



Path Determines Destination

God created us as free moral agents. We choose the path we take in life, for good or for ill. While most of us relish our freedom, the down side is that we must take responsibility for the choices we make. I like the way Joe Fitch put it: "When you choose the road, you also necessarily include the destination."

Most people give little or no consideration to the destination when selecting their path. Immediate gratification clouds our thinking. How much thought do you suppose the Israelites gave to their destination when they started down the path of idolatry and immorality? Even when the prophets warned them of captivity in Assyria and Babylon, the people scoffed. When it finally happened, God's people found themselves being marched off to foreign lands with nobody to blame but themselves. They had unwittingly chosen their destination when they selected their path.

God had set before His people a clear choice: obey and live, or rebel and die. Through Moses, God pleaded with Israel: "I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing; therefore, choose life..." (Deuteronomy 30:19). ***Continues on Page 2...***

Unfortunately, the people evidently thought they could walk the wrong path, but still arrive at their desired destination. It did not work then, nor will it work today!

Actions have consequences; causes produce effects. Sin results in eternal spiritual death (Romans 6:23). No one in his right mind would choose to go to Hell. Yet multitudes make that very choice by selecting the broad, easy way that leads to destruction.

Question: Do you want to suffer eternally in the lake that bums with fire and brimstone? What sane person would answer, “Oh, yes, definitely!”? Instead, we instinctively want to live forever. However, most people reject the narrow, difficult path that leads to eternal life; and in doing so, we reject the destination we claim to seek.


Just before Jesus was crucified, He told His apostles, “And where I go you know, and the way you know” (John 14:4). When Thomas objected that they knew neither where He was going nor the way, Jesus responded: “I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me” (14:6). When we choose to follow Jesus, we choose the destination to which He leads (Heaven). Opting to walk some other path involves rejecting that beautiful home of the soul. Unintentional rejection, perhaps, but rejection nonetheless. What destination do you want? Have you chosen the path that leads to it?





The best thing we can do in response to the Ferguson decision is to let the world see him living in us (Col. 1:27). —<i>Eddie Parrish</i></p>			<div><h3><i>A Judgment Worse Than The Flood Looms!</i></h3><p>“And God saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth... ” (Gen. 6:5).</p><p>Before moving in judgment against the most evil and corrupt society in history, God commanded Noah to build an ark. It soon became a symbol of life and salvation to the few who believed God. Even though they refused to accept it, for those who disbelieved it represented impending death and judgment. Peter described Noah during the time he was building the ark, calling him “a preacher of righteousness” (2 Pet. 2:5). Every board he cut and nail he drove was an illustration of the urgency of his message.</p><p>God’s warning was stern, His message horrifying. But His patience and mercy prevailed for 120 years, for Scripture says, “... the longsuffering of God waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing (being built)” (1 Pet. 3:20). Though mercifully warned, the whole world scoffed and died.</p><p>A tragedy as great as the flood judgment is that man’s attitude toward God is still the same as back then. Jesus said, “The coming of the Son of Man will be just like the days of Noah... before the flood they were eating and drinking... marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noah entered the ark, and they did not understand until the flood came and took them all away, so shall the coming of the Son of Man be” (Matt. 24:37-39).</p><p>Like Noah, you are to preach righteousness to an evil and perverse generation by your works and your life. A judgment worse than the flood looms in the future. Be faithful to do that even if folks don’t want to listen. Sometimes you ‘ll encounter people who scoff at God’s judgment and mock your Christian life. Don’t be discouraged. Pray for them and be available to serve them and teach them whenever possible. Some will listen, even if it’s only eight souls.</p><p>—<i>Michael Gilbert</i></p></div>

Jesus Solves Problems

As I watched my television recently and saw people making accusations of racism and injustice, setting fire to police cars, breaking windows, and stealing from unprotected stores, one thought kept coming to mind: this country needs Jesus.

If you have followed the Ferguson case at all, you probably have an opinion about it. So do I. But whether you think Michael Brown was murdered in cold blood, or whether you think Officer Darren Wilson used deadly force in defense of his own life, there is one underlying fact that cannot be ignored: The answer to whatever it is that ails this country is Jesus Christ.

If the problem is racism, the answer is Jesus (Galatians 3:28). If the problem is injustice, the answer is Jesus (John 7:24). If the problem is murder, the answer is Jesus (Matt. 5:21-22). If the problem is looting, the answer is Jesus (Eph. 4:28). If the problem is the destruction of property, the answer is Jesus (Matthew 7:12). If the problem is fatherless homes and/or poor parenting, the answer is Jesus (Ephesians 6:4). If the problem is personal vengeance, the answer is Jesus (Romans 12:19). If the problem is enemies, the answer is Jesus (Romans 12:20-21; Matthew 5:44-48).

When Jesus is Lord, you don't judge people based on the color of their skin. When Jesus is Lord, you don't steal from others. When Jesus is Lord, you respect the lives and property of others. When Jesus is Lord, you treat others the way you want to be treated. When Jesus is Lord, judgments are made on the basis of righteous principles. When Jesus is Lord, fathers lead godly homes and train their children in the right ways of the Lord. When Jesus is Lord, personal vengeance gives way to peacefulness because God is just and he will right all wrongs one day.
