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Message from the Pastor

Howard Thurman was an American theologian, pastor and civil rights leader. His theology and radical nonviolent views influenced and shaped the civil rights movement and its leaders, including Martin Luther King, Jr. Thurman was the deans of Rakin Chapel at Howard University and Marsh Chapel at Boston University.

In 1973 Thurman published the book, *The Mood of Christmas and Other Celebrations*. Contained in this wonderful collection is a piece called, "The Work of Christmas."

When the song of the angels is stilled, When the star in the sky is gone, When the kings and princes are home, When the shepherds are back with their flock, The work of Christmas begins:

To find the lost, To heal the broken, To feed the hungry, To rebuild the nations, To bring peace among others, To make music in the heart.

I was in Miami a few years ago, part of an annual pilgrimage I make every year, to spend time in prayer and reflection as I discern how God is calling me to lead in the coming year. This particular year, 2019, I had the good fortune of attending a concert of the St. Olaf College Choir, who happened to be in town at the same time. It was there that I was introduced to these words by Howard Thurman set to a beautiful choral piece.

I wrote to Dr. Anton Armstrong, the Director, to express my appreciation. In part, I wrote:

Thank you for a worshipful evening of music that gathered me in and included me, reminded me of my calling of compassion and care for neighbor, children and siblings of color, and sent me out into the world hopeful and filled with God's love.

My prayer for each of us is that we, too, experience the blessings of Christmas; that as we worship, we may be renewed in our commitment to embody love's service in this world. This indeed, is that Good News of Christmas: Love, Emmanuel, has come to be with us!

From the Minister of Music

December brings the season of Advent, the season of celebration anticipating Christ's coming. We are anxiously watching and waiting for the coming of the Savior. Our worship reflects this time and you may notice that the liturgy changes to reflect the seasonal emphasis of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. We add the lighting of the Advent Wreath to the liturgy, one of the most visible signs that we are in the beginning of the Christian Year. The color of the paraments and worship banners changes to blue, the color for Advent, which suggests hope. For the Advent, Christmas and Epiphany seasons we change to Liturgy Setting 9, which has an air of mystery and expectation quite appropriate for the season. The Preface and the Thanksgiving at the Table also change for Advent. As we sing familiar Advent hymns of hope and expectancy, we look forward to Christ's arrival. On our journey through this Holy season, let us remember the words of hymn #238, *People Look East*, "People look east, and sing today – Love, the Guest, is on the way".

More about Advent

Ancient peoples huddled in darkness waiting for the return of light and life to a bleak world. Today, we see Advent as a season of waiting and watching together, anticipating signs of life returning to not only a dark, dormant land, but also to our lives, waiting for the One who brings forth light and life to a broken world. During the Advent season, the sanctuary and the flowers on the alter will reflect this. A dark, dormant arrangement becomes greener and more alive each week until the light of the world returns with the birth of the Christ child. It is a gift to teach ourselves the ability to wait. Christmas is coming, it's just not here yet.

One of the best-known customs for the season is the Advent wreath. The wreath and winter candlelighting amid growing darkness strengthens some of the Advent images found in the Bible. The unbroken circle of greens is clearly as image of ever=lasing life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, or the wheel of time itself. Christians use the wreath as a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of everlasting life. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light. Sometimes the wreath is embellished with natural dried flowers or fruit. Its evergreen branches lead the household and the congregation to the evergreen Christmas tree. In many homes, the family gathers for prayers around the wreath. During the seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany, we will be celebrating communion with a different wine for the holidays. Our Communion wine will be Camelot Mead Honey Wine from Oliver Winery, located in Bloomington, Indiana. This continues our goal of supporting local wineries. Oliver Winery has been producing their Camelot Mead since 1072, but the tradition of honey wine goes back to at least 7000 BC. It is even mentioned often in the Bible. For communion, we will also continue to use naan, a kind of flatbread that resembles pita bread. So as we experience something different this winter, let us do so with the knowledge that we are following in the footsteps of our forebears in faith.
