




April 26, 2026, Sunday Morning TOUR TO DRAKE WELL MUSEUM AND PARK "The Valley that Changed the World" 9:00 AM – 2:30 PM A Box Lunch will be served



Drake Well Museum and Park is administered by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission and is actively supported by Friends of Drake Well, Inc., a non-profit, community-based organization. The museum serves as the historical heart of Pennsylvania's Oil Region National Heritage Area and is one of 23 historic sites and museums that make up the Pennsylvania Trails of History.

For over 90 years, Drake Well Museum and Park has preserved and interpreted the site of the Drake Well, chronicling the birth and development of the petroleum industry in Pennsylvania as well as its growth into a global enterprise. Visitors to the museum's 240-acre site enjoy a board-for-board replica of Drake's engine house built around the National Historic Landmark well, an operating central power oil lease, a standard drilling rig, 12,000 square feet of interior exhibits, and the largest artifact and archival collection focused on the birth of the modern petroleum industry. Drake Well Museum and Park also offers an abundance of year-round recreational opportunities, including paved bike trails, delayed harvest fly fishing in Oil Creek, modern picnic facilities, hiking trails, and a neighboring 9,000-acre state park.

THE DARK SIDE OF FIREFLIES:
A STORY OF SEX, POISON, DECEIT & MURDER
Ken R. and Peggy S. Butler



Fireflies (often called lightning bugs) are some of the most beloved and revered insects in the natural world. People often think of them fondly as part of a childhood memory, or romanticize them as magical & peaceful fairylike creatures. While they don't sting or bite humans, or infest and destroy our gardens and vegetation, they do have a dark side that many will find surprising.

This presentation will expose the dark (but glowing) underside of lightning bugs. Why do they glow? Who is good and who is evil? Who can you trust? Who is stalking and preying upon fireflies?

In 2012, through an amazing set of circumstances, Ken and Peggy Butler found themselves immersed in the world of fireflies. The discovery of Synchronous Fireflies at their home in Kellettville in the Allegheny National Forest, inspired them to share this wonder of nature with others. They are the co-founders of the PA Firefly Festival Inc. with a mission to educate both children and adults about environmental change and the emerging threats to all firefly habitats.

The Butlers are avid conservationists, love to flyfish, bird watch, and promote and protect the beauty and wildness of Forest County. They are now committed to serving as citizen scientists through conservation and protection of firefly and pollinator habitat including the dark sky environment.

GARDENING IS MURDER – Neal Sanders



This is a 'husband's point of view' of gardening. It is filled with humor and insight from someone who gardens less from an abiding love of horticulture than for the love of a spouse. Good horticultural advice is dispensed; bad advice is debunked. You will leave with a better appreciation of what is going on in the mind of your helpmates. The talk is adapted from my widely read blog, 'The Principal Undergardener.'

Some of the topics covered will include:

- Why it is impossible to do just one thing in the garden
- Why so much gardening information on the internet is awful
- Why you should never compute the value of your labor in gardening
- Evidence that the wildlife in your garden have never seen a Disney film
- Why it requires digging three holes to plant something
- And much more...

Back in 2005, I helped sell the company that had been my long-time employer. When the sale was done, I had two 'sensible' offers that would have kept me in the corporate world. To make a long story short, neither option appealed.

There was something else I wanted to do, something that had been on my mind for a couple of decades: I wanted to see if I could write fiction. Not the Great American Novel. Not poetry. Not some thinly disguised autobiographical cathartic work. I wanted to see if I could tell a rousing good story using believable characters people would root for. I wanted to write stories with satisfying conclusions that sprinkled enough clues about the outcome throughout the story to make a reader say, 'Why didn't I see that coming?' Oh, and I wanted to write stuff that people would actually go out and buy. In short, I wanted to write mysteries, suspense, and thrillers.

Since then, I've published 15 books. Apart from being mysteries, what they all have in common is that their central characters are strong, independent women. Some of these women solve crimes. Some commit them. But they're all memorable.

THE INVASIVE SPECIES LIVING NEXT DOOR Dr. Joshua Searle-White



On Monday evening, Dr. Joshua Searle-White, Professor Emeritus from Allegheny College, will discuss his recent research on invasive species. His team has recently identified, for the first time, a virulent plant-borne pathogen that produces unusual effects in humans. His neverbefore-seen presentation will challenge the preconceptions of even the most educated gardeners and will, he hopes, spread his passion for ridding the world (at least in his neighborhood) of invasive plants and animals.

In addition to teaching for over 30 years at Allegheny College in Meadville, Pennsylvania, Dr Searle-White has been active in the community, sharing his interests and hobbies. He is an accomplished musician playing bass guitar with various popular bands over the years. In addition, he is an author of children's stories and a playwright. He is currently president of the Meadville Community Theater and on the boards of several Meadville non-profits.

His horticultural study of invasive plants has led him and his team on travels throughout Western Pennsylvania and beyond. His discovery has attracted widespread interest, the results of which will be presented here for the first time. It is a not-to-be-missed program.

In May 2025 he was honored again to create floral designs for the personal residence of Pope Leo XIV on the day of his installation.

In 2017 Tim was presented with the AIFD Award for Distinguished Service to the Floral Industry. In 2023 he was honored with the Award of Distinguished Service to AIFD and the Tommy Bright Award for Floral Presentations by the Society of American Florists. Tim has taught floral design in 49 of the 50 states in the US and on 6 of the 7 continents, and is thrilled to share his creations with you!

D3: THE HEMLOCK WOOLLY ADELGID: A TINY PEST Stephen Laskowski



This program will introduce you to HWA, signs and symptoms of infestation, and the ecological consequences of hemlock loss. Eastern Hemlocks are one of Pennsylvania's most important trees, providing year-round shade for cold water streams, wildlife habitat, and a defining character of our forests. Pennsylvania faces a serious threat from the Hemlock Woolly

Adelgid (HWA) – a small invasive insect that causes tree decline and mortality.

Stephen Laskowski is a Service Forester with Pennsylvania DCNR Bureau of Forestry in Erie County. He offers information and advice to private landowners and managers of rural and community forests in the practice of sustainable forest management. He has a BS in Forest Management from Penn State University and 14 years of horticultural experience. A life-long resident of Erie County, he resides in Waterford, PA, with his wife, four children, and a chocolate lab.

Lake Erie often offers a peaceful, sometimes mysterious, beautiful setting—so when the opportunity arises, hop on a boat, relax, and make the most of the day. Bring along a great book—perhaps a mystery set in a garden—and enjoy some quiet reading time on the water.

Your Challenge:

Build a boat using all types of recycled/repurposed materials, dried flowers, glass, stones, wood or metal.

Specifications:

Dimensions: No larger than 15" by 15" mounting surface. Height no

taller than 18".

Weight: Less than 20 pounds including mounting surface.

Materials: Any type of repurposed material (plastic, wood, metal,

glass and stone) may be used. As much as 20% of the design may be paint and glue, and remember to use

dried flowers, not fresh.

Each entry should include a 3" x 5" card.

Front: Title of entry and list of materials.

Back: District, Garden Club, designer(s) name(s), and mailing

address.

Entry may be the work of more than one person.

Only One Entry from Each District

Selection method is determined by the District.

District entries must be submitted at the convention by Sunday, April 26,

from 1-5 p.m. Judging is at 5:15 p.m.

Not to be judged under the same standards as a flower show.

SCALE OF POINTS FOR JUDGING

Conformance (height, width, weight)	20 points
Artistic Concept (creative use of recycled materials)	50 points
Expression (interpretation of theme)	20 points
Execution (workmanship)	10 points
TOTAL	100 points
