#### **Report for the Durham District Evangelism Boards**

The Durham District has been focused on Friendship Evangelism this conference year. The district has found several ways to be initiative in ministry. The churches are reaching out into the community to help and show the people that the church loves them.

The District has feed the hungry, given out appliances, supported schools within their communities – One Church, One School with school supplies for classrooms as well as support for teachers. There have been bibles given to persons within the church that does not have their own personal bible.

There has been a focus on the senior citizens within the church and the community by cleaning homes, reading and cleaning lawns. The youth were engaged in this project, to help them learn how to give back to the community.

Several churches (*Faith, Hamlet Chapel and Staunton*) served the community through outside celebrations, where there was food and fun. Over 300 souls were saved, and the community saw the churches as places that will give back and that God is fun. *Faucet* partnered with other church to bring souls to Christ and baptize those that had a desire. It is all about soul winning! All the churches are busy with soul winning outside the four walls.

*Spencer Chapel* had a Worship service on the lawn and fed the community. *Williams Memorial* fed 10,000 for Thanksgiving. *Reid Memorial* was a station that received items for the hurricane victims in Greensboro. They assisted in many ways as they were needed. *New Horizon* gave several appliances to persons in the community that were in need. *Russell Memorial* and *St Joseph* both have food banks to help the hungry in the neighborhood.

The Durham District is about our Father's business. We are focused on showing the community our Risen Savior and show how much He loves them through our actions.

Health Fairs, Blood Pressure checks were conducted at some churches along with First responders as part of Sunday worship services. The mission of the Carolina Region Lay Ministry seeks to promote Christian and Methodist Education based on the objectives set forth by the Connectional Department of Lay Ministry.

During the 2017-2018 Conference Year the Carolina Region Lay Ministry held the 1<sup>st</sup> Planning meeting on Saturday, October 28, 2017 at the Charles L. Helton Royal Plaza in Gastonia, NC. The meeting opened with a short devotion and was conducted with a planned agenda. The workshop used to help educate us more about the lay ministry was accomplished by playing "CME Family Feud" moderated by Dr. Joseph Fox. There were three teams who answered the questions relating to church finances, support of Preachers-in-Charge, church membership, voting, and church property. The information for the workshop was taken from the CME Book of Discipline (2014). Persons present were given an opportunity to ask questions.

The District Lay Leaders were given an opportunity to share activities conducted in their respective districts.

As a means to defray travel expenses to conduct the planning and implementation of the annual dinner dance, annual conference activities and other matters of importance, conference calls were utilized.

In lieu of the yearly Lay Ministry Coat Drive held during the Winter Accounting Meeting, the Carolina Region Lay Ministry teamed up with Rev. Abner Ramos and congregation of Kingdom Life Ministries of Gastonia, NC to send a donation to Puerto Rico for victims of Hurricane Maria. Persons attending the Winter Accounting Meeting were asked to donate \$10 to the cause. A collection was taken at this meeting; however, due to inclement weather many people were not able to attend so the drive was completed with persons sending donations by mail. Rev. Ramos and his members traveled to Puerto Rico and used the donation to purchase water and other needed supplies to be distributed directly to those affected by Hurricane Maria. With the help of the Carolina Region, we were able to donate \$950.00

The Lay Ministry sponsored a Parliamentary Procedures Workshop, Conducting Effective Meetings, on Saturday, March 10<sup>th</sup> at the Charles L. Helton Royal Plaza. The workshop was conducted by Mr. Robert Miller, Certified Parliamentarian and the State and Regional Parliamentarian of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. The workshop was well received and everyone left with handouts and a better understanding on the procedures for conducting a meeting.

The Annual Carolina Region Lay Ministry Dinner Dance Scholarship fundraiser was held on April 20, 2018 at the Charles L. Helton Royal Plaza where everyone enjoyed live music, dancing, food, and fellowship. There were persons from all the districts in attendance. Again, we were able to meet our financial goals for the three scholarships and our outreach ministry.

All of the districts were active this conference year. Some of the activities held in addition to district planning and zone meetings included: Lay Ministry workshops and training; voter registration training, ongoing visitations to sick and shut-ins; Annual Connectional Lay Day Observance; and contributions to the Connectional Lay Ministry Graham-Webb-Kennedy Scholarship. All districts raised money for their district scholarships. The districts also participated in the District Planning meetings and Annual Conference meetings. The Lay Ministry took an active role in the presentations to Bishop and Mrs. Walker at the Quadrennial Celebration.

Newsletters were sent to all of the local churches giving updates on the activities of the Lay Ministry and to inform members of the deadlines for the submission of scholarship applications and the submission of names for Saints Beyond the River.

The Lay Ministry will continue to work on the following goals for the upcoming conference year:

1. To continue to seek God's guidance in all that we do.
2. How to create and use online forms to disseminate information across the region.
3. To improve unity, commitment, dedication, communication, and cooperation across the region.
4. To establish local lay councils in all of the churches and/or have the smaller churches partner with larger churches for the establishment of local lay councils.
5. To encourage all churches to observe Connectional Lay Day.
6. Have special projects to raise funds for the Regional and District Lay Scholarships.
7. Joint meetings with other boards and auxiliaries.
8. Have representation at the Local, District, Regional, and Connectional Meetings.

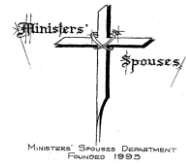

## **EDUCATION**

Since we were officially organized in 1918, one of the Council's major priorities has been that of educating our children. In keeping with that tradition, our Helena B. Cobb and P. Ann Pegues SOS (Save Our Sons) annual Scholarship funds provide scholarships and grants to our young people to help them get the best education possible. The finance for these scholarships comes from the local societies. The Region turned in \$2,465.00 for Helena B. Cobb female higher

education students and \$1,000.00 for P. Ann Pegues Save Our Sons male higher education students.

The Vilma L. Williams Scholarship Review Committee was hosted by Ms. Carolyn Stafford, Vice President and missionaries at Logon Chapel CME Church, Charlotte, NC on Saturday, July 14, 2018. An award letter will be given to recipients on BOCE night at Annual Conference. The checks will be mailed in September.

The Helena B. Cobb (Four Year) Scholarship Competition will be held on Thursday, August 2, 2018 between district contestants: Lyric Cotton (Winston-Salem/Greenville District); Brianna Webb (Durham District); D'Leijah James (Charleston-Columbia District).

**CAROLINA REGION STEWARDESS BOARD REPORT**

To serve as a Stewardess is a privilege of the highest order. It is a service of love, faith and humility. A stewardess must humble herself and become a servant, “Therefore if there is any consolation in Christ, if any comfort of love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, if any affection and mercy, fulfill my joy by being likeminded having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind. Let nothing be done through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself. Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others. Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 2:1-5). Our ministry is to serve, serve, serve; The Table of the Lord; The Table of the Poor; and The Table of the Ministry. Our overall objectives are (1) to provide on-going training to Stewardesses, Pastors, members of local congregations, (2) to be uniformed in dress and (3) to observe National Stewardess Day the first Sunday in June.

**HIGHLIGHTS OF EACH DISTRICT FOR 2017 – 2018**

**Charleston/Columbia District** – Workshops were conducted at various churches throughout the region. Liturgical calendars were distributed. Preparation for Annual Conference Communion Services is underway.

**Durham District** – The Carolina Region President facilitated a workshop at Erwin Temple CME Church, Woodleaf, NC on May 12, 2018. Basic Qualifications, Church Symbols, and Terms were presented. Activities included tracing the history of the Stewardesses both historical and theological; Identifying Who is in Charge on the Connectional, Annual, District and Local Levels; Naming the Seasons of Christian Year and supplying pictures for each season. Participants were given a quiz after the end of presentations. The District

President presided over Communion at District Conference June 1-2, 2018. All local boards were instructed to observe National Stewardess Day and send picture of the event. An overview of the Stewardess Board's Journey in the CME Church titled as "Highlights" shared with the congregation at Hamlet Chapel CME Church, Pittsboro, NC on June 3, 2018.

## **NATIONAL STEWARDESS DAY**

### **Highlights**

Today is National Stewardess Day and it is observed all over the CME Connection on the first Sunday in June each year. It is only by the grace of God that we are listed in the History of the CME Church. When those 41 men went to Jackson, Tennessee on December 16, 1870 to organize the Colored Methodist Church, there were no women in the delegation. Bishop Lakey writes that the role women played in the early church was conspicuously (clearly) absent. Lakey states in his book that it was okay for women to be merely members of the church, however, we were relegated to sit on the "women's side of the church opposite the men. Women could sing, pray, shout, raise money and cook. However, leadership was denied us!

At the 1882 General Conference, twelve years after the founding of the Colored Church, Reverend G.W. Usher of Georgia offered a resolution proposing the establishment of the office of "Stewardess" in the CME Church. The mere thought that women could hold an office produced laughter throughout the conference. What were they thinking about? The Bible is full of women holding leadership roles. Who did they think judged the people under the palm trees? Deborah did! Who did they think lead the people in praise after the crossing of the Red Sea? Miriam did! Who did they think was the first person to bring the Good News that "Jesus is risen?" Mary Magdalene did!

A similar resolution was proposed by Reverends E.J. Blaylock and J. R. Reeves at the 1886 General Conference, but guess what? It was tabled! Thanks be to God it did not end there. At the 1890 General Conference G.C. Rawlson and R.L. Shepherd thought it not robbery to offer a resolution "to create stewardesses and have them confirmed by the Quarterly Conference". Accordingly, women that serve on the Board of Stewardess are a counterpart with the men who serve on the Board of Stewards.

During the 1900s the Board of Stewardess served faithfully and sacrificially the table of the Lord, the table of the ministry, and the table of the poor. Dr. Captolia Dent Newbern's book "Preparers of the Lord's Table" was adopted as the first official Stewardess Handbook at the 1990 General Conference. At the 1994 General Conference a resolution was submitted and approved for the Board of Stewardess to be recognized on the connectional level under the Department of Lay. In December 1997 at the Connectional Lay Institute in Louisville, Kentucky, the first Connectional Stewardess President and ten Vice-Presidents were elected. The elected president was Maxine Branch (McClury), and the 7<sup>th</sup> Episcopal District vice-president was Jacqueline Spencer. Up until her death, Mrs. McClury worked diligently to bring recognition, honor and unity to our ministry. Presently Diana Duncan is our 7<sup>th</sup> Episcopal District vice-president.

Stewardesses this is your day! Twenty years ago the 1998 General Conference proclaimed the First Sunday in June National Stewardess Day. So in recognition of our long and tedious journey, the Stewardesses pause today in harmony to show our love for God, our love for one another, our love for our ministry, and our love for the CME Church. Let us rejoice and be glad, because the joy of the Lord is our Strength!

**Winston-Salem/Greenville District** – Workshops conducted at each Zone Meeting held at Israel Metropolitan CME Church, Greenville, SC; Brown Temple CME Church, Asheville, NC

and St. John CME Church, Winston-Salem, NC. The topics were Stewardess Dress, Junior Stewardess, and the Christian year. Many of the churches have elected and offered training for junior Stewardesses. Stewardesses throughout the district participated in the Zone Lenten and Advent services conducted at various churches. We attended training workshop on Basic Qualification of Stewardess at Spring Convocation, William Memorial CME Church, High Point, NC. In addition many churches honored stewardesses on National Stewardess Day. The Stewardesses continue to work with other ministries in the church on outreach projects.

### **Human Trafficking in the United States**

The United States is widely regarded as a destination country for human trafficking. Federal reports estimate that **14,500 to 17,500 victims** are trafficked into the United States annually. An unknown number of U.S. citizens and legal residents are trafficked within the country for sexual servitude and forced labor. Contrary to a common assumption, human trafficking is not just a problem in other countries. Cases of human trafficking have been reported in all 50 states, Washington D.C., and the U.S. territories. Victims of human trafficking can be children or adults, U.S. citizens or foreign nationals, male or female.

### **How to Report a Suspected Incidence of Human Trafficking?**

- In the case of an immediate emergency, call your local police department or emergency access number.

**Bread for the World:** Sr. Bishop L. L. Reddick serves as a Board Member with Bread for the World, a faith based organization that organizes, educates and advocates with its members on hunger-related issues as a way of putting their Christian faith into action.



This year, times are harder, so we must do more. Bishop James B. Walker is asking that we help to produce 20,000 vetted letters and emails to Congress. Our Congregations will join with the Women's Missionary Societies of the Seventh Episcopal District in the Offering of Letters Campaign by being responsible for the submission of Letters. The second phase of our work involves having each CME call their congress person to save programs that end hunger.

**A.C.T. Awake, Confront, and Transform:** The Bishops of the CME Church, along with leaders from all America's faith groups assembled in Washington DC on April 4, 2018 which marked the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s death. The purpose was to challenge politicians and our nation to complete the work of eradicating Racial Hatred and Violence against humanity. More than 50,000 believers gathered at the National Mall in unity for the cause.

**Education: School to Prison Pipeline,** when students misbehave, schools are becoming increasingly dependent on suspensions, expulsions, and law enforcement to punish students. Children are being arrested or removed from schools, even for minor discretions, at alarming rates around the country. African-American boys, account for an overwhelming number of school-enforced punishments, as well as the majority of arrests for school-related incidents around the country. African-American students overall are now nearly three times as likely to be suspended, and Latino students are nearly one-and-a-half times as likely to be suspended, as their white peers. The NAACP Legal Defense Fund (LDF) recognizes the devastating effects of criminalizing rather than educating children and youth, and is dedicated to reversing the pipeline. In partnership with community organizations, LDF has introduced and proposed a number of groundbreaking programs and advocacy efforts aimed at returning the emphasis to education instead of exclusion and incarceration.

**HIV/AIDS:** The College of Bishops has voted to endorse the NAACP's HIV/AIDS initiative to fight the Epidemic in the Black community. Each local congregation is

encouraged to engage in health initiatives, to include awareness and training sessions concerning HIV/AIDS.
