# Legal Thresholds & Admissibility

A framework for understanding the burdens of proof and the rules governing evidence (KA-MOD-009).

#### The Ladder of Legal Certainty (Burdens of Proof)

### 1. Reasonable Suspicion

Specific, articulable facts leading to belief criminal activity is afoot. (Stop & Frisk)

#### 2. Probable Cause

Sufficient reliable facts to lead a reasonable person to believe a crime was committed. (Arrest / Search Warrants)

## 3. Preponderance (Civil)

More likely than not (greater than 50% probability).

# 4. Beyond a Reasonable Doubt (Criminal)

Highest standard; moral certainty that guilt is proven.

Each step requires a higher degree of factual support.

#### **Gatekeeping Evidence: The Admissibility Criteria**



#### 1. Relevance

The evidence must have any tendency to make a fact more or less probable than it would be without the evidence, and the fact is of consequence in determining the action.



#### 2. Competency / Foundation

The evidence must be presented by a qualified source (witness with personal knowledge, certified record keeper, qualified expert).

Chain of Custody must be proven.



#### 3. Prejudicial Balance

Relevant evidence may be excluded if its probative value is substantially outweighed by the danger of unfair prejudice, confusing the issues, or misleading the jury.

#### The Exclusionary Rule ("Fruit of the Poisonous Tree")

Evidence obtained as a direct or indirect result of a constitutional violation (e.g., an illegal search or seizure) is \*\*inadmissible\*\* in a court of law. This rule exists to deter illegal police conduct.
