboys and San Diego early in 1955.


Memo Garibay, who led Cananea to the 1955 championship was retained at a salary increase for the 1956 season, his third consecutive leadership in the club. The announcement of the signing was made by Jose Papia, president of the Cananea ball club.

January 24

Wenceslao O'Reilly Gonzalez- whose person and pitching is every bit as colorful as his monicker-will be hurling in the league again this season. The aging but able southpaw who once won 32 games in the A-M's foster father, the Southwest International league, has been re-purchased from the Mexico City Reds by Nogales according to Chuck Hollinger, executive secretary of the league.

January 28

The Tucson Cowboys will be reorganized under new ownership. Howard "Gene" Watson, Tucson businesman said he and associates have taken over ownership of the Tucson entry.

January 30

Veteran Don Jameson has been signed for his fifth consecutive season as manager of the Tucson Cowboys Baseball Team.

The league is investigating the possibility of adding a fourth Mexican team for play this summer. E.T. "Tim" Cusick, league president said that a league official is investigating the possibility of having Tijuana, Baja California entering the league.


February 4

February 6

A-M Baseball League Adds Tijuana As Eighth Member

Tijuana, Mexico will enter a team in the league this summer, President Tim Cusick announced. Tijuana replaces Globe-Miami which dropped out because of financial difficulties. The addition of Tijuana gives the A-M an even split in U.S. and Mexican teams. Cusick said he met with Tijuana officials in Yuma "They are very happy to be back in organized baseball with the Arizona-Mexico League."

to pay league dues. "Not one single club has paid its league dues yet," Cusick said. "The \$3,000 dues plus \$200 special assessment was due on February 1, but I haven't heard from any of the clubs. We owe salaries, office rent and for telephones calls. I don't like to run a baseball league like this. These clubs all have taken obligations. If they don't live up to them, I am ready to quit."

February 19

Executive Secretary Chuck Hollinger announced baseball teams are paying in their dues to league headquarters. "Several teams have paid league dues and the others should come in shortly.

February 21

Bill Capps of Dallas has been named manager of the Arizona-Mexico Baseball League. Capps, a playing manager with Corpus Christi of the Class B Gulf Coast League last season was signed by Phoenix succeeding Jerry Gardner who became manager of the Douglas entry.

February 23

The Phoenix Stars' agreement with the Baltimore Orioles paid off with seven players for the baseball club. The Stars got four rookies recommended by the Orioles: first baseman Gary Freymiller, outfielder Gilbert Gomes, second baseman Lonnie Graham and catcher Ruben Rodriguez.

February 28

Two promising youngsters, 20-year-old outfielder Angel Figueroa and George Perez, 18, a pitcher have been signed by the Hollywood Baseball Club for its Douglas club. Both rookies earned sectional honors in the Los Angeles area.

March 1

Leon Simmons, 21-year-old hopeful from Springfield, Mass., was signed on as business manager to handle the everresent financial problems of the Douglas Copper Kings.

Phoenix has threatened to withdraw from the league unless a more workables schedule can be cooked up than the one adopted. It calls for the club to make 800-mile round trups for three-game series on several occasions. General manager Oliver Talamini has called it uneconomical. A compromise is being worked out.

President Cusick said that it is up to the Phoenix ball club whether it wants to follow an official adoption of the 1956 playing schedule or quit the league. Cusick said "If they want to quit the league, that's up to them. All the clubs but Phoenix voted to adopt the schedule. Our by-laws say it takes a majority vote to adopt the schedule.

Talamini told the Associated Press in Phoenix that the sponsors of the Phoenix club will withdraw from the A-M league before playing the schedule. Talamini said, "Somebody else will have to operate the club besides us. There are too many short trips. That is too expensive for any Class C club."

March 28

Robert Foster who recently completed a schooling for baseball umpires has received a contract to become an umpire in the league playing in Class C.

April 10

The league schedule difficulty may be resolved, one way or the other, this weekend, reported Tim Cusick. "We sent a telegram several days ago to Oliver Talamini and told him that if he could draw up another schedule, subject to

April 11



A-M Loop Opening Today

April 22

For more than an hour before the scheduled opening of the season, bands, helemeted and bayonet-carrying soldiers, official dignitaries and pretty queens paraded.



The feature opener of the Arizona-Mexico League yesterday between Tucson and Cananea was put off for nearly an hour prior to the game while ceremonies, queens and flash bulbs took over the show. The two teams, Cananea at the left and Tucson, were presented to the close to 6,000 fans that began arriving at the Park at 11:00 a.m. and flowed over into the outfield for the contest.

Douglas tallied the first run of the 56 season in Hi Corbett Field when batter Chester Mitchell singled home Dick Drain in the top of the second inning. However, Tucson Cowboys hold the Copper Kings from there and went on to win, 6-1.

Third baseman Claudio Solano hit two home runs to help Cananea successfully took a 14-9 win over Tucson. Solano homered in the third inning with one man on base and in the fifth with two on. The game drew 5,850 spectators at Cananea.

The Phoenix Stars opened their 1956 season in typical fashion at Municipal Stadium-a free-hitting 13-6 victory over the Mexicali Eagles. Jim Johnson handcuffed Mexicali on only three hits. Tijuana made its debut in the league with an exciting 2-1 victory the Yuma Sun Sox that took 10 inning to accomplish. The revamped Douglas Copper Kings opened their season with a decisive 6-1 victory.

April 23

Yuma and Tijuana went into extra innings for the second game in a row, but the Sun Sox won this time, outlasting the league newcomers, 6-4, in 13 innings. The Cananea Mineros unleashed an 18-hit attack that included five home runs to trounce the Tucson Cowboys, 23-7. Third baseman Ventura Morales homered in the third inning with one on and again in the sixth with the bases empty. Nogales Yaquis scored twice in the ninth inning to down the Douglas Copper Kings, 12-11. The victory squared the series at one victory apiece.

April 24

Pitcher Doug Pohlman belted a three-run homer to help the Phoenix Stars shade the Yuma Sun Sox 7-6. Ex-collegian Jose Dominguez won his first professional pitching start with a fancy five-hitter as the Tucson Cowboys defeated the Douglas Copper Kings, 6-1.

April 25

Charlie Walker pitched a fine five-hitter and belted a three-run homer for the Phoenix Stars as they swamped the Yuma Sun Sox for the second straight night, 13-1. The Mexicali Eagles hopped into a 6-1 lead in the first inning and crushed the Tijuana Colts 12-3. The defending champion Cananea Mineros remained undefeated outslugiing the Nogales Yaquis, 16-14 and extended their win streak to four.

April 26

Nogales Sonora handed the league-leaders Cananea Mineros a 6-5 loss. Pete Ethier lined out four straight hitsm two of them doubles, to knock in three runs and boost Phoenix to a 4-2 victory against Yuma. A single by Orlando Lugo broke a ninth-inning deadlock as the Tijuana Colts shaded the Mexicali Eagles, 6-5.

April 27

Phoenix made it four straight over the Yuma Sun Sox winning a chilly game, 7-1. The victory put Phoenix in sole possession of first place after Cananea dropped its second straight.



May 6



May 8



May 9




May 13

May 14








