Old Business

Workshop costs: Candi Gordon asked how much the upcoming Grace Errea workshop is costing our guild. Dianne Johnston asked why workshop expenses aren't known prior to the workshop being held; she recalled that in previous years the membership voted to approve any expense of \$100 or more. Janice Setzler noted that, during her 2015-2016 term as president of the morning group, she told the members we were attempting to get Grace Errea which would be a more expensive workshop than usual due to transportation expenses and the membership approved it. Mary Bucy provided some financial information: we are one of three guilds paying Grace Errea to present a program and our share of her transportation is \$250. People taking the workshop are each paying \$30 for it, which fully funds her workshop fee so the guild treasury is not bearing any part of that expense. We are super excited to host Susan Brubaker Knapp the month after our Quilt Show! She is a nationally recognized teacher and host of "Quilting Arts TV" on PBS and has produced numerous patterns, 2 books and 5 video workshops. Her work has been featured in national quilt magazines, museums and many shows.

At a combined meeting on November 8th, Susan will present her "Point, Click, Quilt!" lecture and trunk show covering how to turn your photographs into quilts. Then, two workshop days will be offered. Thursday, November 8th from 9-3:00, Susan will present "Thread Sketching: Dragonfly" workshop for those who already have basic machine quilting experience who want to expand their skills to create color and texture with thread. On Saturday November 10th from 9-3:00, she will present her "Start With a Photo" workshop designed to help you learn the skills to take your favorite photo and interpret it in fabric.

Workshop registration is open to members at the June combined meeting. Registration is \$30.00, and is limited to



24 participants each, and members can register for one workshop. Any spaces still open by September 14, 2018 are open to members interested in taking both workshops, and/or non-members. 2018 Quilt Show Update:

Approximately 900 fat quarters have been donated toward the fat quarter basket raffles.

Kathleen Sigmon thanked all who are selling raffle quilt tickets, both personally and at local events, including Mary Long who sold over 200 tickets at a Wildlife Club event. The guild will sell raffle tickets at the NC Quilt Symposium in Asheville, May 31 to June 2, and volunteers are needed.

Libby Sigmon said a form was provided in the newsletter for members to complete regarding the number and sizes of quilts they plan to enter in the show. Additional copies were distributed. Please turn one in ASAP, to help provide a preliminary quilt count and determine the pipe & drape needed.

Program

Pat Carson introduced Fiber Artist Eneke Thomas of Blowing Rock, NC. Born in Holland, she grew up in Indonesia and then returned to Holland as a teen. In 1964, she came to the U.S. as a foreign student at Elon College, and married in 1966.

She not only creates beautiful quilts and other artwork, but is an avid gardener, another talent represented in her artwork. Fluent in five languages, she currently subs as a French teacher at Watauga High. Although her own mother sewed, it was while visiting her husband's family early in her marriage that Eneke first learned about quilts. At home with a newborn, she first

cut and sewed small items made from donated men's shirts, then moved on to bed covers. She quickly learned

that she preferred "thinking out of the box" in terms of following directions and/or using the suggested colors and patterns.

Eneke shared a variety of quilts she made through the years, including a patriotic "sampler" quilt from 1976, a Feathered Star, Mariner's Compass/Irish Chain, Bears Paw, Flying Geese, Bow Tie, Log Cabin, embroidered Crazy Quilt, and Ohio Star (her favorite block). She started out using cottons but progressed to silks, which she loves. The many quilts made from her bankerhusband's silk ties are absolutely beautiful. She first hand washes each tie, and then backs them with a thin Pellon bought by the bolt. Eneke does not own a rotary cutter or do paper-piecing, and she typically hand-pieces and hand-quilts everything – even the Mariner's Compass.

Eneke also shared slides of her artworks, most of which are attached to stretched canvas to easily hang in her mountain home. She used various "found" materials, including dryer lint, onion bag netting, television wire, cardboard, copper pipe, leather, rusted sheet metal, and birch bark.

Each piece of artwork receives a name, such as "Bucking Horse," "Coneflowers in Ballet Class," "Wired Worlds," and "Copper Pipe Dance."

In closing, she shared assorted thrift-store clothes bought for only a few dollars and repurposed into very interesting, beautiful pieces worthy of a fun party or special occasion. And she even used a sewing machine on a few of these projects!

Pat Carson and the members thanked Eneke for her program. The meeting adjourned at 8:20 pm.

PROGRAM NOTE: Grace Errea Intro to Heat-Set Machine Appliqué Workshop

Friday, June 15, 2018 9 am – 3 pm at Holy Trinity

Description & Supply List

Quilting will be discussed but no sewing machine is required in this one day class

This class will require a kit provided by the teacher (included in registration) containing:

- Pattern
- Product you will use to "heat-set" and also used in the "Free-Edge" technique
- Bottle with flip-top used in the technique
- Pins—Extra thin

You will be able to choose a pattern from the ones suggested. Use the colors I used or choose your own. Ensure you bring lots of fabric scraps in many values. From lightest light to darkest darks.

Fabric scraps can be any size from small, palm size pieces to quarter yards. If you choose to do the Bird in Paradise pattern, please bring 1/4 yards as there are some long sized pieces in this pattern.

The patterns that need a background, verify the quilt size as documented on the web, but most quilts do not exceed 24"x36". Choose fabrics that do not have a distinctive pattern and are light in value for dark focal points, or dark in value for light focal points. Be aware of directional fabrics.

Other supplies:

- Board A June Tailor Board sold in most quilt shops. Or a 20x30 insulation board usually 1 1/4" thick. You can get it at Home Depot, Lowes or any building supply store. If you can handle a 30X40" that is even better but the smaller will work too. (See p. 2 for more specifics.)
- A piece of "Insul-Bright" needled insulated lining, the size of your board for board protection (optional)
- Brush soft, 1/4" wide
- Freezer paper roll—18" wide
- Iron
- Paper, lots of scrap paper. Can be newspaper, paper bags or any scrap paper you have.
 Or paper towels.
- Pen—"Sharpie" black permanent markers fine point (not extra fine), and ball point. Also a color pencil—best red or green.
- Pressing Cloth—Teflon type for appliqué, any size but the larger the better or NON-STICK Reynolds Aluminum foil (most supermarkets carry it)
- Scissors—fabric and paper
- Tape—Painter's multiuse or masking
