Program

Beth Ledbetter and 2 associates from the Family Guidance Center spoke about the Family Guidance Center located on Rt 70 between McDonalds and Udderly Delicious, across from a KIA dealership. It has been serving Catawba County for over 60 years providing services for victims (men, women, and children). of domestic violence and sexual assault. 1 in 4 women, and 1 in 7 men are affected by domestic violence. Domestic violence can be physical, emotional, verbal, mental, and/or financial. Their clients could be in need of trauma support, court advocacy, housing, obtaining driver's license, IDs, and social security card, job resources, and health care. Often clients arrive with only the clothes on their back, so they need clothing and household items.

Each new client receives a Welcome Badge, with personal hygiene products, a pillow case, and a blanket or quilt. This is where many of our donation quilts and pillow cases go, and the ladies stressed how appreciative the clients were to receive comfort in the form of something pretty during some of their darkest times. Families and singles are provided with shelter up to 45 days. The Family Guidance Center operates the only shelter in the area, and it can hold up to 26. Last December they had 16 women and children including a newborn.

Family Guidance services are free of charge for their clients due to Grants, Donations, and the United Way. They accept gently used clothing in all sizes, purses and wallets, household good, and personal care products. Donations can be made at the office M-Th 8 to 5, and F 8-12. Volunteers are also welcome.

We will have a business meeting and then go to the parking lot where members can open up their trunks and begin to bargain. Bring lots of dollar bills, and or checks. Try to mark your items with even dollars, in other words, avoid change. If it is raining, we will probably move this inside. Evening meeting will definitely be inside as it will still be dark in March. A good way to transport your items would be a rolling suitcase.


