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The King and His Bible

As God anticipated, the people of Israel would one day ask for a king. God spoke this prophecy by Moses in Deuteronomy 17:18-20. One of the most notable commands, and the one that Moses centers on in this passage, was the responsibility of each king of God's people to make his own copy of the scriptures. Here is what he was responsible for:


He was to write for himself a copy. In the simple act of copying word for word all of the commandments, statutes, precepts, and laws of God was a humbling reminder that if he held to them, he and his kingdom would be blessed. If he forgot, neglected, or disobeyed, the curses of God's word would come upon him and upon the people he ruled (Deut. 28-29).

He was to cherish it. It was to be with him at all times (Deut. 17:19). The law of God is described as a counselor and a confidence. As the king had God as his Advisor and guide, he could absolutely know he was standing on solid ground.

He was to read it (Deut. 17:19). The specific purpose was so that he could "learn to fear the Lord his God and be careful to observe all the words of this law and these statutes." What the mind repeats, the mind retains. As the king was commanded to do this all his life, it was for his good.

He was to do this so his heart not be lifted up (Deut. 17:20). Repeatedly in the chronicles of Israel, there were kings who suffered different fates precisely for that reason...their hearts were lifted up! Pride is a danger for all of us and the kings of Israel should have known that better than most!

If God wanted His king to treasure His word for the good of His people, how much more the people who Christ has made "kings and priests to His God and Father" (Rev. 1:5)!

He also displayed distinctly human feelings and qualities: He was moved to pity (Mark 1:41) and compassion (Mark 8:2). He was distressed (Mark 7:34; Luke 8:24–25), angry (Mark 3:5), annoyed (Mark 10:14), surprised (Mark 6:6), disappointed (Mark 8:17; 9:19), and hungry (Mark 11:12).

Although He was born of a virgin, Jesus was a true human being.

Yet after seeing Jesus calm a savage storm by simply "rebuk[ing] the winds and the waves," His disciples "were amazed and asked, 'Who can this be?'" (Matthew 8:27). —*Mike Benson*

Stay Bold and Stay 'Old'

There is a saying among those who fly planes, "There are old pilots, and there are bold pilots—but there are no old, bold pilots." While humorous, it makes a good point. Those who choose to fly by the seat of their pants run the risk of being prematurely laid to rest.

My prayer for you is that you become an "old," bold Christian. By that I mean that you stay faithful to the Lord, committed to His ways, and unabashed about Jesus Christ. Too many Christians take daring chances flying too close to the world and they end up with a wrecked faith.

As Ephesians chapter 3 opens up, Paul is discussing the mystery of the gospel now being revealed. As a consequence of that, faith in Christ is being developed in people. Paul then makes this statement concerning this thought: "in whom we have boldness and access with confidence through faith in Him. Therefore I ask that you do not lose heart..." (v.12-13).

Paul wanted the Ephesians to become "old," bold Christians. "Old" as in remaining faithful to the end (whenever that would be for them). Bold as in confident in their Savior. "Old" as in enduring with Jesus no matter what. Bold as in expressing to one and all just who Jesus is and what He can do.

What about you? Are you confident that you will become "old" in your Christianity in that you will never give up on Jesus, no matter the circumstance? Are you bold in publicly living faithful to His will and telling others about Him? There's an added benefit in doing such, for the latter part of v.13 states that if they (and us) live that way, then it will be to "your glory." So, stay with Christ, express your love for Him, and you will become an "old," bold, gold Christian!

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High Anxiety and Blessed Relief

Christians are not completely immune to anxiety. However, as Holy Spirit-filled followers of the will of God, we do have access to a God who cares for us and who will help us cope with this human reality. Consider, for instance, some things that have been discovered about human anxiety. Objective studies indicate that the average person's anxiety is focused on...

- 40% things that will never happen.
- 30% things about the past that can't be changed.
- $\bullet~12\%$ things about criticism by others, mostly untrue.
- 10% about health, which gets worse with stress.
- 8% about real problems that will be faced.

The greatest "real problem" is the reality of sin in the life and the consequences thereof. This is the heaviest burden one can bear. By grace, God gave us Jesus Christ who pleads: "Come to Me, all of you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. All of you, take up My yoke and learn from Me, because I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for yourselves. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light" (Matt. 11:28-30). —Johnny Hester

(Mal. 3:6); "God is not man, that he should lie; neither the son of man that he should repent: hath he said, and shall he not do it? Or hath he spoken, and shall he not make it good?
