# **Breaking the Bias**

A Guide to Objective Field Interviews: Recognizing and resisting the powerful pull of Confirmation Bias during suspect interactions.

### **What is Confirmation Bias?**

It's the natural human tendency to search for, interpret, favor, and recall information in a way that confirms or supports one's pre-existing beliefs or hypotheses. In investigations, it's a silent threat to objectivity.

"Once you form a theory, your imagination sees in every object only the traits which favor that theory." - Charles Darwin

## Why It's Dangerous in Interviews

Confirmation bias during an interview doesn't just skew your perception; it actively shapes the conversation, leading you away from the truth.



#### **Leading Questions**

You subconsciously phrase questions to elicit answers confirming your theory ("You were angry, weren't you?").



#### **Selective Listening**

You focus only on statements that fit your narrative and dismiss contradictory information.



#### **Premature Conclusions**

You stop probing once you hear something that confirms your initial suspicion, missing crucial details.

# The Objectivity Protocol: 3 Steps to Neutrality

Actively counter confirmation bias by implementing these structured techniques in every interview.

# 1. Identify Signs

Constantly monitor yourself:
Are you asking leading
questions? Are you interrupting
denials? Recognize your own
bias triggers.



# 2. Use Open-Ended Questions

Force yourself to ask broad, neutral questions ("Tell me what happened next," "Describe...") that allow the subject to lead the narrative.

# 3. Seek Disconfirming Evidence

Actively look for information that \*contradicts\* your working theory. Use AI feedback (like Obie Obscura) to challenge your assumptions.
