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Message from the Pastor

I was trained in Asset Based Community Development. If you have never heard of it, you're not alone. Most of us are trained to look at people's deficiencies. Non-profits, like congregations, often focus on the deliverables they are able to bring to people who are poor. ABCD, as it is commonly referred to, focuses on people's assets, the things they already possess. Those who work on ABCD help to network people's assets together so that everyone has what they need. It is a focus on abundance rather than scarcity.

There are three basic questions people are asked. What is one thing you can teach others to do? What is one thing you would like to learn how to do? And who, besides God, is on this journey with you? That last question seems to be appropriate for Lent.

This month we begin the 40-day journey towards the cross and the resurrection on Easter. Lent has traditionally been a time of preparation. Some people give up something for Lent such as abstaining from certain food or behaviors, or they might fast. In more recent years, people have been encouraged to add something new to their lives like prayer time, meditation time, etc. I think it's okay to just let the season be however it is for you, to observe how the rhythms of worship and life influence and guide your journey over the next 40 days.

I invite you to consider the question: who is on this journey with you? How might you use this season of Lent to be more intentional in your journey with them? Perhaps you can find time to meet weekly and share a meal. Perhaps you can decide to call each other once a week as a check in. Perhaps you might consider being intentional about praying for one another or doing a book study together. Perhaps you might find other ways to express your appreciation for the relationship.

Let us find time this Lent to give thanks, not just to God, but also to the people in our lives who support us, encourage us, love us and are there for us no matter what. Thanks be to God for the blessing that they are.

If you are having a hard time thinking of someone, perhaps this is a good time to identify one person you would like to get to know better. You might invite them out or over for a meal. Learn to be more curious about their life and what they are interested in. Find ways to develop your friendship.

Whatever you decide to do for Lent, I pray that it is a time of blessings as you grow closer to God and with one another.

From the Music Minister

This year Sunday, February 11 is the last Sunday in the season after Epiphany. On this Sunday we celebrate the Transfiguration of Our Lord, and we sing the Alleluia for the last time before the beginning of Lent. Transfiguration Sunday is the feast day that celebrates one of the miracles of Jesus. Jesus is praying on a mountain with his disciples and begins to shine with bright rays of light. This miracle is unique in that it happens to Jesus himself, not to other people or things. The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, the day we will receive the sign of ashes, which is a sign of our human frailty. The word "Lent" comes from an Old English word for spring, and the purpose of repentance is the renewal of our lives just as spring renews the Earth. Our liturgy during Lent becomes simpler as we set aside our alleluias and embrace a simpler, more contemplative tone in our gatherings. The liturgy setting changes to a chant-like setting, in a free and flowing style. You will notice that the color of the paraments changes from green to purple, the color for Lent, and the chancel and altar will look different. We can also take this opportunity to change the trappings of our lives and meditate on what can make us look different as individuals. Take the opportunity to worship in a more contemplative and introspective way as the music helps you move beyond your outer self and look inward.




The Lenten season marks our walk from winter into spring and from barrenness into growth. As we come to God in all our rawness, the altar adornments reflect this - the rough, dusty ashen color of raw burlap, the dry tree branches, thorny stalks, and dry grasses. Stones represent stumbling blocks along our path through the wilderness. You are encouraged to visit the baptismal font often during this season. Here you'll find sand, dry tree branches and stones surrounding a bowl full of water, a sign of God's baptismal promise that never fades. "When you are praying, do not <u>heap</u> up empty <u>phrases</u> as the <u>gentiles</u> do, for they <u>think</u> that they will be <u>heard</u> because of their <u>many</u> words. Do not be like them, for your Father <u>knows</u> what you <u>need</u> before you ask him."
