The Pastor's Message

Happy Advent! Advent is a four-week period leading up to Christmas Day. This year it begins on Sunday, December 1st. Like the season of Lent (the six-week period before Easter), Advent is a time of preparation. We prepare again to receive the birth of the Christchild into our lives and community.

It can be difficult to capture the essence and meaning of Advent and Christmas, especially during these tense times. I hear people complain about the early marketing of Christmas before Thanksgiving. I hear people complain about the rising cost of food. I hear people talk about the challenges of getting together with their polarized family post-election. More than complaining, I think people are struggling to find hope, faith, joy and love this Christmas.

Mary, the mother of Jesus, struggled to find hope. A reading of Mary's Magnificat (Mary's Song – Luke 1:39-55) helps us infer how difficult her life was. And you can hear the hope she places in God:

He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty.

Mary identifies as weak, humble, lowly, hungry and poor. This is who God chose to give birth to Jesus. God chose to dwell among the least, the lost and the last. This is liberating love incarnate.

Jesus calls this preference for the marginalized Good News. Reading from the scroll of Isaiah, Jesus declares their mission which includes the hope Mary, his mother, proclaimed:

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me. He has sent me to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the prisoners and recovery of sight to the blind, to liberate the oppressed, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor. Luke 4:18-19 I find little hope in politicians, judges, successful businesspeople, social elites, celebrities, bishops or clergy. I find hope in the witness of God's love poured into the lives of people living on the edges of society. The poor and homeless, queer and trans folks, people of color, women, the immigrants and refugees often hear from society, "there is no room for you." Jesus, born in a back alley stable because there was no room in the inn, calls us to love one another. This love insists that no one be rejected or excluded. Living in community with those who are marginalized brings this incarnate love alive for us today.

If you are feeling hopeless this Advent and Christmas, go and be with God's people living on the edges of society. If you are lacking joy, faith or even love spend some time with those on the margins. Break bread with them, listen, learn, seek understanding, welcome them into your life and your hearts. It is in these places that God shows up and the angels proclaim: *"Glory to God in heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors."*

Luke 3: 7-18

Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; therefore every <u>**tree**</u> that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, "What, then, should we do?" In **reply** he said to them, "Whoever has two **coats** must share with anyone who has none, and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount **prescribed** for you." **Soldiers** also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not **extort** money from anyone by **threats** or false **accusation**, and be satisfied with your **wages**."

As the people were filled with **expectation** and all were **questioning** in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the **Messiah**, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water, but one who is more **powerful** than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the strap of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy **Spirit** and fire. His **winnowing** fork is in his hand to clear his **threshing** floor and to gather the wheat into his **granary**, but the chaff he will burn with **unquenchable** fire."

So with many other **<u>exhortations</u>** he proclaimed the good **<u>news</u>** to the people.
