PROGRAM

The 2019 challenge for our guild is... "SEW, What's the Story?"

After her remarks several ladies came forth with quilts either they made for themselves or quilts they made for others or gift quilts they received from others. Carol Robinson, a charter member of the guild came forth with a very funny quilt she had made depicting herself and several other friends. Chris A. reminded us that people have been quilting for well over 100 years. She shared a rug hooking she did of her grandsons' first time ever at the beach. The rug was made from a photograph she had taken of the boys at the beach.

She challenged members to: a) have confidence in what we are doing, b) be aware of special moments, c) learn a new technique, d) take a look at our inventory of magazines and books, e) use supplies from our stash, and f) share our personal story.

Chris's hope is to have a clothes line around our gathering room to display our $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11''$ blocks of SEW, What's the Story?

"Love Is..." is our February Challenge. The theme for March is the SEEDS, ROOTS, BLOSSOMS! She is asking for suggestions for the remaining months.

2019 Guild Challenge: "Sew, What's the Story?"

This year's quilt challenge was announced and explained during the February program. For those who weren't in attendance, here are the guidelines:

Instead of a single quilt for the year, we will be making a small quilt each month following a specific theme which will be announced at each month's meeting and in the newsletter. A "month" will be considered the period of time between meetings. FEBRUARY'S theme: "Love is..."

The quilts are all to tell a story about YOU: what you are doing or what you are thinking or reminiscing about that month. Think of the quilts as a visual, fabric journal (I did this project with my Tennessee guild, and I kept mine in a binder to review, remember, and enjoy!) There will be a total of nine possible quilts, but we understand that life sometimes get in the way of our plans, so just make as many as you can. We will begin collecting them in October to display at the joint December meeting. This isn't a competition. This is about trying out new techniques and exploring your creativity while sharing your story with others. For each small quilt submitted, you will receive a ticket, and there will be a drawing for prizes at the December meeting.

Each quilt should measure 8 1/2" x 11," the size of a piece of notebook or copy paper. They should have finished edges (not necessarily using binding) and include backing and batting. The quilts can have horizontal or vertical orientation. You can use any technique you desire. They can be appliqued, embroidered, pieced, thread painted, whatever. Consider photo transfer and embellishments.

As you work on your small quilt, write your thoughts on a small 3x5 or 5x7 notecard (just on one side). Tell how your quilt reflects the theme and tells your story, and maybe say a few words of

what technique you chose. It's up to you whether you add words on your quilt since the cards will be pinned to the bottom of the quilts when they are displayed.

Use your scraps of fabric and batting, leftover pieces of binding, old buttons, trinkets and trims. Take advantage of the books in the guild library, and search through your own quilt books and magazines as well as your photo albums. As you go through life in the months ahead, stop and think, "Would this make a good story quilt and how can I sew it?" Most of all, have fun!

Looking ahead, the theme for MARCH is SEEDS, ROOTS, BLOSSOMS!

- The guild has made and presented nearly 270 Quilts of Valor in the past 3½ years, and there are 10,000 veterans in Catawba County.

New Business

- Mary Bucy is organizing a <u>bus trip to Missouri Star</u> Quilt Co. through Burke Christian Tours, September 15-21, 2019, and has room for another 10-15 people. She reviewed other stops on the itinerary, including Louisville, the National Quilt Museum in Paducah, and the Gateway Arch in St. Louis.
- Debra Rubin is organizing a <u>Quilt Retreat</u> at Camp Holston in Banner Elk, NC, April 21-24, 2019 (Sunday to Thursday). The cost per person is \$375 (single) or \$225 (double). Eight people are registered, but up to 13 can attend. Contact her to reserve a space.
- Gigi Miller reported the guild has a new <u>Instagram account</u>, and quilt photos from the morning meeting have been posted. Use: @CVquiltersguild to post on the guild's account.
- Gigi has organized <u>five workshops</u> during 2019 on a variety of topics, for different skills and interests, on various days of the week. Brochures with workshop details were distributed. Registration will be on a first-come basis.
- Kay Dwyer needs one person from the evening group to join the <u>2021 Quilt Show Committee</u>. Mary Long volunteered both herself and Anne Starnes to serve, and a member majority volunteered Gregg Colson.
- Mary Long always pins a label on preemie and sunshine quilts before delivering them. She discussed the new <u>labels for service projects</u>, saying 1,000 cloth labels were ordered, but the current supply will be used first. Members will each receive a few cloth labels, to sew into their binding. Sometimes recipients send a note of thanks after seeing the guild's label. Shelley Thompson explained how

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she machine stitches, "Made by CVQG, 2019" on her bindings.

- Amanda Truett discussed the <u>guild website</u>. The guild's internet domain provider is GoDaddy, and the renewal is due this year. The board has approved paying the best price, for the longest service duration. She could use some help updating the website, and Gregg Colson volunteered to assist.
- The guild has participated in Hickory Landmarks Society's "Heritage Days at Maple Grove" for a few decades now, and they have requested the guild's participation again this year. It will be April 11-12 (Thursday & Friday), on the Maple Grove grounds. Karen Berlin and Debra Rubin are coordinating, and need volunteers.
- The <u>Summer Sewing Camp</u> with Hickory Day School will be held in July again. Gregg Colson and Mary Bucy discussed their experiences from the previous year. Member volunteers will be needed for the camp.
- A <u>Modern Quilt Guild</u> has formed in Blowing Rock. Meetings are held at The Mountain Thread Co., 6-8 pm on the third Tuesdays.
- The <u>by-laws</u> in the member handbook are still in effect, while the committee works on revisions.

PROGRAM

Guild member Chris Appenzeller presented the program "Make a Memory Quilt" and introduced the 2019 Challenge. (See the March newsletter article for details on the Challenge.) She said the purpose of story or memory quilts is to tell *your* story, or your family's story, but tell your personal story. The Challenge theme should be kept in mind while working, which is: *Sew, What's the Story?*

She asked members to be prepared to share stories behind their Challenges, and hopes that a Challenge quilt display will be part of the next quilt show. She noted that guild Challenges often include actual fabric/s that must be included in their quilt, and it can be very interesting to see how members use the required fabric/s in their Challenge. This year's Challenge is a much less stressful one – just relax and enjoy the process. Chris shared some "memory" items she has made through the years, including:

- A quilt for her father-in-law using photo transfer, and representing 100-yrs. of his family's service as Methodist Missionaries to Korea, from 1885 to 1985.
- A hooked rug, representing a photo she took of her



two grandsons' very first frolic in the ocean.

• An assortment of 8½ x 11-inch free motion quilted pieces she

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made as a member of a Tennessee guild. Each one depicts the monthly theme, phrase or technique assigned by their Challenge leader. It was so popular that they repeated the same Challenge the following year, and hung them on a clothesline at the end of each year. It is a suitable Challenge for all quilters, beginner to advanced.

- A block-of-the-month quilt, adapted to represent many trips to the mountains while living in Southern California.
- Various members shared their own "memory quilts" and shared the personal stories behind them, including:
- A teddy bear, one of two made for Joyce Pearce and her sister from their daddy's shirts. She also shared a quilt she made for her husband, an Army veteran, with his service history and various mementos sewn on it.
- A quilt Robin Walker made using her 4-year old grandson's clothes and photos, after receiving help from others at the 2018 retreat. She also shared a t-shirt quilt, representing a 2-week road trip to Minnesota with her daughter last year.
- Chris shared Carol Robinson's memory quilt, "Thursday at 6:45." Joyce Pearce shared the story behind it, saying that Carol and three friends, who had also lost their husbands, had dinner together every Thursday night at 6:45, and Carol celebrated their friendships in her quilt.
- A 100% polyester quilt made by Shelley Thompson using her baby-sitting money, her very first effort.
- A quilt Susan Torchia made for her son, who was attending The Citadel at the time.
- A Nine Patch quilt, made by Susan Fontyn's grand-mother and her friends, circa 1915, with their initials sewn in the center squares of the blocks.
- During Y2K, Peggy McCosh was fighting breast cancer. Her friends made quilt blocks for her; one friend sewed them all together, as the quilt Peggy shared.

- Another first-effort was Gigi Miller's quilt from 1996, when photo transferring to fabrics was much more difficult. She also shared a small memory quilt made from items belonging to her parents, such as her dad's shirt and tie, and clothes her mother made.
- A memory quilt that Jan Hutchinson made for her husband a few years ago. It begins when he left his Missouri home and goes through their life together, including their daughter's birth, his military and other career highlights, and the various places he was stationed with the Navy.
- A small Crazy Quilt made by Mary Long, with beautiful appliqué, hand embroidery, and the initials of important women in her life on the front, and a remembrance of those women on the back.

Chris' favorite go-to book for ideas is *Quilted Memo*ries: Celebrations of Life by Mary Lou Weidman. Susan Fontyn and Mary Bucy compiled a list of the guild's library books that might be helpful for the Challenge, which was printed in the February newsletter. The books were set aside as a group for members to check out, but they will be returned to the library cabinet next week.

The 2019 Challenge begins today, and each month will have a theme. All 8½ x11-inch quilts will be collected in October, for display at the joint meeting in December. Chris welcomes members' ideas for the upcoming monthly themes, including phrases, words, advertising slogans, anything that could apply to everyone in some way. The <u>Challenge theme</u> for February is "Love Is" and they will be shared at the March meetings.

Mary Long and everyone thanked Chris for presenting the interesting and inspiring program, and the meeting adjourned at 8:15 pm.

FOLDING TIP

Dianne Johnston recently shared this tip at Sit 'n Sew. Do you have fold lines on your stored quilts?

Dianne showed us a method of that should eliminate this problem.

- 1. Lay your quilt out on a flat surface.
- 2. Take a corner and bring it to the middle of the quilt. Repeat for other corners.
- 3. If your quilt is not square, the corner points will not meet exactly in the middle. They can overlap.
- 4. Next fold your quilt in half until you get it to a manageable size.
- 5. Notice that your folds are on bias edges. When you unfold a quilt folded using this method there will be no fold lines!



Thanks, Dianne.

If that doesn't work, call Dianne and she will personally come to your house and fold all your quilts. [Just kidding!]
