
Carol Heilig was selected as the recipient of this district award which recognizes long- standing members who make our organization special because of their club dedication and club community service.

Penn State Pollinator Friendly Garden Program

Did you know that pollinators are necessary for 80% of all plants and 90% of all flowering plants? Providing a native wildflower-rich habitat is the most significant action you can take to support native pollinators. Penn State offers Pollinator Friendly Garden Certification for residents of Pennsylvania. To be designated as a pollinator friendly garden you must complete an application that includes a detailed list of native trees, shrubs, as well as perennials that bloom in each season. The plantings should be on the property for at least one year before applying.


