The Real Influencers

You know what people who are really popular on YouTube, Instagram, or TikTok are called? Influencers. I guess because so many

people follow them and are influenced by them. Well, let me tell you who the real influencers are supposed to be: Christians – you and me – and we don't need to be on social media to do it.

Paul so poignantly put it in Romans 14:7, "For none of us lives to himself, and no one dies to himself." We are always around other people and we should influence them for God and good.

So how do we influence others? I can think of two ways – by what we say and by what we do. Colossians 4:5-6 puts it this way: "Walk in wisdom toward those who are outside, redeeming the time (note: that's what we do). Let your speech always be with grace, seasoned with salt, that you may know how you ought to answer each one (note: that's what we say)."

Jesus also referenced His followers as influencers when He compared them to salt and light (Matthew 5:13-16).

The teachers treated these kids kinder with more warmth, gave them more learning material, and called on them more in class. When the students made a mistake, they gave them the benefit of the doubt and were quicker to presume they needed better feedback. This change in how they were treated changed how they performed. "Five Questions" Continued from Page 3... In Acts 5:1-6, the Bible gives a case where a man and a woman failed to conquer their own inner space, and it led to their destruction. In confronting Ananias and Sapphira, Peter alluded to five questions relevant to our inner space—the heart—that must be answered by us all.

"Why has Satan filled your heart...?" The Bible gives us a clear answer on this: Because he is the father of lies (John 8:44); because he is your enemy (1 Peter 5:8); and because he is the enemy of Christ and the church (Rev. 12). In order to conquer inner space, we must resist Satan's temptations (James 4:7).

"...to lie to the Holy Spirit...?" Can we lie to God? No, because nothing can be hidden from Him (Ecc. 12:14). Ananias and Sapphira failed to realize that lying to the apostle was in effect lying to God, and the Holy Spirit, because of the authority they carried.

"...and keep back part of the price of the land for yourself?" Greed and selfishness can destroy us. Ananias and Sapphira wanted the apostles and the church to believe they sold the land and gave the *entire* proceeds. They wanted recognition for the gift, but to profit financially as well.

"Five Questions" Continued from Page 4... To control our inner space, we need to beware of the love of money (1 Timothy 6:10) and refrain from our desire to be seen among men (Rom. 12:3; Matt. 6:2).

"...was it not your own...was it not in your own control?" The offering was a "free will" offering. There was no set amount commanded (2 Cor. 9:7). Rather it is what we "purpose" in our inner space, our heart, that is important! There was no reason to lie, but their inner space was out of control.

"Why have you conceived this thing in your heart?" The simple fact is, Ananias and Sapphira made the plan in their own hearts, and executed it because their inner space was out of control. Their hearts were not right with God (Acts 8:22). In their hearts they hatched the plan (James 1:14-15).

Of all the frontiers, "inner space" is the most difficult to tame. Jesus says sinful actions from within man (Mark 7:20-23). We can't tame the heart on our own. Instead, we need the word of God (Psalm 119:9-11). -Matt Clifton



I Think You Can

Robert Rosenthal came to teachers with a new test called the Harvard Test of Inflected Acquisition. This test, he informed the instructors, could accurately predict kids that would excel in the coming year. The test was administered and the teachers were given the names of potentially high-achieving students. Rosenthal expressed to them that these kids were special and that even if they might not have done well in the past, they showed unusual potential for growth.

The test proved itself right. Those students it selected scored better and improved more. The first graders gained 27 IQ points versus only 12 for the rest of the class. In second grade, the potentially high achievers gained 17 points versus only seven by the rest of the class. Continued on Page 6...
