I want to advise club award chairs and club officers that the time to submit nominations for this year's Exceptional Horticulturist award will be soon upon us. This is a non-competitive award that is given at each district's September District meeting. The nominations for this award are to be submitted by August 1 to JoAnn Celaschi, Horticulture Coordinator.

The qualifications for this award are as follows:

Experience: The candidate should grow numerous types of plants, trees, shrubs, annuals, perennials, and houseplants and be able to discuss how best to grow them.

Education: The candidate should have attended one of the schools provided by the National Garden Club program, **but this is not a requirement.** However, the candidate should be familiar with the schools and programs of the NGC, flower and gardening catalogs, and horticulture magazines and other sources of horticulture information.

Sharing: The candidate should share their knowledge and experiences with plants with friends, garden club members as well as civic organizations. The candidate should have served club and community when called upon and should be able to represent the GCFP as a knowledgeable source of horticulture information.

There is no separate application to submit to nominate a member for this award but rather a description of the candidate's qualifications for the award should be sent in writing either by snail mail to JoAnn Celaschi, 1216 Lookout Ave., Charleroi, PA 15022-2028, or by e-mail to celaschi@hotmail.com. Photographs are not required.

Birds, Butterflies and Conservation Committee

Remember Jiminy Cricket? Well, I'm here to be your Jiminy Cricket today: to remind you of what you already know and to be your conscience. And today, we're talking about plastics.

We've all seen and been moved by those horrible pictures of dying wildlife caught in a web of plastic netting, which is heartbreaking. But did you know that in addition to the plastics and microplastics found swirling throughout our rivers and oceans, we humans have microplastics pulsing through our veins? It's in our lungs and our bowels. We can't see it, and we can't feel it, but it is there. It is there in the water we drink, the food we eat, and in the very air that we breathe. Even breastmilk has been found to have microplastics in it. We don't know, yet, what it's doing to us, but we know we have plastic in our flesh.

The whole subject of microplastics has a nightmarish quality because we understand it to be a symptom of a deeper issue: that the unthinkable harm we have done to the planet, as Consumers, is being visited upon our own bodies. When we look at the decomposing bodies of those trash-filled birds, we know that we are looking not just at what we are doing to the world, but also at what our damaged world is doing to us.

Do you remember the 5 R's of recycling? The 5 R's are: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repurpose, and then, finally... Recycle.

- Refuse <u>plastic bags</u> at stores and <u>carry your own</u>. Refuse straws and nasty Styrofoam <u>take-out</u> <u>containers</u> at restaurants and carry your own. Refuse to buy excessively wrapped items.
- Reduce your kitchen waste and start composting. Buy less junk you don't need.
- Reuse your own drink containers instead of single use plastic bottles that litter our land and waterways and form particulates in the air. Store snacks and leftovers in reusable containers.
- **Repurpose** (or upcycle) newspaper under mulch. Use jam jars to hold many things. Repair things that can be salvaged.
- Recycle as a last resort.

Blue Star Marker Program

The Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania (GCFP) has long been requesting that a Blue Star marker be placed at the Pennsylvania Welcome Center on I-70 at Claysville. At the March District X Board meeting, Martha Washington Garden Club officers Kathy Wells and Susan DeLost, President and First Vice President, accepted Co-Chairmanship of the Blue Star Marker Program Committee, and the Board voted to budget the money necessary to purchase and install the marker.

On April 26, co-chairs Kathy Wells and Susan DeLost visited the Welcome Center and spoke to PennDOT Travel Coordinator Barbara Mitchell. We discussed the program and the GCFP District X leadership's intention to fully fund the project. Barbara informed us that PennDOT would bear the costs

of the installation of the marker and maintenance of the grounds, pending PennDOT's approval of the project.

At Barbara's request, we emailed PennDOT a letter to formalize our request for permission to install a marker. We included an invitation to attend the May 21 meeting of the Martha Washington Garden Club, when Karen Faust, GCFP Chair for the Blue Star Marker Program was scheduled to speak. As a result of the letter, Mike Maurer, PennDOT District 12 Roadside Specialist, informed Kathy Wells that he would attend the May 21 Martha Washington Garden Club meeting.

The May 21 meeting was well attended by members as well as representatives from the Giant Oaks Garden Club and the representatives from PennDOT. Karen Faust's presentation included the background of the Blue Star Marker Program and the process of applying for a marker. She was able to confirm that, due to the lengthy process of individually casting each marker, we need to make application soon in order to have the marker completed and delivered in early 2025. This delivery date would be necessary in order to allow time for installation of the marker. Several options for the installation were discussed with the PennDOT representatives using photos provided by Kathy Wells. It was agreed that the marker would be installed on a 10-foot pole, with the bottom of the marker being 7 feet off the ground for safety reasons. The location will be in full view of all visitors as they pass the flagpole. PennDOT representatives also confirmed that they will take care of the entire installation, including accepting delivery and storing the marker prior to installation.

A tentative date of the Saturday of Memorial Day weekend 2025 was selected for a dedication ceremony. Details of the ceremony will be confirmed at a later date once the marker is received.
