There were exciting awards presentations, educational exhibits, vendors of many different products, excellent raffles, and beautiful centerpieces at each meal.



HEALING ART PROGRAM - President's Project







fun than merging two of my favorite passions - gardening and reading?


The goal of this program is to promote reading books about gardening, nature, and the environment with our members AND share our love of reading and gardening with youth in our communities.


Carla Kelly's Town & Country Garden Club of Lancaster invited Lisa Doseff, a local garden writer from their community, to speak at a monthly



General Donations Report from NGC

There were three general donations made since October 2024.

Donation Amount - Previously, we required donations in increments of \$68. Donors can now contribute any amount, starting from a minimum of \$50 to as large as \$10,000. This change provides greater flexibility for donors and enables a wider range of participation.

Certificates – As of May 31, 2025, mailed certificates will no longer be provided to donors. To "Go Green," NGC be offering digital certificates that donors can customize and print themselves. We ask that all donors provide their email address (even if donating by check) so that we can send tax receipts electronically and online certificate link/instructions. We assure you that your privacy and personal information will be handled with the utmost care and security.

Donations to Specified Forests – When donating, you may choose to have your donation go where it's needed most or select a National Forest; however, the Forest Service reserves the right to utilize funds based on need. If you specify a National Forest where there is no tree planting need, then the donation may be used for planting trees in another forest. Please Note: individual plantings will not be identified per donor; for example, when donating to a forest, you would be unable to locate a specific tree donated.
