January 5

The Arizona-Mexico League had taken steps to make itself more attractive to the major leagues. The league decided to retain its Class C baseball classification. But, realizing the necessity of increasing the number of rookies in order to get financial backing from the majors, the league directors voted at a meeting that each team must carry atleast seven rookies in the 1958 season. Earlier talks had indicated a desire on the part of Arizona owners to form a Class D rookie league, but Mexican club owners were against the idea because they felt their fans would not watch teams without veterans. The Arizona owners wanted a rookie league because it would be their only chance to get working agreements with major league clubs.

January 7

The league is looking for a fourth team to round its 120-game schedule for the 1958 season. At a league meeting, officials said a fourth club is necessary for continued existence.

AM League In Need Of A 'Miracle'

January 9

A Tucson sports editor believes that a miracle is needed this year to keep the Arizona-Mexico baseball league alive. George McLeod of the Tucson Daily Citizen said the league has a lot of selling to do, not so much to the fans as to the major leagues. McLeod wrote that each team has to convince a major league club that the A-M circuit is the right place to send Class C players for development. And McLeod thinks chances for working agreement for all members of the league are mighty slim.

January 23

After his most dismal year attendance wise, Don Jameson, owner-general manager of Tucson's Class C baseball Cowboys, said that he would never attempt to operate in Tucson again unless: 1. He was able to obtain major league aid. 2. A group of baseball fans would back him all the way and help with promotion.

January 25

The Tucson Cowboys will start a new type of ticket sales program next week called "The Big One." Owner Don Jameson said the plan, believed to be unique in minor league baseball, calls for selling 50,000 tickets good for any game on the schedule other than opening day. The tickets will sell for 50 cents.

January 30

President Chuck Hollinger is trying to put together a strong league with members from south of the border.

Cananea, record holder of the league for attendace, hit the skids when the price of copper dropped. "The plan is now to combine Nogales and Cananea for the 1958 season," Hollinger said.

February 1

Curtis Page has been reelected president of the Douglas Copper Kings.

League Strives For Life

A-M Loop May Fold Without New Teams

TUCSON (AP)—The Arizona-Mexico Class C Baseball League may fold unless two more teams can be added this week.

February 12

The league is optimistic about landing two more Mexican cities for the 1958 baseball season. President Chuck Hollinger met with officials in Bisbee to discuss the possibilities of bringing Hermosillo and Ciudad Obregon into the league. Hollinger had authorized Curtis Paige, president of the Douglas A-M league club, to negotiate with officials in the two cities.

March 2

Directors of the league clung to a thread of hope and postponed until March 6 final decision on whether or not the class C circuit will be the

nest of the nation's minor leagues to suspend operations for lack of aid. The league decided that an attempt to go with the four existing teams-Tucson, Douglas, Mexicali and Cananea-Nogales-would not be feasible. Negotiations with Las Vegas and Hermosillo will be reopened in an attempt to pick up two more teams. Representatives were confident that some arrangement could be worked out in Yuma, leaving the loop just one team short.

March 7

Chuck Hollinger is ready to step down from the presidency of the Class C Arizona-Mexico Baseball League if his action will keep the league alive for 1958. Hollinger said he had been told that Las Vegas club officials had indicated they would join the A-M if they were given the power to name the league president. "If it will mean keeping professional baseball alive here," Hollinger declared, "I'll be happy to step down righ now."

March 29

The Central Mexican Baseball League operators have decided to discontinue operations, one of its top teams is interested in joining the loop. President Chuck Hollinger had been informed by Curtis Page of Douglas, that officials of the Juarez club are ready to accept an invitation to join the league.

March 30

Anuar Canavate, Mexican baseball spokesman, has announced the folding of the Mexican Central League. He said Juarez and Chihuahua probably will affiliate with the league.

March 31

The league welcomed back Juarez, an old compadre at a meeting in Douglas and started making plans to operate in 1958.



Juarez Returns To Arizona-Mexico League

Official word from the necessary sixth member, Chihuahua is not expected until April 1. Directors of the Class C professional baseball circuit voted unanimously to accept Juarez and at the same time delegated Pedro Beltran Reyes, Juarez general manager, and his business manager, Arnulfo Arras Nelendez, to confer with Chihuahua officials on the possibility of filling the sixth spot.

Chihuahua Enters A-M

April 4

Carlos de la Isia, official of the Cananea-Nogales entry, notified President Chuck Hollinger that Chihuahua, Mex., is definitely in the league but no official word was yet received from Chihuahua directors. De la Isla who was in Chihuahua wired Hollinger that he had talked to Miguel Sanchez, vice-president of the Mexican team, and Sanchez told him Chihuahua is definitely in.

April 14

League President Chuck Hollinger returned from a trip to El Paso and announced, "Chihuahua has come in. The A-M League will go this year." Hollinger also anounced that, except for a few revisions, the 1958 A-M schedule has been adopted and he expects to have it completed Wednesday. With the entrance of Chihuhaua into the loop, the circuit is six-teams strong.

Jorge Uribe, general manager of the Chihuahua Dorados, accepted the vacant sixth post in the circuit after the league delegates turned down his plea for a traveling subsidy in a meeting at El Paso.

April 15

The Tucson Cowboys expect to sign a working agreement with the Sacramento Solons of the Pacific Coast League. Owner Don Jameson also said "We've already got a promise of up to 16 players and a manager from Sacramento, and we'll probably work with them."

April 17

The Wranglers, a group of Tucson fans interested in promoting professional sports, launched the 1958 pre-season ticket campaign of the Tucson Cowboys.

April 18

The shortest playing schedule since the reactivation of the league in 1947 was released by President Chuck Hollinger, Play opens Thursday, May 1 and closes Sept 7. Each of the six member teams will play 120 games. The league usually has played a 140-game schedule.

Dave Casanega is the only familiar face back to Tucson. Casanega played for the Cowboys in 1955 before going

into the service. Poke owner Don Jameson said that Dave will be the only old Cowboy to return this year. All the other Cowboys will be sent in by Sacramento.

April 23

The Sacramento Solons named Harry Dunlop, a catcher manager of the Cowboys. The Solons have a working agreement with the Cowboys. Dunlop is considered a good managerial prospect and a good handler of pitchers.

May 7





May 30



June 18


Tucson turned the tables on the Douglas Copper Kings and came up with some potent hitting of their own to whip the Kings, 10-7 in a battle for first place.




June 22

June 24




