Updates from the Office Manager


- We are thrilled to have replaced the door entering into Luther Hall and are currently taking suggestions for paint colors!

Music Ministry

For most of January we are in the season after Epiphany – the climax of the Advent/Christmas season. The season after Epiphany actually extends from January 6, the day of Epiphany, to Ash Wednesday, which begins the season of Lent leading to Easter. The term epiphany means an appearance or manifestation, especially of a deity. In the Western church, Epiphany is celebrated as a commemoration of the manifestation of Christ, especially to the Magi, and also at his baptism and at the wedding feast of Cana. The ELCA lists the principal themes of the season as the revelation of Christ to all nations, Jesus' baptism in the River Jordan, Christ as the light of the world, the public ministry of Jesus (including Jesus' first miracle of turning water into wine at the wedding at Cana), growth in a Christian's baptized identity. The season's gospel readings focus on numerous events in the early life and ministry of Jesus. The hymns we sing also refer to the early life and events of Jesus. Take a look through the section of our hymnal, Evangelical Lutheran Worship, which contains hymns related to the season after Epiphany. Think how the messages of those hymns relate the stories and experiences of the early ministry of Jesus. Then look ahead and consider how these hymns prepare and inform us as they lead us into the next season of the Church Year, the season of Lent.

LOUISVILLE, KY., JANUARY, 1906.



If you look at this newsletter banner you will see it's from January of 1906 when your congregational ancestors held their annual meeting on the 17th. As your own churchmouse, I know that you are also having an annual meeting this January, so I found a few reports from 120 yrs ago that might interest you.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Our superintendent, Mr. Wm. G. Hagemann, made an encouraging report of the work of the school. The past year's work, while greatly embarrassed by the repairing of our rooms, has been one of uninterrupted activity. Not a session was omitted while the work was going on. The total cost of the repairs, amounting to \$1,300, was assumed by the school; \$422.00 of this has already been paid. The school is the child of the church and as a loving daughter desires to give its whole heart of love and effort to the mother. While paying all its current expenses and making a large payment on the repair fund, the school gave \$196 to missionary benevolences. Through its various departments it reaches every class, from the infant to the aged ones.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

Our treasurer, Mr. Carl H. Finck, made a very full and satisfactory report of both the current expenses of the past year and of the entire building fund. Every item of importance was given in detail so all may know the cost of every part of the building; the current expense of the church for 1905; and the receipts from all sources. It was especially gratifying to know how the different departments of our church had united in the effort of money raising. If any of our people do not recollect the exact financial status of the building or current expense fund, the treasurer will be glad to give the information desired.

Two items are of especial interest for 1905. The total receipts for the year from all sources for all purposes were \$14,196.18. The current expenses for the year were met and a balance of \$3.13 left in the treasury.



WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Mrs. Ida Beecher, president of this active and efficient society, made its report. In her interesting review of its work she said an old copy of The Church Visitor of 1877 gives an account of the organization of the society and the election of Mrs. Barbara Quest as its first president. She is its oldest living member and no one rejoices more in its work and welfare than she. A church like our's, organized in a missionary spirit, might be expected among its first efforts, to organize a missionary society. All along its history it has held up the missionary banner and cultivated the missionary spirit. Its work is so precious to our Saviour's heart; so helpful to those we seek to aid, and so cheering to those engaged in it, we earnestly ask every woman of our church to join us in it.


From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."
