Let God Make You Over

In the book of Jeremiah, we get a very visual picture of us and God working in our lives. In the opening verses of chapter 18 are these words: "The word which came to Jeremiah from the LORD, saying: 'Arise and go down to the potter's

LORD, saying: 'Arise and go down to the potter's house, and there I will cause you to hear My words.' Then I went down to the potter's house, and there he was, making something at the wheel. And the vessel that he made of clay was marred in the hand of the potter; so he made it again into another vessel, as it seemed good to the potter to make. Then the word of the LORD came to me, saying: 'O house of Israel, can I not do with you as this potter?' says the LORD. 'Look, as the clay is in the potter's hand, so are you in My hand, O house of Israel!" (v.1-6)

Jeremiah gives us an image of God as the potter and us as the clay. God works diligently to form us and transform us into useful, beautiful vessels, but sometimes things don't work out. It's not the potter's fault; a flaw in the clay causes the problem. But God doesn't wad us up into a clay ball and fling us away. Like a potter, He lovingly starts over to start shaping us again.

"Let God Make You Over" Continued from Front Page... The process of producing a beautiful pot isn't fast. The potter takes time, carefully crafting the clay into shape for its intended use. In the same way, when God starts over with us, we may not become instantly useful. It takes time and the skill of the Great Potter to shape us. Sooner or later, though, we'll be useful again.

Just remember this: The God who made you can make you over. You are never hopeless. We just need to give in to Him and be patient and let Him do His work.

Commands from Christ Are Not Optional

I recently read a Bible Q&A article written by a denominational preacher. In it he was asked, "Can you go to heaven if you 'trust' Jesus as your Lord and Savior but you are not yet baptized?" He began his answer by saying: "Yes. Baptism has nothing to do with salvation." Later in the answer he stated: "Baptism is an ordinance instituted by Christ until the 'end of the age'... Clearly this command was not only for the apostles who heard it but for His followers throughout the entire age." Finally, he concluded with: "One is saved without, apart from and before baptism. Those who are saved should desire baptism as a public profession of faith, but please realize that it is not necessary for salvation. If a person believes in Jesus as Lord and is never baptized, they will still be saved."

I would like to analyze how this person answered this most sincere and important question about baptism and see if it really "holds water." I think it is very interesting that he admits that baptism is a command from Christ and then declares that it does not have to be followed for salvation. Imagine that – the command from Jesus Christ to be baptized is optional (or so he said)! Given this logic, I wonder what other commands from Christ would be optional? I guess all that are not in line with man's teachings!

Did You know This About 1 Kings?

First Kings chapter 3 records the time God came to King Solomon in a dream and said, "Ask! What shall I give you?" Solomon's first thought

"Commands" Continued from Page 2... All facetiousness aside, listen to what Jesus Himself said concerning what our attitude should be toward every command He gives:

- John 14:15, "If you love Me, keep My commandments."
- John 14:21, "He who has My commandments and keeps them, it is he who loves Me."
- John 15:10, "If you keep My commandments, you will abide in My love"
- John 15:14, "You are My friends if you do whatever I command you."

 Note that there is no room in these verses for options, opinions, or omissions. That's because Jesus is the One with all authority in heaven and on earth (Matt. 28:18). Whatever He has commanded, we'd better do. And Jesus commanded baptism as necessary for salvation (Mark 16:16) and declared it to be the process of how people become His disciples (Matt. 28:19). The apostles went about baptizing "in the name of" Jesus Christ (i.e. in the manner and for the purpose He authorized, see Acts 2:38; 10:48). They knew something we should never forget: If it's a command from Christ, it's not an option. —Edd Sterchi

That Sharp Stone in Your Heart

My Cherokee grandmother used to say that there is a very sharp, triangular-shaped stone inside your heart. Every time you do something that violates your conscience, that stone turns a little and makes a small, very painful cut in your heart. However, if you break your conscience many times your heart no longer hurts. This is because the stone has cut a groove-track inside your heart. When it turns, it no longer cuts the flesh.

This is a metaphor about life. At first, when your conscience was pure, each little sin hurt. But the more you did that sin, the easier it became. A pure conscience, trained by the study of the Bible, is a good guide in your life. But when we ignore our trained consciences, they are no longer the trusty scouts we need. and a pure heart are connected to genuine faith and love (1 Timothy 1:5)?



Did You Know This About 2 Samuel?

The prophet Samuel anointed two kings: Saul, and then David.

Saul died in disgrace, but David died in satisfaction.

Among David's last words were the assertion that God has "made with me an everlasting covenant, ordered in all things and secure" (2 Samuel 23:5).

Regarding this promise, we read in 2 Samuel 7:16, "And your house and your kingdom shall be established forever before you. Your throne shall be established forever."

The "forever" part of David's kingdom was referring to the fact that the Messiah would come through the line of David. Luke 1:32-33 testifies to this truth, as the angel Gabriel told Mary about her future child:

"He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David. And He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of His kingdom there will be no end."
