#### Program

Jan Carpenter began the program by introducing tonight's presenter, Joann Nichols, an AQS Grand Prize Winner. Joann is from Lenoir, has been quilting for a long time, using many different quilting methods.

Joann's background is sewing apparel. Once she got through the different dresses, she turned to quilting. Joann presents, "Hand applique and quilting trunk show".

Joann showed a quilt that she pieced and quilted during COVID that has an applique grid on the backing. Many of her quilts are faced (without binding). Favorite style of quilt piecing is Jacobean applique. Joann has an Accu-Quilt Go cutter and gets a little carried away with processing scraps. She has a Janome domestic that she uses to piece and quilt when she quilts by machine. Joann uses the thinnest available Quilters' Dream called "Request". Joann also likes to fussy cut and applique - one quilt has small flowers cut from flower fabric and the flowers were appliqued to the center of pinwheels. Her favorite needle is a Richard Hemmings number 10 which she uses for applique and quilting. Joann's typical quilts take about 1-2 years but she works on the quilts in a rotation. Joann has a book of quilting designs and will transfer the design with a Friction pen. She uses Invisifil 100 weight invisible thread for applique and, very rarely, for quilting. Joann does not use a hoop or frame to hand-quilt – she prepares the quilt sandwich with loose thread basting. Joann demonstrated her applique technique for members present and shared her materials used.

Meeting adjourned at 8:15 pm.

#### **Question Raised about Preemie Quilts**

Candi Gordon asked about the preemie quilts the guild donated to NICU at Catawba Valley Medical Center. She said she'd recently seen a mother with a baby born prematurely who spent time in NICU at CVMC. Candi asked if she had received a quilt and the woman replied no, and had not seen quilts anywhere in NICU. Kathleen Whiddon said she would look into this promptly and provide a response via E-BLAST. [Editor's note: Kathleen's response follows these minutes.]

#### Program

Our speaker was JoAnn Nichols of Lenoir. Her handappliqued and hand-quilted works have been exhibited and have won awards nationwide. We were lucky to see so many of them in person as she talked about how she created them. She hand-quilts all of her work, even king size quilts. Her hand-quilting is cross-hatched to give a diamond look unless the fabric gives her a different and usable pattern to follow. She prefers Quilter's Dream Batting and #10 needles by Richard Hemming & Son for handquilting. See morning program description on p. 4 for more details.

#### May 09, 2024 Kathleen Whiddon's response to Candi Gordon's question:

I know this is wordy but please bear with me. I spoke to the contacts for **Catawba Valley Medical Center NICU** to get an update of their needs and policies:

The isoltettes (previously known in incubators) in NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit) are bigger now and require larger quilts to block the light. They **need 50" by 60" quilts** to cover them correctly. That means the little quilts don't serve **this** purpose; <u>however</u>, they **do** send quilts home with babies if they have them.

Their policies have changed so they are **no longer allowed** to use them in the open cribs. Both of these facts are more than likely why workers haven't seen them in use. They were either too small for the isolettes or not allowed in the other cribs.

Our quilts are **very much appreciated and handed out**. We more than likely don't keep up with their demand. If you feel strongly that every baby in the NICU should receive a quilt, feel free to make that your mission and start sewing. Otherwise, we will do what we are able.

Maybe we should not give unrealistic expectations to the public in case their child left the hospital without a quilt. We don't want Moms to feel left out or hurt. We <u>certainly don't want</u> Moms calling the NICU saying why didn't my child receive a quilt. I am glad this came up so we could clarify their needs and policies.

**Children's Advocac**y: I called to update their policies and needs as well. They serve children ages 4-17. The makeup of the children served is 50-50 boys and girls. I asked about sizes for the quilts and all sizes are fine even the small ones. They currently do not need or want any more quilts **until the fall**.

Pillow cases are great. The children/young people like themed pillow cases but all are appreciated.

Thanks for being such a special and talented group. I appreciate each and every one of you.

Asking the question "What if I" and willingness to experiment without messing up a quilt pattern is what makes this technique so fun and interesting. In this improv quilting class you'll learn multiple improv piecing techniques, includ- ing how to make: - Strata / Improv Flying Geese / Wonky stars / Improv Log Cabin blocks /- "Braided" curves It also provides instruction for how to put them together into a wall hanging or quilt, what quilting designs work well with this type of piecing, and different mounting and finishing options. The techniques work best with solid or mottled fabrics. I encourage you to have at least 12-18 solid fat quarters or fat eighths. You can also mix in some mottled fabrics or blender prints if desired and I'll have some scraps on hand to show you how if want to try it. Just remember: the more colors you have means more fun and more exciting improv pieces!
