THE HICKORY CITY QUILT GOES HOME

Mayor Guess must have been thinking ahead about the 2020 City of Hickory 150th Anniversary for a while. He was most familiar with our quilts of valor program and at a guild meeting he popped THE question. Would the Guild make a quilt to commemorate the City's 150th Anniversary? That was THEN.

On April 6, 2021, at the City Council meeting, the Mayor invited Debbie Swartzel to the podium for the presentation. Debbie first shared some background about the Guild and one of its goal to educate others about the art of quilting. She touched on our charitable contributions of quilts to the NICU at local hospitals, the Child Advocacy Center, the Family Guidance Center, quilts of valor, and the Guild's participation at the Heritage Days with the fourth graders and at Hart Square.

As Debbie spoke, a screen behind her flashed a PowerPoint presentation of individual squares in the quilt. The design was based on a pattern called *That Town and Country*. Debbie had to first get permission from the designer to copy the pattern which was copyrighted. After which members quickly obtained necessary materials to prepare kits. Then long-time Hickory residents Mary Long and Bonnie Gold helped prioritize which Hickory history should be highlighted. By February 2020, the project was well underway, kits were in quilters' hands and work had begun on individual blocks. In March 2020, as she collected the first set of finished blocks, and gave out the last two rounds. The plan was to complete the quilt by June 2020.

That was March 12, 2020.

Then the City postponed the anniversary celebration. Debbie and others relaxed a bit. Later, work resumed thanks to Susan Bisulca who prodded Debbie to bring the project to completion. Debbie also thanked Kandi Peterson for coordinating the landscape borders and for her embellishments; and recognized Rebecca Mullins, who digitized the City logo created for the 150th Anniversary for the center block, and expertly quilted the finished top.

Some highlights about our quilt:

- 55 members of the Guild participated in the project. The quilt label names the quilters who lent their time and talent to this project, a number of which were present at the ceremony.
- 170 smaller blocks surround a center block featuring the anniversary logo digitized by Rebecca Mullins. While most block designs were from the original pattern, four original cornerstone blocks recognize Hickory landmarks: Maple Grove, Hickory Tavern, the A. A. Shuford Building, Union Square and the Piedmont Wagon Building. A special thank you to Debbie Rubin for her artistic talent on a couple of cornerstones. For the most part, current businesses were not named, but individual blocks featured a cross section of the community, its businesses and history. Several significant locations were specifically chosen: the SALT Block, Lenoir-Rhyne University, and the Polio Hospital.


In closing, the Mayor said he would like to share the quilt with a larger audience at various locations throughout the City, as a traveling exhibit to libraries, City Hall, Hickory Museum of Art and throughout the community.

It's fair to say that your quilt was well received, and will be a meaningful and lasting tribute to our home town. Kudos to all who worked on this remarkable art piece.



Program Notes


