Glen Burnie Garden Club members have been busy this past spring and early summer! Spring Cleanup is always a task on the agenda and there have been several

small and two larger projects that members have taken on and accomplished.

Early in the spring, members led by Janet Bordwine gathered to expand the Butterfly Garden behind historic Abrams Delight and not only cleaned and expanded the bed, they donated different plants from their own gardens to enhance the garden and increase its appeal to the Monarch Butterfly, with newly added Butterfly Weed and varieties of Milkweed and Joe Pye Weed.



Next on the agenda, also led by Janet, was to clean up and mulch the beds outside of the main post office in Winchester, a focal point at a major intersection in town.



Weeding and pruning and general sprucing up was followed by mulching to keep the weeds down and dress up the beds. Janet worked with members Tricia Boyd, Lucinda Cullers and Deidra Dain, and also coordinated with Justin Hall at the town office to get the mulch delivered. Justin is thrilled with the work our faithful members have accomplished there!

Our annual Marigold Project, working with ele-

mentary school children in Winchester, was cancelled again this year because of Covid restrictions. Not to be discouraged, members Marsha Barley and Carolyn Frye worked together with the teachers at Quarles Elementary School to get the children involved in this worthwhile project. 

The Rappahannock County Garden Club used our lovely county park for many of our fall meetings outdoors. This Park was sorely neglected and totally overgrown with invasives until one of our members, with others in the community, got involved and helped it

become a 501(3)(c) non-profit organization. This volunteer group cleared out many of the invasives, renewed the tennis court, planted pollinator gardens, and made walking paths down to the river. We are so lucky to have this county asset!

We continued to meet on Zoom in **January and March** with a local author, Susan Sharpe, commenting on her book on Rappahannock County called, The Nature of the Place and Christine Schmidt, arborist at Blandy Experimental Farm,

talking to us about herbaceous plants.



In **May** we were back at the Park for three mini-presentations; about our local mentoring program, truffle farming in the county and a presentation on Backyard Parks. **June** brought 22 members to Blandy Experimental Farm for a wonderful two hour tour of the Native Garden

and the lovely meadow gardens.



In May our club also partnered with a local non-profit <u>Rapp at Home</u> to make small floral arrangements for delivery to area seniors for Mother's Day.

Meanwhile, we continued our program of "Rappahannock in Bloom" with our partners, Friends of the Rappahannock (FOR) and gave

away thousands of free trees to citizens of our county. This program started in 2019 with a voluntary effort of our Garden Club to plant flowering cherry, dogwoods and redbuds in the town of Washington and Sperryville, Virginia - free of charge due to a local benefactor. We even engaged our local school children in this effort!





The STEAM Coordinator (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math) worked with classes (K -5th) to teach and discuss the importance of trees -- with a poster contest as the final project.


Our Club was so pleased to recognize the great art of students from our local elementary school, as they showed us how they interpret the very important concept of "Why do we need trees?".



CEDAR RUN GARDEN CLUB CELEBRATES 70 YEARS OF SERVICE

The Cedar Run Garden Club was founded on January 27, 1950 and Federated on May 14, 1951. The 70th Anniversary was celebrated with a Luncheon at the Black Bear Bistro in Warrenton on Friday May 21, 2021. This has been over 70 years of learning for the members and the giving of Community Service for Warrenton. Cedar Run Garden Club has 22 members and currently meets in the American Legion Hall, when not out and about with community projects, field trips, working with the Boys and Girls Club and senior citizens.

Over the years we have met in member's homes, the Lutheran Church on Dumfries Road, St. Johns Church, the Fauquier Springs Country Club, the Warrenton Visitors Center, the American Legion Hall and others.

Many years ago, CRGC adopted a highway (Route 674), and were presented with a sign from the Department of Highways. We have sponsored yearly Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl Poster Contests. In years past, Recycling was a huge project. The Fauquier Library garden was completely renovated and planted by CRGC and has been maintained since the 1980's a

project of over 40 years duration. Landscape architect Meade Palmer chose a Yellow Wood tree to plant in the garden in 1996 where it exists today 25 years later. The Library Garden is an oasis in the Towne of Warrenton.

Members learn about plant varieties and gardening, have flower shows and exhibit designs and horticulture from our gardens. Members also create flower designs and learn about the many types of designs at our meetings. The Club has visited the National Arboretum, Hillwood, Ladew, and Meadowlark Gardens, Longwood, Gardens, the White House and others.



There have had many speakers, designers and scientists who presented programs. We have sponsored home and garden tours in the past. The Club has worked with students from Fauquier High School in planting a garden and cleaned up and pruned plants in the courtyard at Bealeton Elementary School. Cedar Run also award annual college scholarships to students from local high schools majoring in horticulture related programs. Proudly Cedar Run has presented Warrenton with two Blue Star Memorials in honor of our Armed Forces. Record books and photos going all the way back to 1950 have been located and have given us insights into CRGC's accomplishments over the years. Our Club has a long and proud history of service to our community.



April Club members brought miniature designs to our April meeting. We also had two


recruits join as guests of prospective members, Peggy Walk and Tena Markosky.




the Fall if it hasn't been established and shows signs of promise. Ah, the ups and downs of gardening.

the year, and for the June meeting Coni King presented a underwater floral arrangement demonstration. Here are the group's designs.



Glasgow Garden Club Park Renovation Project Nears Completion

Since October 9, 2020 Glasgow Garden Club has steadily worked to complete a three phase renovation project at Centennial Park in the town of Glasgow! The club, with a request from the town council, designed the landscape plan and with the town's approval divided the work into three phases beginning in October 2020 and completion being in early spring through June 2021. A massive amount of plant material has been secured and planted. The flag pole has been centered in the 100 foot by 150 foot space. A brick walkway using salvaged brick and installed by club members, lends a focal point from the entrance to the park, encompassing the flag and its surround to the historical Padget memorial marker in the back of the space. The huge borders on either side will serve as an educational tool since they are planted with a wide variety of texture, color and seasonal interest. There are also concrete pieces and a fountain to further peak the visitors interest. The design was to surround the area and that would create a screen as plants mature. A shade garden was established in a low shaded area in the back of the space. It continues to be a work in progress as club members contribute plant material for it. Benches and picnic tables finish off the project for the Glasgow community to use and enjoy. See next page for Glasgow news:

On July 20, 2021, the Greenvale Garden Club visited The Farm at Willow Run, located in Harrisonburg, Virginia. This farm is a nonprofit organization owned and operated by Virginia Mennonite Retirement Community. The farm provides produce for multiple locations across VMRC's campus including the main dining room and cafe, as well as a Community Supported Agriculture Program (CSA). The club had opportunity to meet one the residents who volunteers on the farm, along with several staff members. They also toured the High Tunnel Hoop Houses where produce is grown year-round, watched

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the operation of a root crop barrel washer, observed a solar power system that provides the majority of the electric power for farm operations, toured a hilltop garden, and visited the greenhouse where seeds are sown. Staff shared some of the daily operations with the club, answered numerous questions and provided a sample of produce and flowers. All the while, a staff member provided light musical ambience with his fiddle. The farm provides 36,000 pounds of produce a year with weekly surplus deliveries to Patchwork Food Pantry. After the tour,

the club met at A Bowl of Good for lunch, socializing, and announcements of future events.
