## 2025 QUILT SHOW

Nancy Garchek will quilt it for us. There was a box of extra squares and Chris Appenzeller agreed to sew these together for a Lily Boutique item.

Catherine Caswell is collecting Lily Boutique items. She is also requesting plastic tubs if anyone has some sitting around. She is willing to store items at her house, but if you could keep them until closer to the show, that would be great.

We encouraged members to use some of Barbara Huggins' fabric in the back. We continue to wash and fold additional fabric.

#### **PROGRAM**

Susan McRae from OSuzannah's Yarn on Union, 130 W Union St Morganton NC. Her shop specializes in yarns, hand dyed yarns, weaving, Sashiko and Shibori items. You can follow her OSuzannahYarnonUnion.

Susan is a 'maker' and a weaver. She has been interested in fibers and cloth from an early age in Smyrna GA and has lived in a number of states since. She learned to sew on an old Singer doing a chain stitch, and graduated to a second-hand machine in college. She was a Psychology major in college with a minor in Art. Her interest in art was inspired by her 6<sup>th</sup> grade teacher who noticed she had a natural understanding of color. She was ahead of the trends early on doing slow stitch and embroidery on her friend's blue jeans in college and embellishing everything. Weaving has been a long-term love and she has 2 large looms at her shop and teaches lessons on Rigid Heddle Looms.

Sashiko (little stabs) is Japanese Quilting. It uses long straight stitches by hand (slow stitch) following decorative patterns. The Japanese are reluctant to throw old clothing away, rather they would mend the fabric and reinforce areas of wear by applying patches made attractive by stitching. Boro is a term for tattered.

Shibori is indigo dye resist on cloth. Indigo doesn't require heat to set which makes it easier than some dyes. The dye is prevented from reaching the fabric by folding, clamping, and stitching. Japanese even use Katazome which is a very thin rice paper cut into intricate shapes. The paper makes a paste that will then resist the dye. Shibori patterns complement any fabric product.

Several members were wearing clothing inspired by shibori. Susan also showed bags, scarves, wall hanging, and pillows created by using Shibori fabric along with Sashiko and Boro.

Fabric needs to be prepared to take dye and require a mordant soak in alum. The fabric should only be natural fibers like cotton, silk, linen, and hemp. If you have purchased fabric, you should first wash in hot water with a soda ash soap, and no fabric softeners to remove the sizing. RFD, Ready for Dye fabric can be purchased. One place to find it is online at Dharma Trading.

Ice dying also produces beautiful designs. In this the fabric is 'scrunched' a bit and laid in a trough. Ice is spread over it and then sprinkled with dye powder. As the ice melts it lets the dye soak through to make pattern. There is no control in this form of dying.

Susan also showed items made from other natural dyes like avocado skins and pits and walnut hulls. All shades of pink, peach and browns can be formed.

Susan closed with a statement. "Creativity—you can't use it up. The more you use it, the more you have. The more you share it, the more it comes back to you. You have to be brave, brave enough to fail."








## FIVE FOOT PFAFF FRAME FOR SALE
