During the month of July the Greenvale Garden Club took a trip to Monticello in Charlottesville. The members arrived several hours before their guided tour and explored the gardens and historic displays. A favorite area was the vegetable garden as seen below.



The guided tour started in the back of the house. Our guide was an amazing storyteller who made history come to life, while imparting important facts about the property. She had extensive knowledge about Thomas Jefferson's journals and his vision for the property, even plans that were never completed. He kept detailed records of his plantings, and the care they received. He was always willing to experiment with plants that grew outside of his zone, regardless of previous outcomes. The tour ended at the vegetable garden, where we had an opportunity to view some unique plantings consistent with what would be planted during Thomas Jefferson's time.
