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### Are We Practicing What We Think?

When surveyed, 75 percent of Americans think the nation's morality is heading downhill. Almost a third of respondents said that moral decline was a result of people not reading the Bible, 88 percent of them own a Bible, 80 percent think it is sacred, and 61 percent wished they read their Bible more.

Yet only 26 percent of Americans said they read their Bible on a regular basis (four or more times a week). Of those who do say they read their Bible the majority, 57 percent, only do so four times a year or less.

It isn't a matter of knowing what we need or having the ability or resources to do it, it is the doing it that seems to be the problem.

We can see what happens to a society that suffers from a lack of knowledge of God's word (Hosea 4:6). If we know the world needs it, do we think we don't? God's word is a vaccine against the diseases of immorality, a guard watching over our heavenly treasure, and a safety harness for our soul.

# The Sting of Death

A particular church received personal greetings from the Kejave Medical Center staff in Kenya and read of the following amazing story.

Eight-year-old Monica broke her leg as she fell into a pit. An older woman, Mama Njeri, happened along and climbed into the pit to help get Monica out. In the process, a dangerous black Mamba snake bit both Mama Njeri and Monica. Monica was taken to Kejave Medical Center and admitted. Mama Njeri went home, but never awoke from her sleep.

The next day a perceptive missionary nurse explained Mama Njeri's death to Monica, telling her that the snake had bitten both of them, but all of the snake's poison was expended on Mama Njeri; none was given to Monica. The nurse then explained that Jesus had taken the poison of Monica's sin so that she could have new life. It was an easy choice for Monica. She became a Christian.

In 1 Corinthians 15, the Apostle Paul poses the questions:

"Where, O Death, is your victory? Where, O Death, is your sting?" (1 Corinthians 15:55).

"Christianity in Common" Continued from Page 5... However, when offenses do surface, Christians should treat one another differently because of their mutual love for one another.

As the Psalmist wrote, "Behold, how good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity" (Psa 133:1). Unity in the church is not an unattainable goal. Christ would not have prayed for unity if it were not possible. The apostle Paul would not have pleaded for unity if it were not possible. The church at Philippi proved that Christianity could be shared in common with other believers. Paul needed monetary aid, and the church was willing and ready to assist.

The modern church in America generally does not struggle with monetary funds. What we do struggle with is building genuine, lasting relationships – relationships that confess, pray, and forgive. The church at Philippi proved its love for Paul and the Lord by making sure that he was taken care of financially. But more than that, there was a genuine love and appreciation for Paul's labor among them.

Sometimes, individual church members are guilty of growing cynical, being only concerned about themselves and their self-interest. The church at Philippi reminds us that we all need each other. Paul needed the brethren, and the brethren valued Paul. The elders needed the deacons, and the deacons respected the elders (Phil 1:1). The church needed donations from individual Christians to make sure that Paul's needs were met. When Christians recognize the value of commonality and community in Christ, the mission of the church will be more presentable to the lost and the church will grow. Think about it!

"The Sting" Continued from Page 2... "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23), and "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23).

But God loves us so much that He gave His one and only Son Jesus to die on the cross for our sins. "He Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By His wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter 2:24 ESV). Jesus suffered the "sting" of death so that we could receive the gift of eternal life. "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

God will cleanse from sin and give eternal life to those who place their faith and trust in Jesus (Acts 16:30-31), turn from their sins in repentance (Acts 17:30-31), confess Jesus before men (Romans 10:9-10), and are baptized (immersed) into Christ for the forgiveness of sins (Acts 2:38). He will continue to cleanse from sin those who continue to walk in the light of His Word (1 John 1:7-9).

The Gospel – the Good News – is that Jesus "took the poison" of our sin by dying on the cross for our sins. He died for us so that we may have a new life now and eternal life to come.

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But boredom may also result from repeatedly doing the same things. Sing; pray; observe the Lord's Supper; sermon; contribution. The repetition *can* become boring, but it doesn't have to! Self-discipline can keep us focused on *why* we're doing what we're doing, thus preventing boredom.

Others complain that worship is boring because it isn't "fun." That's a loaded word. Should worship involve joy and praise? Of course! But "fun?" Where in Scripture do we find anything about worship being "fun?" Even children must learn that not everything is fun. We'll never out-entertain Hollywood, nor should we try! That's not the purpose of worship.

Those leading in worship should strive to prevent boredom. Whether it's preaching, singing, praying, serving communion, reading Scripture, or whatever, let's make it clear that we're glad to be helping God's people honor Him. An enthusiastic, positive attitude is contagious and will go a long way toward eliminating boredom.
