Assignment: Peer Review with AI

Step 1: Prepare Your Materials

- Have your essay draft ready (typed and complete).
- Have the assignment guidelines and rubric open for reference.
- Look back at your pre-test feedback (if applicable) to see which areas of writing you personally need to focus on.

Step 2: Write a Review Prompt

When you paste your essay into the AI, you also need to give it a clear set of instructions about what kind of feedback you want.

- Use the rubric and guidelines as a checklist.
- Focus on 2–3 areas you want the most help with.

Step 3: Save the Feedback

When the AI generates feedback:

- Copy/paste it into a Word doc, Google doc, or PDF.
- Label it clearly (e.g., "AI Peer Review Feedback for Essay 1").

Step 4: Respond to the Feedback

After reviewing what the AI gave you, write a short reflection (about 1 paragraph) that answers:

- 1. What feedback was most helpful?
- 2. What will you revise as a result?
- 3. Was there any feedback you disagreed with or chose not to follow—and why?

Step 5: Submit to the Dropbox

Upload three files:

- 1. Your essay draft
- 2. The AI feedback document
- 3. Your reflection paragraph
- Reminder: The point of this assignment is not to let AI "fix" your essay for you. It's to use AI as a review partner—to ask smart questions, clarify your thinking, and see your work in a new way. You are still the writer, and you make the final choices.

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Prompt Bank: Ideas for Questions to Ask Al

Use these prompts (or adapt them) when you paste your essay draft into ChatGPT or Claude.

Thesis and Organization

- "Is my thesis statement clear, arguable, and specific? Suggest one way to make it stronger."
- "List my main points in order. Does the structure support the thesis?"
- "Put my comparison points in a table so I can see if they match up evenly."

Evidence and Support

- "Do I use enough evidence to support each main point? Suggest where more might be needed."
- "Check if my quotes are introduced and explained clearly."
- "Does any of my evidence seem off-topic or irrelevant?"

Style, Clarity, and Flow

- "Highlight any sentences that are confusing or unclear, and suggest revisions."
- "Check whether my transitions connect my ideas smoothly."
- "Point out any sentences that sound too repetitive or wordy."

Grammar and Mechanics

- "Proofread my essay for grammar and punctuation errors, especially run-ons and comma splices."
- "Identify three common grammar mistakes I made and explain how to fix them."
- "Check my verb tense consistency throughout the essay."

Audience, Voice, and Purpose

- "Based on my writing, who do you think my audience is? Does my essay actually speak to them?"
- "Describe my voice. Is it suitable for the topic and assignment? How can I improve it?"
- "Does my tone sound consistent throughout? Point out any places where it shifts or doesn't fit."
- "Does my essay show enough critical thinking and analysis, or does it read too much like a summary?"
- "What impression of me as a writer comes through in this essay? How can I strengthen that impression?"

Reflection and Big Picture

- "Does my conclusion connect back to my thesis and leave the reader with a clear takeaway?"
- "What is the strongest part of my essay and why?"
- "What is the weakest part of my essay and how can I improve it?"
