<u>Talk description</u> Marcy will explain the correct way to can showing the difference between a pressure canner and hot water bath. There are no short cuts in canning and everything needs to be processed in canning jars with 2-piece lids. She has had some years of over 1,000 jars canned from jams, jellies and pickled jars to meats and salmon. Keeping current with updated USDA approved books and info is the best way to can the safe way.

Bio Marcy Cunkelman is a member of Evergreen GC, Dist VI and GCFP Birds and Butterflies Chair. She has done programs on Birds and Butterflies for many groups and Garden Clubs and workshops for the GCFP and CAR-SGC. She was the Keystone Gardener editor for 12 years and has done many convention program booklets for GCFP, CAR-SGC and the 2018 NGC booklet, which is now used by NGC to format a booklet. With many different hats, Marcy also wears an apron as a Penn State Extension Master Food Preserver, answering canning questions thru out the year and did workshops on the "safe way to can." In 2000, she won Best of Show in canning at the PA Farm Show in Harrisburg. A bucket list item checked off. She is married to Dan with a total care adult daughter, Dana Lee. A2 - Rachel Carson's Gifts and Legacy <u>Title</u> Director, Rachel Carson Homestead

<u>Program Title</u> Rachel Carson's Gifts and Legacy: the Sense of Wonder and Environmental Ethic



<u>Talk Description</u> The sixth sense – a sense of wonder at the natural world. Rachel joked that she wished she could copyright the word "wonder." A most used phrase is "wonder and humility," including urging us to temper our gain of technical knowledge with wonder and humility. It's at the core of her ethic, and how she encouraged teaching children, and the conversion of environmentalists. It's the fundamental part of the mission of the RCHA.

Rachel's contributions to our understanding of the Web of Life, its interactions, and interdependence were delivered to an international audience of not only scientists, but ordinary people. Before "environment" had its current meaning and "ecology" became "eco-" everything, Rachel delivered the message. Her contributions included recognizing unknowns, including the persistence of chemicals, undiscovered drug and chemical interactions, unintended consequences, using Americans' rights to drive engagement and challenge the presumption of safety – and, of course, the benefits of wonder and awe at nature. Rachel Carson's words have current and lasting importance as we continue to make ethical choices and live with their consequences.

<u>Bio</u> During her high school years, Jeanne was introduced to Rachel Carson's writings by nature study teachers and environmentalist mentors who formed the RCHA (Rachel Carson Homestead Association) to preserve the Carson Homestead as part of Rachel's legacy. With decades of professional experience in technical and business systems, Jeanne completed Master degrees in Public Management from CMU's Heinz College and in Law from the School of Law at the University of Pittsburgh. Jeanne also served on local nonprofit boards as a member director and project producer. This background proves beneficial at RCHA, which Jeanne has been guiding since 2013.

<u>Program Title</u> From Black to Green: The Story of Pittsburgh Botanic Garden

<u>Program Description</u> Learn the story behind both the land and the organization that make up Pittsburgh Botanic Garden. Hear how a group of dedicated gardeners hatched an idea for a botanical garden in Pittsburgh and the efforts undertaken by many hands to create a rich community asset. The history of the Garden highlights the environmental reclamation work required to move from land used for logging, farming, shaft- and strip-mining to land that provides beautiful gardens, environment-based activities, and education programs for all ages in horticulture, ecology, art, health & wellness and hands-on exploration.

Bio Mark A. Miller is the Education Director for Pittsburgh Botanic Garden. He completed a B.S. in Horticulture, an M.S. in Agricultural Education, and a Ph.D. in Environment & Natural Resources at The Ohio State University, with a one-year Post-Doctoral research position, Mark has enjoyed a long and varied work history: 40 years as a landscape designer in Ohio, DC, and San Antonio; tree crop specialist and educator in the US Peace Corps; vocational horticulture instructor at the Ohio Reformatory for Women; program associate for the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service; Director of Horticulture/Co-Director of Education for the American Horticultural Society (AHS) and later Deputy Director of National Programs for AHS; seven years as Content Director for the gardening websites: www.learn2grow.com and www.growums.com and seven years as Outreach Education Manager at Franklin Park Conservatory & Botanical Gardens in Columbus, Ohio. His current position allows him to create and manage education programs and garden-wide interpretation, oversee volunteer coordination, present horticultural and environmental classes, assist with development and installation of new gardens and buildings, and manage artist exhibitions in the new Welcome Center. Mark has served as a consultant and evaluator on a variety of projects and has authored, co-authored, edited or contributed to a number of published works

Title Director of Adult Education and Community Outreach, Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens

Program Title Supporting More Native, Diverse and Productive Home Landscapes

Talk Description Our home landscapes have the potential to be so much more vibrant than the current standard. Through a variety of education and outreach programs, Phipps is helping our region's gardeners reimagine their backyard as rich, healthy landscapes for them and the ecological community.

Bio Gabe Tilove is the director of adult education and community outreach for Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens, where he works to connect people more closely to the beauty of the natural world through education and outreach. Gabe directs 250+ classes annually on topics ranging from sustainable horticulture and native plant landscapes to botanical art, floral design, and culinary arts. In 2013, Gabe helped launch Phipps Homegrown program, and edible garden outreach program installing raised bed gardens for food insecure families. Over 350 backyard gardens have been installed to date.

B3- Native Landscaping is for the Birds (and the Bees and Butterflies!)



Name Bob Mulvihill

Title Ornithologist, National Aviary

<u>Program Title</u> Native Landscaping is for the Birds (and for the Bees and Butterflies!)

<u>Talk Description</u> Native landscaping is for the birds (and for the bees and butterflies!)—Importantly, if you increase the attractiveness of your yard to these three B's you will make it better (i.e., healthier) not only for them, but also for you—and for the planet, too! Many people have a yard dominated by a monoculture of close-cropped lawn, which they spend a lot of time, energy, water, and synthetic chemicals to maintain in this unnatural condition. This program will encourage you to think of your lawn as a blank canvas upon which you can paint (i.e., plant) a native habitat masterpiece that not only is beautiful, but also supports of a brilliant diversity of birds, butterflies and other beneficial insects and wildlife.


Bio Bob Mulvihill, the National Aviary's Ornithologist, grew up in Squirrel Hill and has been an active member of the birding and bird conservation community in western Pennsylvania for more than forty years. He has a B.S. in Education from the University of Pittsburgh and a Master's in Biology from Indiana University of PA. He began his ornithological career at Powdermill Nature Reserve, the biological field station of the Carnegie Museum of Natural History, where he worked at the world-renowned Powdermill bird-banding station. During his 30-year tenure there, Bob banded more than two hundred thousand birds and conducted in-depth long-term field research on Dark-eyed Junco, Rubythroated Hummingbird, and Louisiana Waterthrush. He has authored more than three dozen scientific articles, including several related to the effects of climate change and local environmental stressors on birds. He has served for more than a decade on the Ornithological Technical Committee of the Pennsylvania Biological Survey. He has co-edited volumes on the conservation of Pennsylvania birds, written dozens of popular articles about birds and nature, and given hundreds of talks in the U.S., Canada, Mexico, and the United Kingdom. Bob served as a regional coordinator for the first Atlas of Breeding Birds in Pennsylvania from 1983-1989; he was the statewide project coordinator and co-editor of the Second Atlas of Breeding Birds in Pennsylvania from 2004-2010. In 2013, shortly after he arrived at the National Aviary, Mulvihill brought Neighborhood Nestwatch, a citizenscience project developed by the Smithsonian Institution, to backyard birdlovers in the Greater Pittsburgh area. He also brought Project Owlnet, a collaborative continent-wide study monitoring the migrations of Northern Saw-whet Owls, to Pittsburgh—banding owls three nights a week at a popular urban park in spring and fall. Bob has received awards in recognition of his research and education efforts to promote bird conservation from the Audubon Society of Western Pennsylvania and the Pennsylvania Society for Ornithology.

Program Title Creating linkages and connecting to Schools with gardeners

<u>Program description</u> During this presentation we will explore ways to support and or start a school garden in your community. Gardening has many intersections and spans all demographics and ages, we will explore ways that your garden club can support through volunteering, fundraising, mentoring, teaching and even building school gardens. Your club is in a unique position to help advance the School Garden movement and grow the next generation of gardeners in your community. Bio:

<u>Bio</u> Currently serves as Director of School Garden Programs at Grow Pittsburgh. She leads a team of dynamic educators that work with over 40 schools and nearly a dozen Early Childhood centers across the Pittsburgh region. In addition to her role as Director she is on the Chatham University Eden Hall Campus K-12 Programs Advisory Board, The Pittsburgh Food Policy Council Child Nutrition Sub-Committee, and PA Statewide Farm to School Network Policy Working Group. She envisions a day where every child in the region has access to a Garden Based curriculum and learning to grow food is part of the school day.

Adia holds a B.A. in Health Services from the University of Pittsburgh and a M.Ed in Health Education from The Pennsylvania State University. Her background is in public health with many years in Early Childhood leadership. During her time at Grow Pittsburgh she has connected with community partners, expanded the School Garden Network and consulted with many school and Out of School Time programs to support their school garden dreams.

C-2 The Many Facets of Conservation, Restoration and Protection of Ecosystems



Name Rose Marie Muzika, Ph.D.

<u>Title</u> Director of Science, Research and Collections, Carnegie Museum of Natural History

<u>Program Title</u> The Many Facets of Conservation, Restoration and Protection of Ecosystems

<u>Program Description</u> Contemporary concerns about global change and biodiversity loss dominate ecological and environmental sciences and rise to the topic of public concern. The practical approaches to address these issues include conservation practices, restoration activities and preservation of natural systems. This presentation will address some history of these approaches, and successes, losses and consequences of activity geared to address global natural resource crises.

<u>Bio</u> A native of Fayette County, Pennsylvania Muzika graduated from Seton Hill College (as it was known at the time), and took a PhD in Forestry with an emphasis in Ecology and Evolutionary Biology from Michigan State University. She is a recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship (University of Iceland) and a Harvard Fellowship.

Professionally she was employed by the US Forest Service in research in Oregon and West Virginia, and was a Professor at the University of Missouri where she taught courses in Forest Ecology, Forest Health & Protection, Field Ecology, and Botany. She also advised and mentored many graduate students.

At the University of Missouri, she served as Department Chair of Forestry and Associate Director of the School of Natural Resources. She has been with the Carnegie Museum of Natural History since 2018 and is currently Director of Science, Research and Collections, and maintains offices at the Museum in Oakland and at Powdermill Nature Reserve where she has been a research associate since 1995. Research topics over her career include fire ecology, disturbance ecology, forest insects, diseases.

C-3 A History of Garden Design in the United States and How This Garden Heritage May Guide Future Design

<u>Title</u> Landscape Architecture Adjunct Professor, Penn State University

<u>Program Title</u> A History of Garden Design in the United States and How This Garden Heritage May Guide Future Design

<u>Program Description</u> Beginning with the gardens and landscapes designed and managed by indigenous peoples and continuing through those introduced from Europe during colonialization, this session will initially explore how the variety of styles were developed or modified to be successful in the environmental conditions of the builders. Both agricultural and aesthetic gardens will also be examined in the context of the specific society using some places that are typical yet not well known. A brief description of styles that have been introduced in modern times will follow and lead to a proposal of concepts that will illustrate the potential for design in the future.

<u>Bio</u> Joshua has taught landscape design history, garden design, planting design, and plant identification courses at several universities and institutions in western and central PA for over a decade. Having degrees in landscape architecture and education, he enjoys sharing his passion for plants, gardens, and landscapes with others as much as he enjoys digging around in his plant collector's garden. Joshua has presented lectures at local organizations as well as at national conferences. He also has provided consultations and designs for private and community garden projects. During the winter months he designs the sets for a local high school's musical theater productions.
