EDUCATION

Summer Fishing Forecast: North Central region

Trout fishing has been hot at Ashurst Lake, and that should continue through the early summer.

Ashurst Lake

Rating: Hot

Fishing at Ashurst will be good for large holdover trout through at least July especially following a cold spring. Anglers can catch nice-size holdover rainbow trout on lures such as Rooster Tails, Joe's Flies and small spoons. Fly anglers should be successful using woolly buggers and bead-head prince nymphs. Folks using flies and lures might also catch a nice brown trout.

For anglers using bait, try fishing worms under a bobber until the water temperatures start to warm up. PowerBait fished on the bottom should also work. Garlic PowerBait seems to out-fish unscented bait.

Cataract Lake

Rating: Poor

Fishing at Cataract will be slow until the water warms up in May.

City Reservoir

Rating: Good

City is being stocked with trout and catfish. Fishing will be good using standard trout methods.

Dead Horse Lagoons

Fishing rating: Fair to good

Largemouth bass fishing is great here. Try using plastics in the morning or evening for bass. Target the bass near the submerged vegetation, which is spread all over the lagoons. If you are using a small boat or float tube, fish the edges of the islands. Channel catfish were stocked in May and will be stocked again in June. Catfish can be easily caught on the standard catfish baits, anchovies, hot dog, mackerel, shrimp, etc. This is a great place to take kids to catch small bluegill. They are numerous, but mostly small. There is an entrance fee at Dead Horse Ranch State Park which is currently \$7 per vehicle (1-4 adults) and \$3 for an individual (walk in/bicycle) and the hours are 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Seasonal hours may apply and will be posted at the entrance.

Dogtown Lake

Rating: Good

Fishing at Dogtown is good. During the summer the trout will hit the traditional trout baits Fishing for bass and crappie will pick up as the water warms this summer.

Anglers can catch nice-size holdover rainbow trout on lures such as Rooster Tails, Joe's Flies and small spoons. Fly anglers should be successful using woolly buggers and bead-head prince nymphs. Folks using flies and lures might also catch a nice brown trout.

For folks using bait I would try fishing garlic "flavored" PowerBait in a variety of colors.

Frances Short Pond

Rating: Good

Frances Short is a great place to take young anglers to catch lots of crappie, bluegill and catfish during the summer. A small piece of worm fished under a bobber will catch the crappie and sunfish while hot dogs work for the catfish.



Goldwater Lake (from July, 2018)

Kaibab Lake

Rating: Good

Kaibab Lake is full. Kaibab has been stocked with several loads of bigger trout so folks will be catching then this summer.

Anglers can catch rainbow trout on lures such as Rooster Tails, Joe's Flies and small spoons. Fly anglers should be successful using woolly buggers and bead-head prince nymphs.

For folks using bait I would try fishing garlic "flavored" PowerBait in a variety of colors especially once the water warms up.

Verde River (throughout Verde Valley)


Rating: Fair

The summer forecast for the Verde is grim. With the warm dry winter, it is possible the National Forest closures due to extreme fire danger may occur and may make it difficult to access the river. Verde River cities like Cottonwood and Camp Verde will likely allow access.

Lower Lake Mary

Rating: Hot

Lower Lake went from being dry during the fall to about 3/4 full. Fishing will be picking up as the lake shrinks. The good news is even if you're not catching fish at the lake, they are always growing bigger. With the cooler-than-normal spring, the fish will be more active this summer. We stocked several loads of larger trout this year, so don't be surprised if you catch some bigger fish. For fly and lure anglers, try leech-pattern flies and spinners. Bait anglers will do well using worms under a bobber early and PowerBait during the day.



Walleye fishing has been good at Upper Mary.

Upper Lake Mary

Rating: Fair

Since January, the lake has went from less than 20% of capacity to full. Anglers have been catching lots of walleye all spring on worms. Expect this to continue.

Whitehorse Lake

Rating: Unknown.

We have not received reports from Whitehorse. The lake is fishable and there is only crappie, bass and bluegill. Trout will not be stocked in Whitehorse due to water quality.

Oak Creek

Rating: Good

Fly anglers and folks using lures can catch some nice-sized brown trout on Oak Creek with some big browns being caught, especially in the area around Grasshopper Point. Try woolly buggers or spinners. Look for our Oak Creek pamphlet that includes exact, G.P.S. positions of stocking locations available at regional offices.

The stockings of rainbow trout occur weekly. Areas stocked depend on accessibility to the creek and parking availability for the stocking truck. Bait anglers should drift salmon eggs or worms below a bobber with the current. Anglers drifting flies under a bobber can also catch rainbows.

Remember the reach of the creek between Call of the Canyon Crossing (West Fork parking lot) and Junipine Resort is open to catch-and-release fishing only using flies and lures with a single barbless hook.

This reach is not stocked and has some nice brown trout in it.

J.D. Dam

Rating: Fair

JD is full and was restocked last fall and this spring with tiger trout. Remember regulations on J.D are flies and lures only with single barbless hooks all fish must be immediately released. This lake is managed as a catch-and-release fishery.

You can't catch if your line is not in the water. Get out and enjoy.
