

A Test for Spiritual Maturity

The church of Corinth faced a problem: they were divided around personalities and preferences for different preachers and teachers, aligning themselves with Apollos, Paul, or others. Despite their affinity for spiritual gifts, Paul was deeply concerned with the unity and maturity of the congregation.

In his letter to the Corinthians, Paul wrote, "For while there is jealousy and strife among you, are you not of the flesh and behaving only in a human way?" (1 Cor. 3:3 ESV). So we can test ourselves for spiritual maturity by whether our relationships and interactions at church are characterized by strife and jealousy. If this is the case, perhaps we are not as spiritually mature as we might imagine.

As Christians, we are called to "maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" as we live together in the body of Christ (Eph. 4:3). This does not mean compromising on doctrinal matters to get along, but it does mean we may have to sacrifice our wants, desires, and opinions for the sake of the body of Christ. The Scriptures say elsewhere that love "does not insist on its own way" (1 Cor. 13:5). Just as in marriage, constantly seeking our own way can result in conflict, and the same can happen in the body of Christ.

The divisions at Corinth were producing strife that did not build up the church. They were still fleshly and not as spiritually mature as Paul would have hoped. They needed milk and not meat, because their lives revealed their spiritual condition.

So, are you spiritual or fleshly? Are you finding yourself having strife or jealousy with people in the church? If so, then perhaps, like the Corinthians, you are of the flesh and behaving in a human way and not of the Spirit. A change of heart is overdue, and we need to seek the wisdom from above to transform ourselves into spiritual, not fleshly, people.

Romans 12:2 says: And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God.

- We are called to live differently than the world.
- We are challenged to behave differently than the world.
- We are encouraged to have different priorities than the world.
- Conforming to Christ sharpens our view of eternity.

When we live differently, we aren't living with our head in the sand, but living with our eyes on Heaven! The sacrifice of Christ allows us to be compassionate, not calloused to the cause of Christ. Imitating Christ means being buried in baptism, Romans 6, and living faithfully, Revelation 2:10. May we appreciate those who may resemble, but we may seek and love the One we should imitate. Looking like Him will not be seen in our appearance, but in our actions!

Medicine for the Deadly Disease

In January 1925, a diphtheria epidemic emerged in Nome, Alaska. At that time, Nome was a remote town in the Alaskan interior. It was hard enough to get to Nome in the warmer months but during the dead of winter was considered impossible for many except the hardy men known as dog-mushers.

Often fatal, the disease was spreading rapidly. Dr. Curtis Welch, the town's only physician, feared a widespread outbreak. There was a cure for this disease but there was not a drop in Nome. Dr Welch sent out telegraphs and some found that there was plenty of the cure in a hospital in Anchorage over 600 miles away. Which seemed like a million miles to the physician but not to the hardy outdoorsmen of Alaska.

Despite a white-out blizzard, the serum was delivered to Nome by a relay of 20 mushers who covered the 674-mile distance in 5 and a half days. The serum reached those afflicted and many lives were saved.

Today, the Iditarod Sled Dog Race in Alaska commemorates this event that occurred a century ago.

An epidemic unlike any other has infected the peoples of the earth. The disease is sin. And without the cure made from the blood of Jesus, all will suffer eternal, horrible pain. Jesus "bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that we might die to sin and live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter 2:24). Spread the word. A cure has been found.

BIBLE Did You Know This About Jeremiah?

Jeremiah was a prophet who lived during the time when Jerusalem was destroyed by the Babylonians in 586 BC. He was known as the "Weeping Prophet."

Jeremiah was mistreated by just about everybody, even his own people. The chief governor of the temple had Jeremiah beaten and put in the stocks (Jeremiah 20:1-2). His countrymen tried to have him executed (Jeremiah 26). Jehoiakim burned the scroll that Jeremiah sent him (Jeremiah 36). He was thrown into a cistern and left to die (Jeremiah 38). He was accused of telling lies to those who consulted him (Jeremiah 43:2).

One of the key passages in Jeremiah includes the promise of a new covenant (Jeremiah 33:31-33). — Matt Clifton
