January 18th Speaker: Captain Mike Daniel 10:30-12:30

The discovery of Blackbeard's flagship the Queen Anne's revenge



Captain Daniel will be speaking about his search and the discovery of Blackbeard's flagship the Queen Anne's revenge. Captured in 1717 she was originally the Concorde de Nante a slave ship carrying over 500 slaves at the time of the capture. He will be discussing some of the research on the ship, the Pirates, and Black Beards persona as told in the documents Daniel discovered which describe some of the techniques Blackbeard used during the capture of these ships. His reputation is exaggerated in the many books written about him. Captain Daniel will be showing a PowerPoint presentation of the many artifacts found on the site and the research used to identify them.

The Parabolic Dune Sites of South Florida: Sacred Geography

Bob Carr will present his extensive work in south Florida. He directed the documentation of two prehistoric sites associated with large parabolic dunes. One site is at the Jupiter lighthouse and the second is in Bonita Springs on the Gulf coast. Cultural deposits at these sites date back to the Late Archaic Period.
