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2019 GUILD CHALLENGE: "Sew, What's the Story? by Chris Appenzeller

Thanks to everyone who shared their February theme challenge quilts at the March meeting! Each month we will announce the theme for the following month (the period from one meeting date to the next) in the newsletter and at the meeting. February's was "Love is..." and March's was "Seeds, Roots, Blossoms!" **The theme for April is "It's Music to My Ears."**

Instead of a single quilt for this year's challenge, we will be making a small guilt each month following a specific theme. The quilts are all to tell a story about YOU: what you are doing that month or a memory that the theme sparks in you. For example, the March theme could have been about what you plan to plant this spring, your favorite flower, your "roots" or family tree, etc. There will be a total of nine possible quilts, and we will begin collecting them in October for display at the joint December meeting. This is not a competition but a challenge: explore your creativity in expressing your thoughts, experiences, and memories, and experiment with new techniques (thread painting, fabric painting, embellishments, embroidery, photo transfer). For each small guilt submited, you will receive a ticket, and there will be a drawing for prizes at the December meeting.

GUIDELINES

Finished size 8 1/2" x 11," batting and backing required. Edges should be finished using binding or other method. Horizontal or vertical orientation okay.

As you work on your quilt, write your inspiration ("What's the story?") on a 3" x 5" card, one side only. Say a few words about the technique you chose. It's up to you whether or not you add words to your quilt top since the cards will be pinned to the bottom of the quilts when displayed in December.

OLD BUSINESS

Joy Mease reported the 2018 Audit Committee met to review the guild's financial records from last year. Teena McRary does an excellent job as guild treasurer, and everything looked fine to them. They had one recommendation, that Teena allow the guild to buy a ream of paper and ink cartridges for her. Audit Committee members had noted that Teena is not being reimbursed for the numerous copies made from her home printer, and agreed this needs correcting. This was their only recommendation.

During the past four months that Mary Long delivered preemie quilts, and there were no babies in the <u>Frye</u> <u>NICU</u>. At the morning meeting today, Kandi Peterson discussed the likelihood that Frye will no longer have a NICU in the future. Anyone insistent on having their preemie quilts delivered only to Frye should hold onto them until further notice. It is also possible Frye will discontinue delivering any babies in the future.

Likely, some of the proceeds would benefit the guild and a designated charity. Members present indicated their interest, and the Board will discuss further. A Silent Auction was held awhile back, which everyone enjoyed.

The <u>2021 Quilt Show Committee</u> met to discuss venues, vendor policies, etc. Anyone interested in joining their discussion should contact Kay Dwyer. Cathy Starnes said Mayor Guess suggested to her that convention center leaders might consider a facility fee discount, since the guild is a non-profit and helps local veterans. A formal discussion would need to take place with them.

Debbie Abernethy provided two <u>membership hand-</u> <u>book corrections</u>, each with the correct name and photograph, and easy to cut and paste in.

Program

In a word, the March program could be summed up as ... WOW! Lisa Alley of Bear Hug Quiltworks in Winston-Salem, NC presented a program this morning on the History of Quiltmaking in NC, and the evening group was treated to her trunk show and numerous patterns she designed.

She started quilting in 1991, while studying civil engineering in Raleigh. When she left her profession behind eight years ago, she followed her heart down the quilting path.

While working on the floor at Sew Original in Winston-Salem, Lisa's keen eye for mixing fabrics into appealing pattern designs came in handy, and pattern designing followed. One day, the Hoffman Fabrics rep came into the store, saw a sample she designed using their fabrics and asked her to make the same quilt using their latest fabric line, followed by their asking her to design patterns for their quarterly project catalogs that showcase new fabrics. In their latest project catalog, ten of Lisa's patterns were featured. A major bonus is that Hoffman sends her free fabrics to use, and after the shops see her patterns in the catalog they order them from her, yay!

Lisa's business card says she is a quilt maker, quilt show judge, and pattern designer. Her only child is a Shih Tzu named Shelby, who often shows up in her quilts.

She likes making easy quilts, which is why most of her patterns are very easy. She said everyone thinks that writing patterns is easy, and once in a while it is, but rarely. A few tips:

- Be careful – Lisa got a long arm machine about a year ago, and now she just wants to stay at home.

- She uses Quilters Dream cotton batting, mid-loft, but also likes their poly-blend for quilts that stay folded.

- She also creates patterns using panels, and teaches a class on how to size panels, do the math, add strips, etc.

- Go to the Sew Original website and download their newsletter; choose Winston-Salem, Boone, or both.

Everyone thanked Lisa for sharing her knowledge and amazing array of quilts, over 60 total. The meeting adjourned at 8:05 pm, and everyone went shopping.
