We briefly adjourned before Gregg Colson gave his program on Free Motion Sewing.

Program

Greg gave a brief biography of his work and background from his design of theatre, homes, computer programs, teaching and of course designing quilts. Though he stated design didn't lead him into quilting, it was a good background to begin in.

What got him into quilting were his beloved old shirts. His aha moment came when wondering what to do with them, he decided to cut them up and make a quilt.

Here are some of highlights but for brevity's sake...Greg has a blog, 3GQuilts.com. Many of his resources from books, to thread and all things pertaining to free motion quilting are on this blog. (This is a great site...I have already peeked at it!)

Panel Quilt pieces are a great way to practice your free motion sewing. Available at many sewing

stores. And he has two suggestions on his blog. Gregg has thrown out pins for basting. He uses spray basting and only sprays the backing and the quilt top and after sandwiching, he irons both top and bottom from the middle out. Products he uses is 505 or Sullivan's Quilt Basting Spray found at JoAnn's or other sewing stores.

A help for Gregg is that he marks his quilt motifs. His pen of choice is a Dritz chalk marker. He has also used a pounce pad. Then he uses hair spray to affix the design. He also has used Press and seal. (Yes... really!)

He likes 50 wt. thread and uses a 90/14 needle. He uses the same color in both the top thread and bobbin. He changes his needle with each new project. He uses a Supreme slider and demonstrated how to put it on and take it off.

His gloves had both thumbs and index fingers cut out to give him better dexterity in taking out bobbins, adjusting project or heaven forbid, re threading.

Practice makes perfect...and helps with muscle memory! Gregg has sandwiched smaller pieces to practice his motifs on, this helps with checking out thread tension.

Gregg plans his free motion sewing on a quilt, a few steps at a time.

He gave us a demonstration on his Pfaaf machine, and of course it looked VERY easy!!

Thank you Gregg for a wonderful program, filled with hints and helps and many resources! I know the entire guild enjoyed it immensely and perhaps Gregg you will be seeing the fruits of your labors on our future quilts.

A special PS is that Gregg asked how many would like him to do a workshop.

There were MANY hands so stay tuned!

Quilt of Valor Presentation

During her military career, guild member Lori Skinner served in the United States Army for 20-years. Amanda Truett, Peggy McCosh and Susan Bisulca conducted a Quilts of Valor Ceremony for Lori, in recognition of her service to all Americans. She chose a QOV made by Carol Carman and quilted by Dotty Williams. Since 2015, Amanda said guild members have made and awarded over 300 QOV to local veterans, and the National QOV Foundation reports awarding 225,000 total quilts to American service members and veterans across the U.S., and in Germany, Iraq, and Afghanistan.

Lori thanked members, saying, "It is amazing to work on one of these quilts, but even more amazing to receive one." Everyone applauded Lori, in complete agreement her Quilt of Valor was hard-earned and well-deserved.

PROGRAM

Guild member Gregg Colson presented the program, Techniques for Finishing Quilts. He began

quilting in 2012 and joined the guild in 2015. Gregg quilts only on weekends, but has clearly accomplished a great deal in his limited free time. He recently started a blog, 3GQuilts, where links to many products and other information shared can be found. He posts weekly, or so, and also shares photos of his projects in progress.

Gregg gave kudos to the guild's talented long-arm quilters, something he aspires to do himself one day, but said there are also other ways for quilting the quilt. The simplest method is hand-tying, by first thread or pin basting the layers, and then staying within the batting guidelines for spacing the ties. Other choices are using a long-armer or quilting it yourself using various techniques. When machine quilting, he first used the "quilt in the ditch" method, simply following the seam lines, with no need to mark a quilting pattern or create a design. However, he says that designing a pattern can add another level of interest to a quilt, especially when in opposition or contrast to the quilt top pattern itself.

Gregg discussed preparing a quilt for quilting. He no longer thread or pin bastes his quilts, ever – he now uses the spray basting method. He shared a couple of easily found spray basting products, saying he typically gets 3-4 quilts from one canister. He explained the exact method (beginning with a king flat sheet taped to his garage floor!) He lays the backing fabric on the sheet, right side down, smoothes it out, and then spray bastes it in quarters. He folds it with sticky sides together, and carries it to a floor inside the house, then tapes it down again and begins building his quilt sandwich. It was noted that batting is also sold with adhesive already applied to it, and a couple members say it works well for them.

Gregg prefers using cotton or wool batting, which he first dampens and tosses in the dryer for 15 minutes, letting the steam remove the wrinkles. He noted the "seedy" side of batting is the backside, which should be placed against the sticky backing fabric. He also spray bastes the backside of his quilt top, again using a bed sheet taped to the garage floor, and then lays it on top of the batting. The last step

involves dry ironing the quilt sandwich, top side first, ironing from the center out, to remove any bubbles or creases. The sandwich will be tacky, but not completely stuck, so the layers can be rearranged, if needed. Then Gregg flips it over and irons the back of the quilt sandwich. It stays stuck together for a couple months while he quilts it, and the basting eventually washes out. He also discussed marking quilting designs, and shared some of the methods, resources, and books he likes.

Gregg shared some of his completed quilts and commented on the quilting design methods that he used. He also shared a few "practice panels" used for learning the free-motion quilting process, (links to the panels are on his blog), but any fabric panel could be used for practice. It is a great way to work out the correct tension settings, too, before making a mess on the actual quilt. He shared another technique called "quilting from the back," with the quilting design printed directly on the backing fabric for thread tracing – no marking, just follow the lines. Gregg demonstrated free-motion quilting for everyone, and explained the entire process. He always begins with a new needle and bobbin, using a 90/14 topstitch needle (very sharp with a large eye) and 50wt. cotton thread, usually Aurifil.

Another very interesting and "quick" finishing technique Gregg shared involved attaching the binding. Double-fold binding is sewn to the top, then Elmer's Glue is used to secure the binding to the back – no pins or clips, and definitely no whip stitching. He irons it with a hot iron to bond it and dry the glue, and then sews along the (top) ditch to attach it on the back; the glue will wash out later. Kind of hard to explain this one ... maybe he'll post a video of it on his blog!

Mary Whipkey and the members thanked Gregg for his very informative, interesting program, and the meeting adjourned at 8:05 pm.


2019 Quilt Challenge "Sew, What's the Story?"
