


Historical Site Preservation Award

Why Native Groundcovers?

- Suited to local soil and climate, and more apt to thrive in local conditions
- Help stabilize and improve the soil, and reduce water runoff; many native plants have deep roots that can draw up minerals from lower soil horizons
- Support ecological services and provide habitat for native insects, amphibians, birds, mammals with whom they have evolved over millennia
- Provide nectar and pollen for pollinators
- Serve as host plants for bees, moths, butterflies and other beneficials
- They can help us reduce the amount of lawn in our landscapes

September Activities

Flower Pounding

Did you know that you can transfer the color from flowers and even leaves onto fabric by beating them with a hammer? Flower Pounding, gardener's stress relief or dyeing with your garden's bounty? Ah, perhaps a bit of both. The natural pigments pounded into properly prepared fabric can make a lovely piece of art, and allow you to let off a little steam at the same time.

To begin you need to have a piece of fabric that has been prepared for dyeing, as this is simply a method of natural dyeing. 100% cotton works best. You can either buy fabric already prepared for dyeing at most fabric stores - 100% cotton - or you can prepare any cotton fabric you have by the following method:

Wash fabric in hot water using your regular detergent and two tablespoons of washing soda. Run the rinse cycle two or three times to remove all the washing soda.

Place the fabric in a large bucket. Add **two cups of hot** water and 1/4 cup of alum for each yard of fabric. You may need to add a little more hot water. Stir until the alum dissolves and let stand until cool.

In a separate cup mix ½ cup hot water with 1 teaspoon of washing soda for each yard of fabric, mix into water holding fabric - this will fizz a bit. Let stand overnight, rinse and spin, hang out to dry. Iron while still damp for best results.

Materials Needed:

• Variety of Fresh Flowers and Leaves'

Best Flowers for Flower Pounding

Daisies

Dandelions

Geranium petals or leaves

Lantana

Marigolds

Pansies

Petunias

Pentas

Plumbago

Rose petals

Not all flowers are suitable for pounding. Flowers with particularly thick petals such as tulips don't work well as they tend to smear. Flowers with many petals such as roses need to be take apart so that you can pound the petals individually. Daisy like blooms need to have their centers removed and all flowers need to have stems, calyxes, pistils and stamens removed. White flowers don't work as they have no pigment to impart to the fabric.

The best time to pick the flowers is after the dew has dried, but before the heat of the day. New blooms have more color than older.

You can also use leaves, and newer leaves pound much better than older, although as they age, you get the veins and edges and that can be interesting. Autumn leaves will pound out interestingly, the colors being old, but newly released from the covering of chlorophyll.


- Prepared white, cotton fabric (muslin works well)
- Wax Paper
- Masking Tape
- Hammer
- Wooden cutting board

Instructions:

It is best to work on a hard surface. Cover your work surface with wax paper. Use masking tape to hold your wax paper in place. Start out by arranging the flowers and/or leaves onto the wax paper in whatever design you want them to appear on their fabric. You can also just lay out one flower or leaf at a time.

Carefully lay the fabric over the flowers and/or leaves. Use masking tape on the edges to hold the fabric in place. Gently pound on the fabric over the flowers and/or leaves and see the flower colors bleed through onto the fabric. Continue to pound the flowers and leaves until you get the desired results. Set your fabric aside to dry completely or iron on both sides for two to five minutes with a hot iron (cotton setting) to set the pigments using a paper towel over surface so as to avoid ruining your iron. At this point, you'll find that the paler pinks are fading fast and that some of the yellows have pretty much disappeared. The easy solution is to pretend that you meant for that to happen, or you can use colored pencils or fine Sharpie to outline and add some subtle highlights. Make sure you iron again after you use the colored pencil so that the fabric will open up to accept that pigment.

You can use the fabric to make pillows, frame it to make pictures, make several to use in a quilt, or even applique it onto a shirt or other fabric item. You can also use this technique to transfer color to paper. Make unique stationary, invitations, book marks, and much more. Hand wash only if necessary!

2026 Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl Poster Contest INFORMATION

Hosted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service and the National Garden Clubs, Inc., this contest is an opportunity for local garden clubs to connect with their communities and may be used to promote their local or State garden club, attract children and their parents, and raise awareness of the importance of caring for the environment and preventing wildfires.

- Only children from first through fifth grade can participate. You can reach out to schools, scout troops, after school programs, youth programs, and similar groups.
- Students should be reminded to check spelling as posters with spelling errors will be disqualified.
- The following information must be written on the back of each poster: The student's name, grade level, garden club name, garden club contact name address, phone number, school, teacher's name, school name, parent or guardian name and address, phone number and email. (Should school policy preclude giving students' addresses and phone numbers, please include the school address and phone number.)
- Or use the free downloadable label found at www.symbols.gov/ngc-poster-contest.
- Local garden club coordinators for the Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl Poster Contest should contact their State or regional poster chairman to get the promotional package. You can also download the promotional package from the National Garden Clubs, Inc., website, www.gardenclubs.org or from www.symbols.gov/ngc-poster-contest.
- Every participating child should receive a certificate of participation. Certificates can be ordered for free at www.symbols.gov/ngc-poster-contest.
- Local and State Garden clubs' poster coordinators are encouraged to organize recognition ceremonies.
- If there is a Forest Service office nearby, they can help facilitate the presence of Smokey Bear or Woodsy Owl at your recognition ceremony. You can find your nearest Forest Service office by visiting www.fs.usda.gov.
- We encourage participants and/or local, State, and regional chairpersons to make copies of the posters before submission.
- The five posters that compete for the national grand prize become property of the Forest Service. They ARE NOT returned to participants.
