Deadline for submitting applications: Follow District (Dec. 1 deadline to District Awards Chairman) and State guidelines with January 25th as the deadline to be received from the state to the Region Awards Chairman. [Note: There is a new application form to be used for all Awards this year. Check out the VFGC website.


VFGC REPORTS

Shenandoah Clubs awarded Honors by the National Garden Club



Congratulations to our Shenandoah District and to the three Clubs who distinguished themselves by earning top awards honors from the National Garden Clubs. The NGC does not offer Blue, Red or yellow ribbons, rather they offer certificates:

First Place Certificate or Certificate of Merit for Overall Award Winners, regardless of club size

Certificate of Commendation by category size/type for Runners-Up, meaning best in their size group

The Shenandoah District earned the top NGC award, the Tommy Donnan Certificate of Merit, for our District Newsletter, "Shenandoah Sharings", a newsletter with over 24 pages. This newsletter previously achieved this top level for their 2018 publications. Congratulations to editor Val Story and the many clubs who submitted articles.

The Lake of the Woods Garden Club led by VFGC Penny Pines Chairman Joy Poole was the Overall Winner, earning the Hazel Johnson Award for "Environmental Concerns and Conservation". Joy's efforts in promoting the NGC Penny Pines program have had impressive results. Each donation of \$68 plants tree seedlings in an area devastated by natural disasters. The Shenandoah district, clubs and individuals sponsored 20 sites in 2020 alone.

The Madison Garden Club tied with the Westchester Garden Club of the Blue Ridge District for the Tommy Donnan Certificate of Merit for their newsletter, "MGC Garden Scoop". This is the Overall NGC Winner, regardless of club size. Madison has been recognized at District, State, and Regional levels every year going back to 2014. This is their third time earning the top NGC award.

The Glen Burnie Garden Club of Winchester earned the Certificate of Merit for their yearbook in the category of clubs with 20 – 29 members. Considering the point score sheet for yearbooks is two pages of detailed requirements, this is quite an achievement!

And thank you to all the clubs in our district who participated in the awards program and distinguished themselves. The State and Regional awards were listed in the summer issue of the Old Dominion Gardener and can also be found on the VFGC web site under awards. TREX Film Recycling Challenge

What an opportunity for your club to improve our environment and, at the same time, potentially receive a TREX garden bench for your efforts. The Virginia Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. was welcomed to the **TREX Film Recycling Challenge**. This is a goal of Shenandoah District President, too.

However, the program is structured so that <u>each individual</u> club will need to register with **TREX**. This is so that a club can manage and establish their own recycling program that will make them eligible for a **TREX** bench. You will receive your own username and password so you can access the TrexPro portal. It is a Challenge/ Collection time for a six-month period. During this time, you must collect the plastics, deliver to recycling locations and register your collections.

Bylaws change

Bylaws Update to Be Voted in October

Lessons from 2020 include the need to be prepared for the unexpected, such as the need to conduct meetings electronically. Therefore, Shenandoah District bylaws need to include that provision. At the Fall District meeting, we will vote to add the following to our bylaws, bringing them into compliance with similar changes being made to VFGC, SAR and NGC bylaws.

ARTICLE VI – MEETINGS

SECTION 4 – Electronic Meetings

Meetings of the Board of Directors, all Committees and the Shenandoah District membership may be conducted by telephone and/or through use of internet meeting services designated by the president or the chairman calling the meeting.

Should the Executive Committee deem a mailed ballot to be necessary, the ballot will be emailed to board members and club delegates prior to the scheduled electronic meeting. Board members and club delegates must print and send the ballot to the Shenandoah Director Secretary using postal mail, by the date specified. Club delegates must be determined prior to the required vote. Each Club will be allowed three votes.

These electronic meetings shall be subject to all rules adopted by the Board or by Shenandoah District, which may include any reasonable limitations on, and requirements for members' participation. Any such rules adopted by the Board shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority but may not otherwise conflict with or alter any rule or decision of the Shenandoah District. An anonymous vote conducted through the designated internet meeting service shall be deemed a ballot vote, fulfilling any requirement in the bylaws or rules that a vote be conducted by ballot.

Rationale: To authorize that meetings of the Executive Board, Board of Directors, all Committees, and Shenandoah District members may be conducted by telephone alone, by telephone in conjunction with internet services, or by internet services alone. (Note: this does not authorize members who are not physically present at an "in person" meeting to participate by telephone.)

Shenandoah District offers a \$1000 scholarship to a rising 2nd year student at a local Virginia Community College. The Shenandoah District Scholarship is for Community Colleges with rising second year applicants studying a horticulture or environmental related subject. It is funded by donations from individuals and clubs.

As your District Scholarship Chairman, my committee includes Val Story and Mary Haught. This year our district has not had in person meetings, so never had the opportunity to meet our most recent winner, Felicity Zimmerman from 2020.

The committee members reached out to the local community colleges and at the very last moment, an applicant emailed in a fine application:

Alexander Burton of Palmyra is a rising second year student at Dabney Lancaster Community College in Clifton Forge. He is majoring in Forest Management Technology with a GPA of 4.0 and planning to graduate in June of 2022. He graduated from UNC in 2015 with a BS in New Media, worked for a while in Los Angeles in UCLA's Emergency room only to return home and chose an entirely new direction – Forestry. His goal is to work for the National Park Service in Public Education.

The District Boards has approved Alexander Burton to receive the Shenandoah District Community College Scholarship of \$1,000. After the check is sent to the college this summer, we will have \$261.50 in the scholarship fund. Thank everyone for their generous contributions.

Birds and Butterflies

As garden club members, we need to foster our love for plants to those we meet. Whether you are fortunate to have expansive gardens or just have a pot of flowers on your deck or patio, we can all be good stewards of the earth. An important part of gardening is to attract pollinators. Butterflies add to the overall appeal of a garden landscape. They are like moving artwork.

I have a variety of flowers in my gardens that attract butterflies, but two perennials that have performed well this year are hyssop and garden phlox. Hyssop is an ancient plant that is mentioned in the



bible; this herb was used to treat leprosy and chest ailments. There are many different varieties of hyssop but I particularly like anise hyssop. The leaves give off a pungent liquorish scent. I planted one in my herb garden this year and it has reached a height of over four feet. It has lovely purple spires and the bees and butterflies flock to it. In the fall it will turn brown, cut it back to about 6 inches. It requires almost no care and little water. It will return in the spring only to become a beautiful specimen again.

The second perennial I would recommend is old-fashioned garden phlox. This plant grows to about 4 feet and has luscious pink blooms. There also a white variety. The deer love it, so it does best in a protected spot. I planted mine on the outside of my fenced in vegetable garden several

years ago and it got eaten every summer. However, the

phlox creeped under the fence and now is a beautiful back drop to my tomato plants. This year I have seen swallowtail butterflies, hummingbird moths and many varieties of bees hovering over the blooms. These plants require little care and bloom all summer. They can also be cut and brought inside for arrangements. They die down in the winter; it is best to cut back the brown stalks for a sightlier garden.

I have also decided on the arboriculture/horticulture concentration in the Forest Management Technology program. That side of forestry has piqued my interest a bit more than the traditional forestry pathway and as a plus, will allow me to more directly affect VFGC's particular interests in community forestry and gardening.

I hope you and all the members of the Shenandoah District of Garden Clubs are doing well and I very much look forward to meeting you all!

A fellow colleague of mine, Yulita Ellis, a Nelson County GC member, recently designed and constructed a pollinator/ sensory garden for the newly expanded Nelson Memorial Library in Lovingston.

Excerpts from the Grow Nelson Library Facebook page: While still in need of some finishing touches, Nelson Memorial Library has mostly completed work on its new pollinator-friendly and sensory garden that incorporates a recently installed memorial walkway, which has been a





large fundraising project for the organization. Branch specialist Yulita Ellis said the garden will not only have plants that attract local pollinators but will feature different plants that relate to the five senses for children to explore. The space also has a "bee condo" and two cedar

benches built by Gavin Miller, a Nelson resident who is soon to be an Eagle Scout. With a goal of selling 200 engraved bricks, Ellis said so far the library has managed to sell more than 300 with another order coming with dozens more customized bricks. Ellis finished installing the bricks currently on hand around early May after starting in March. Ellis said she hopes the new space can be a peaceful place for people to sit and enjoy nature.

Organic Gardening Save the Roses!!

Caution: This article contains materiel that may not be suitable for all audiences. R-rated for violence, profanity and sexual content

Does the title of this report sound benign or more like a call to arms? Answer – the latter; this summer I declared war on Japanese beetles.

It is early August and I am still engaged in an all-out assault on nature's most tenacious predator. They arrive like a swarm, rising from the ground after a long winter's rest to devour almost everything in sight. In my garden they have zeroed in on my roses, eating leaves, blooms and even buds. Since I will not use pesticides, I am left with only one alternative – hand to hand combat.



Each morning I venture out and hunt them down on my bushes. There

they are, copulating in clusters after a hard night of lustful mating. I've found that it is best to hunt in the early morning while they are still asleep and drunk after a night of debauchery. You can grab a handful at a time. Show no mercy – squash them with your fingers or pinch off their little heads if you have good nails. Let their little bodies return to the soil where they will serve as fertilizer instead of laying eggs for next year's invasion.

I thought this tactic to be brutal and probably disgusting to gentle gardeners until I recently read the on-line newsletter from Meadows Farms Nursery. Their resident expert advised exactly the same measure for ridding your garden of these invaders. He touted this approach over organic spraying, drowning or setting out the beetle traps. Amen to the traps. I tried them one year and boy do they work. I attracted every beetle within a mile radius and could not purchase and dispose of the foul smelling bags quicker than they would fill up. Trust me; there is no worse odor than bags full of thousands of dead beetles rotting in the hot summer sun.

Another advantage, the biggest of all, this method has been proven over time to completely rid your garden of beetles. Fewer and fewer impregnated females and eggs go into the ground to hatch next spring. They actually turn into larvae in the ground. We've all seen the little white grubs with tiny orange heads. Squash them at once. One less to emerge and ravage your plants.

And have you noticed how no other creature will eat the damn things? Birds steer clear. I had free range chickens (who eat just about everything) that would not touch them. I hand fed them a couple and, trusting me, they took a bite only to spit them out! I could not fool them a second time.
