Call to Order

President Barbara Mahnke called the meeting to order at 10 am with 58 people in attendance including one visitor, Ruth Keeslar's friend Doris. Barbara explained that since our speaker today, Lorraine Covington, will be one of the judges for our October 2018 Quilt Show, Barbara asked that members not exhibit any items they plan to enter in the Quilt Show.

Approval of Minutes

- Lynda Benfield relayed greetings from Diana Weber who is enjoying sunshine and warm weather in Puerto Rico. Lynda is also celebrating her grandson's engagement.
- Peggy Poe's mother-in-law died February 27th; she had recently enjoyed her 100th birthday celebration.
- Peggy Bowman's husband will begin chemo treatments on Monday, March 12.

Business

Janice Setzler attended a recent meeting of the Hickory City Council during which a staffer told the council about all the quilts of valor that were being presented to veterans residing in City of Hickory, an effort helped by the grant the city has given to CVQG.

Gigi Miller discussed the upcoming Grace Errea workshop on heat set appliqué. Guild members have first opportunity to enroll in the class; if any spots are left, they will be made available to non-members.

Debbie Rubin reported that 10 people are currently signed up for the spring quilt retreat. To keep the price at \$221 per person, we need 2 more people. Participants can make deposit of half the fee in checks payable to CVQG.

We have previously discussed having the Children's Advocacy Center present their Darkness Into Light program to guild members. This is a 2-hour program and is a free presentation. It has been now scheduled for Thursday, April 19th at 10 am and at 6 pm. Flyer will be sent shortly to get number of attendees.

A one-week summer camp about beginning sewing/quilting will be offered by CVQG at Hickory Day School during the week of July 23-July 27. Hours will be 8 am-11:30 am. We are asking for no more than 12 students.

We now have a second vice-president for the morning group. Chris Appenzeller has agreed to be a co-vice-president with Mary Bucy and we are grateful to both of them!

Libby Sigmon is hard at work on her program for the morning meeting in May. She needs photos of people's sewing rooms and she handed out program guidelines.

Remember that March 17 is Mission day.

There is an urgent need for preemie quilts. Mary Long, who is our liaison on this with Frye Regional Medical Center, asks members to help on this vital service project.

We have taken care of the next step in preparations for the judging of quilts to be entered in our show by both selecting our judging team and making several decisions to correct a few procedural things with regard to judging days. As always, our decisions were based upon the standards and criteria specified for the various roles of team members, suggestions from our judges, and time constraints on judging days.

We know that enough people need to be involved on judging days to maintain an ongoing knowledge from show to show about how judging takes place. For this reason we have attempted to involve some past judging team members as well as some new ones, rather than limiting involvement to only set people.

As before, there will be specific training for team members to help them understand the layout of the judging floor, the procedure, their specific roles, and the confidentiality level expected.

Judging days are scheduled for Friday and Saturday, October 5 and 6.

Peggy Poe is collecting antique quilts for the bed turn. Quilts that were loaned to us for the bed turn at our 2015 show are welcome for the 2018 show.

Bags for scrap fabric are available.

Connie Bumgarner and Dianne Black are cochairing Admissions. Connie read her original poem about the need for volunteer participation in a successful quilt show. Next came Lynda Benfield, Libby Sigmon and Kay Dwyer as three cheerleaders stepping out of retirement to emphasize the work and fun ahead of us. Words fail...but several members stood up to record the action on their cell phones so there could be evidence on YouTube and/or Facebook.

Libby Sigmon said we want 300 quilts for the show. Based on our current membership, this works out to 2 or 3 quilts per member. This show is the Olympics of quilting--go for it!

Her presentation was titled "How to Complete to Compete." She had multiple stories about entering a quilt to be judged:

- Fill out the entry form correctly. Yes, you're probably doing this at the last hour and you're tired but, if you mistakenly enter your beautiful appliqué quilt in the "pieced quilt" category, the judge cannot correct the entry form and cannot award any prize to the quilt.
- 2. It is okay to wash a quilt before entering it-you don't want ink marks, smudges or stains to be on it. Be sure to remove pet hair and dust and stray threads.
- Good sources include Mary Sorenson on Needle Turn Appliqué and Harriet Hargraves on Heirloom Machine Appliqué.
- 4. It can be hard to understand how judges make decisions. One of her friends entered the same quilt in 5 professionally-judged national quilt shows one year and the outcomes ranged from winning nothing up to winning Best of Show.
- 5. Don't be afraid to enter. Having your quilt judged gives you knowledge of what you did well and what you can do better. Quilting is about progress and pleasure, not perfection.

Making a Basic Needle Book

By Pat Carson

- 1. Cut a strip of cotton fabric 4 ½ to 5 inches wide WOF
- 2. Cut a strip of flannel the same width and smooth it onto the back side of the cotton strip.
- 3. To make the needle book cover, serge these 2 layers of fabric together by serging along both of the long sides of the layered strips shaving away a minimum of fabric.
- 4. (If you are not using a serger attach the two layers together by sewing a quarter inch seam along the long sides; to prevent raveling, pink the edges)
- 5. Slice the layered strip into 6 inch sections and serge the unfinished edges. (Pink the edges if you are not using a serger.)
- 6. To make the "pages" of the needle book cut strips of flannel WOF approximately ¼ inch smaller than the strips forming the cover. Cut the flannel strip into pieces ¼ inch shorter than the cover length. Pink all edges of the flannel pages.
- 7. To mark the stitching line that will fasten the pages to the cover, fold each cover with outside layers facing each other and steam with the iron. This will form a crease to stitch through and will make it easy to attach the cover and the pages.

8. Place 2 layers of flannel on top of the flannel side (inside) of the book (check that they are even from edge to edge) then carefully turn the layers over to the cover side and stitch with a medium stitch along the creased line attaching all layers. This should now be a four-page needle book.

Options Use color flannel for the pages; the solid colors, heavier weight flannels go on sale regularly at JoAnn Fabrics so it is very inexpensive to add body to the project.

MINUTES PM MEETING MARCH 8, 2018

Call to Order

Vice-President Gigi Miller called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm. There were 31 members present, including new member Cathy Starnes who joined tonight.

Program Intro

CVQG cheerleaders Libby Sigmon, Lynda Benfield and Kay Dwyer encouraged all members to Get Busy and Sew, Sew, Sew! for the upcoming Quilt Show in October, which is now only 31 weeks off. There were 269 quilt entries in the previous quilt show in 2015, and Libby hopes for 300 entries this year. There are two types of shows, judged and exhibition, and the two CVQG judges, Lorraine Covington and Lisa Alley, were chosen based on their philosophy and appreciation of quilting.

All quilt entries will be collected on Friday, September 28 and Saturday, September 29 (morning only), with the judging held on October 5 & 6.

Libby Sigmon introduced Lorraine Covington, from Clemmons, NC. She has been an avid quilter for 45 years, and is one of our two 2018 Quilt Show judges. Lorraine is a teacher and a NQA Certified Judge, and has served as judge for numerous shows across the country.

Program

Lorraine presented the program "How to Complete to Compete." She shared a sample judging form, which uses a scale ranging from "Excellent" to "Needs Improvement." She explained the judged components in detail, including: Visual Impact, Design, Colors & Fabrics; Top Construction (Piecing, Appliqué, Other Techniques); Borders & Sashing; Quilting Design; Quilting Technique; Finishing Techniques; and, Judges' Comments. They typically have 3-minutes to judge each quilt, and there is a lot to consider. In the "Comments" portion, she tries to make a few positive comments, along with 2-3 comments on how to improve or fix a concern next time. A judging form is completed for each quilt show entry, and signed by the judges.

Lorraine encouraged members to follow the motto, "Progress, not Perfection!" She said there is no magic formula to winning ribbons or awards, explaining how one of her own quilts was judged very differently at various shows where she entered it. All of the First Place awards will be eligible for "Best of Show." Members had the opportunity to ask Lorraine questions during her program.

Gigi and all members thanked Lorraine for presenting the program.

2018 Quilt Show Kay Dwyer followed-up the program with a few comments on the show, saying that anyone with concerns or questions on the appropriate category for their quilt should reach out to the Judging Committee members for help – Libby, Joyce or Lynda. Kay suggested that members become familiar with the quilt show rules and categories, which are posted on the website. Entry forms have not been distributed yet. A Chairs' meeting will be held on Thursday, April 5, 11:30 am at Holy Trinity, and includes a floor plan review. All members are welcome.
