# Does Secular Education Benefit Christianity?

It has always been God's will that His people teach their children about Him. Speaking of His commands He said, "You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you

sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up" (Deuteronomy 6:7). Most of us are familiar with Proverbs 22:6 which says, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." When reading this proverb with its spiritual application in mind, it is easy to understand that the seed of God's word must be planted in the hearts of our children and the godly principles taught during childhood will remain with them well into adulthood.

# Why We Fail...Sometimes

Let's just face the facts: Sometimes we fail. However, Jesus never fails. Multiplying the loaves and the fishes is one of the most amazing of all Christ's miracles. Jesus set aside laws of physics and science to multiply and magnify matter. At the same time He multiplied and magnified His name.

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When He was faced with the unrealistic challenge of feeding a hungry multitude, the apostles felt defeated and destroyed. The events they faced seemed like they were just too much. How in the world were they to go forward and continue to help others. Philip tried to calculate the cost of a feeding that would allow each person to get what they wanted (John 6:7,11). He knew that they were unable to do this on their own. Jesus in a feat of magnificence showed why He was the true Bread of Life (John 6:35). The question becomes why did the disciples feel hopeless and defeated?

**They Underestimated Themselves.** Phillip quickly calculated that it was too big of an endeavor and just knew that they could do nothing. He did not say it was a bad work but just felt they were not the ones to do it.

They Underestimated the Power of Small Things. The disciples were unable to see the potential in the small amount they already had collected. They had everything they needed except an accomplishing mindset.

**They Underestimated the Power of God.** This was the most serious mistake they could have made and is one of the failures we make also. He could do anything and still can. We just have to remember that He is in control. We just have to remember that His power is greater than anything upon this earth!



# First a String

In November of 1847, a civil engineer named Charles Ellet Jr. was commissioned to build a bridge across the Niagara Gorge. As you can imagine the greatest challenge was the start. How could you get the first cable across an 825-foot chasm with 225-foot cliffs on either side?

The solution came from a local ironworker named Theodore Graves Hulett, who suggested a kite-flying contest. A fifteen-year-old boy named Homan Walsh won the \$10 cash prize for flying the first kite across the chasm.

The day after that successful flight, a stronger line was attached to that kite string and pulled across. Then an even stronger line. Then a rope. Then a cable consisting of thirty-six strands of ten-gauge wire. The bridge would eventually become the world's first railway suspension bridge. It would connect two countries, and it was strong enough to support a 170-ton locomotive. And it all started with a single kite string!

"For who has despised the day of small things?" (Zechariah 4:10).

Some tasks seem at the start to be insurmountable. We can't see how something so large can be overcome. But never underestimate the value of small things. A small action can lead to more. Too many times we do nothing, thinking a small act is meaningless. Yet action begets action, one step takes you to the next, and success leads to more of the same.

Is there something you are struggling to overcome? Some task that seems too big to overcome? A relationship broken by too big a gulf? A habit that overwhelms you? Start with a small attempt. Even the smallest action can lead to something bigger. It may not be much more than a string but it could build a bridge.

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# Spiritual Standards

"Sure, I'll tell you," The man said. "I want to get the exact time because I'm the man who blows the whistle at noon." How often do we set spiritual standards for ourselves based on what others are doing?
