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We often fail to consider the gradual, cumulative effect of sin in our lives. Keep reading. In Saint Louis in 1984, a woman noticed a few bees buzzing around the attic of her home. Since there were only a few, she thought, she made no effort to deal with them. Over the summer, though, the bees continued to fly in and out the attic vent while the woman remained unconcerned, unaware of the growing city of bees.

In a relatively short period of time, the whole attic became a hive, which became so large that her bedroom ceiling finally caved in under the weight of hundreds of pounds of honey and thousands of angry bees. While the woman escaped serious injury, she was unable to repair the damage of her accumulated neglect.

Consider David's reflection on the heaviness of sin. "O Lord, rebuke me not in your anger, nor discipline me in vour wrath!

"Bees" Continued from Front Page... For your arrows have sunk into me, and your hand has come down on me. There is no soundness in my flesh because of your indignation; there is no health in my bones because of my sin. For my iniquities have gone over my head; like a heavy burden, they are too heavy for me. My wounds stink and fester because of my foolishness. I am utterly bowed down and prostrate; all the day I go about mourning. For my sides are filled with burning, and there is no soundness in my flesh. I am feeble and crushed; I groan because of the tumult of my heart" (Psalm 38:1-8).

Instead of neglecting the sin in your life that will one day crash down upon you, seek forgiveness and restoration. For David said elsewhere, "I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity: I said, I will confess my transgressions to the Lord, and you forgave the iniquity of my sin" (Psalm 32:5).

What is buzzing above your head? Is it time to address it?

I just read a report from mission workers in India. The closing article reported on the rules of conduct expected in Sinclair High School in Bangalore. The Bible is about the rules of conduct for church members. Yes, God's word covers everything we do. We Are To Grow In Knowledge. "But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18). "That ye might walk worthy of the Lord unto all pleasing, being fruitful in every good work, and increasing in the knowledge of God" (Colossians 1:10).

We Are To Prove (Test) Every Teacher Whether They Speak God's Word. "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God" (1 John 4:1).

We Are To Be Ready To Give An Answer (Defense). "...be ready always to give an answer to every man that sketch you a reason of the hope that is in your with meekness and fear" (1 Peter 3:15).

We Are To Discern The Good From That Not Good. "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21). How are we to prove, defend, or discern without Bible knowledge?

Temptation Can Be Overcome By Bible Knowledge. In Matthew chapter 4 our Lord Jesus, in overcoming temptation, said three times "It is written."

As We Grow In Knowledge We Are To Pass It On To Others. "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20). "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also" (2 Timothy 2:2).

As We Grow in The Knowledge Of The Bible, Let Us Also Practice It In Our Daily Lives. "But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For is any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass: For he beholder himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed" (James 1:23-25).

"With all lowliness and meekness, with longsufferring, forbearing one another in love" (Ephesians 4:2).

"Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season, reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine" (2 Timothy 4:2).

Being "long suffering" is a beautiful Biblical concept. It is virtually self-explanatory; "longsuffering means to "suffer long with another." Whether it be our quirky personalities, our different ways of expressing ourselves, our predictable behaviors, our struggles with or anything else, we must learn to bear with one another. Perfection is something that will only be realized at the coming of Christ.
