The Pastor's Message

Of Gods and Men is a 2010 French drama film. It is based on the true story of nine Cistercian monks living in the monastery of Tibhirine and abiding mostly in harmony with the largely Muslim population in Algeria. That all changed as extremists began a civil war in Algeria. The movie centers on the monks' decision to stay or abandon the monastery. I highly recommend it.

The movie begins by highlighting the deep connections the monks have with the community. In addition to providing the only doctor and healthcare clinic in the community, the monks participate in the local market and attend community celebrations. As attacks by the extremists against non-Muslims increase, the monks (who are French Roman Catholic) begin discussing whether to stay in the community. Initially they are divided on what to do.

The movie follows the rhythm and pattern of their discernment process. The monks meet with each other one-on-one, they spend time alone in prayer, and they meet as a group. They repeat this pattern several times until by the end of the movie they have come to an agreement.

This process of discussing with others what is important to oneself, spending time in prayer and meeting as a group is a useful process for discernment. Most organizations have a "one and done" approach to strategic planning. You come together, decide, and then move on. But I think this "get it over with" approach is short sighted. Indeed, who among us always makes accurate decisions on the spot? I certainly do not. Most of the time my first response does not represent my best thinking. It's usually an automatic reaction to a perceived threat.

The best decisions are developed over time, according to Daniel Kahneman, the winner of the Nobel Memorial Prize in Economic Sciences. We often look for quick fixes or make decisions without enough information. Our brains run on two tracks. One is a quick, automatic track that can make split decisions, often in error. The second is a slower, more thoughtful and reflective process that takes advantage of learning and observations.

ELCA Pastor Peter Steinke called our prefrontal cortex our "heavenly lobe." According to Steinke, it allows humans a level of awareness that puts us in touch with God. The heavenly lobe is essential for operating this second track of thinking that makes slower, more accurate decisions. It is one reason prayer, mediation and contemplation often lead to better decisions.

Our Strategic Planning Day is coming up on Saturday, October 12th from 1 to 5 pm. It will be held at the Highland Library in their conference room. This event is for everyone who attends First Lutheran Church. The success of this event depends on two things: the number of people who attend and the number of one-on-one conversations you can have with other members of the congregation prior to the event.

I invite you to continue the conversations with each other about what you think we need to be doing as a congregation in the next year. And, to spend time in prayer. I look forward to gathering with you on October 12th.

Guide Dog Etiquette at First Lutheran Church

Guide dogs are essential companions for people who are blind, Deafblind, or have low vision, offering independence and mobility. It's important to note that blindness exists on a spectrum, ranging from no vision to low vision, and anyone on this spectrum can benefit from a guide dog. These dogs aren't pets—they are highly trained partners in mobility, and while they are among the most skilled dogs in the world, they're still dogs. Distracting them while they're working can jeopardize both their safety and their handler's. Jacob's guide dog, Hoyt, is a yellow Labrador, and Amelia will soon receive a German shepherd named Coco. While these guide dogs are part of our community, here are some important guidelines for interacting with them:

1. Harness On, Hands Off

A guide dog in a harness means, "Please don't interact with me. I'm working." Please avoid petting, talking to, or making eye contact with the dog, as it could distract them from their important duties.

2. A Sleeping Dog is Still Working

It's perfectly normal for a guide dog to nap if the handler is sitting for an extended period. However, just because a guide dog is taking a snooze doesn't mean it's off duty. The same guidelines apply—don't interact with the dog even when it's sleeping, as it's still working.

3. Don't Offer Food or Treats

Never offer food or treats to a guide dog without the handler's permission. Guide dogs must maintain a strict routine and diet, and distractions like food can interfere with their work.

4. Just Call Them Guide Dogs

While some may refer to them as "Seeing Eye dogs," that term specifically applies to dogs trained by The Seeing Eye, a particular guide dog organization. Not all guide dogs come from this organization, so the correct and inclusive term is simply guide dog. They are not lead dogs, helper dogs, or anything else—just guide dogs.

5. Don't Use Their Names or Give Cues

While many of you have seen Hoyt, and will soon meet Coco, please avoid using their names or giving them any cues. A guide dog should only hear commands from its handler. Frequent distractions, like petting or calling their name, can lead to inappropriate behaviors, such as seeking attention or begging for food.

6. Guide Dogs Are Vital Tools

Like a wheelchair or cane, a guide dog is essential for its handler's independence. Please respect the dog's role and don't treat them like a pet.

7. Tell the Handler if the Dog Approaches You

Guide dogs are trained to remain focused, but sometimes they may approach or interact with someone unintentionally. If a guide dog approaches you by sniffing or nosing, please inform the handler right away. This could be behavior that needs correcting. Even though the dog is seeking your attention, it's important to ignore the dog and communicate directly with the handler.

8. Avoid Distracting the Dog

Don't engage in playful behavior, make loud noises, or try to get the dog's attention. Distractions can interfere with the dog's work.

9. Keep Your Pets at a Distance

If you have a pet, keep them away from the guide dog. Even friendly interactions can be distracting and interfere with the dog's ability to stay focused.

Peter began to say to him, "Look, we have left **everything** and followed you." Jesus said, "**Truly** I tell you, there is no one who has left **house** or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for my sake and for the sake of the good news who will not receive a **hundredfold** now in this age—houses, **brothers** and sisters, mothers and children, and fields, with **persecutions**—and in the age to come **eternal** life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be **first**."
