In 1923, Mr. Jay V. Hare, Secretary of the Reading Railroad, persuaded a number of his friends and associates to join him in putting on a flower show in the village of Trevose where he had his home. At that time, Lower Bucks County was real countryside with wide vistas of rolling green acres. In these surroundings, Jay Hare found his avocation in the pursuit of horticulture, as did his neighbors; Mr. Garrett V. Clark, an executive with the Buchanan Printing Company of Philadelphia, and Mr. Charles S. Randall, an outstanding grower of dahlias and other flowers. For the next 18 years these three men led the fledgling Trevose Horticultural Society (THS) in Pennsylvania. We now find ourselves celebrating our 100th birthday! We have had a flower show every year since 1923 with only two exceptions - World War II and the pandemic! What an amazing accomplishment. We are so happy that you have chosen to celebrate this milestone with us!

There are nearly 200,000 men and women of all ages and backgrounds across the United States who can attest that the rewards of belonging to a garden club go far beyond the pure pleasure of growing things. While joining a local garden club is definitely a great way to "green" your thumb, membership also provides an opportunity to expand your interests and build lifelong friendships while bettering your community and the environment.

### In Memoriam

The Trevose Horticultural Society dedicates our 100th 2023 Flower Show in memory of the many devoted gardeners and loyal friends of THS.

### **GENERAL RULES AND INFORMATION**

- All members and non-members are invited to exhibit in this Small Standard Flower Show.
- This Flower Show conforms to the standards established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). The Handbook for Flower Shows (HB) 2017 Edition, with revisions printed in the National Gardener Magazine is the authority for all issues not covered by the Schedule, which is the law of the Show.
- Entry cards are available May 21 from the Entries Chairman, Karen Wychock, 215-460-8853. An example of how to fill out an Entry Card is described on page 27 of the schedule. Cards should be filled before show time.
- 4. Entries will be received on Thursday evening, August 17, 2023 from 6 to 8 PM, and Friday morning, August 18 from 8 to 10 AM.
- 5. All exhibits must remain in place until the end of the show. All exhibits must be removed between 4:30 and 5:00 PM on Saturday. August 19, 2023.
- 6. Judging begins at 1 PM, Friday, August 18. Show will open at completion of judging.
- 7. The Classification Chairmen for each division check exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges' responsibility.
- 8. The General Chairman and the Classification Chairmen for each division are available during judging for possible consultations. They, along with the judges and clerks, are the only personnel allowed on the floor during judging.
- The decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited.
- 10. There must be an emphasis on FRESH plant material. No artificial plant material is permitted in any exhibit in any division.
- 11. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class, except in the Horticulture Division and the Botanical Arts Horticulture Section.
- 12. The Trevose Horticultural Society will strive to assure the safety of all items after arrival and placement, but is not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
- Each entry must have an entry card and be passed by the Classification and Placement Committees before the exhibitor leaves the show room.
- 14. Plants on the State Conservation list and noxious plants may not be entered in any class in the Horticulture Division.

### **AWARDS**

#### NATIONAL GARDEN CLUB AWARDS

### NGC Standard System of Awarding is used in all divisions

Only one (1) first-place (blue) ribbon/class or subclass; must score 90 points or more Only one (1) second-place (red) ribbon/class or subclass; must score 85 points or more Only one (1) third-place (yellow) ribbon/class or subclass; must score 80 points or more One (1 or more) Honorable Mention (white) ribbons as merited; must score 75 pts or more

### AWARD OF HORTICULTURAL EXCELLENCE (1)

Offered to the highest blue ribbon winner and correctly named exhibit in the entire Horticulture Division, Sections A through M, Classes 1 to 109. Rosette of green, orange and blue ribbons.

### **GROWER'S CHOICE AWARDS (3)**

Offered to the most outstanding named container grown specimen/s, one each for flowering, foliage and combination plantings, scoring 95 or above in Division I: Horticulture, Sections I, J, K, Classes 69 to 85. Rosette of hunter green ribbons.

### **AWARDS OF MERIT (5)**

Offered to a named blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in Division I: Horticulture - Section B, Classes 4 to 32; Section C, Classes 33 to 41; Section D, Classes 42 to 43; Section F, Tubers, Classes 50 to 55; and Section L, Vegetables, Classes 86 to 109. Rosette of orange ribbons.

### **ARBOREAL AWARD (1)**

Offered to the most outstanding named specimen of a tree or shrub scoring 95 or above in Division I: Horticulture, Section H, Classes 61 to 68. Rosette of green ribbons.

### **AWARD OF DESIGN EXCELLENCE (1)**

Offered to the highest scoring exhibit of 95 or above in the entire Division II: Design. Rosette of gold ribbons.

### **DESIGNER'S CHOICE AWARD (1)**

Offered to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in Division II: Design, Section A, Classes 1, 2, 3. Rosette of purple ribbons.

### **EDUCATIONAL TOP EXHIBITOR AWARD (1)**

May be awarded to a non-commercial educational exhibit in Division III: Education, Section A designed to instruct the public in some phase of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. and/or state objectives and scoring 95 or above. Rosette of brown and white ribbons.

### YOUTH TOP EXHIBITOR BOTANICAL ARTS AWARDS (3)

May be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 90 or above in Division IV: Youth/Sponsored Group, Section B, Class 4, a, b, c. Rosette of red, white, blue.

### GARDEN CLUB FEDERATION OF PENNSYLVANIA AWARDS AWARD OF SPECIAL RECOGNITION FOR DESIGN (1)

May be awarded to a blue ribbon winner scoring 95 or above in Division II: Design, Section B, Class 4. Rosette of light brown ribbons.

### **EDUCATIONAL AND/OR CONSERVATION SILVER AWARD (1)**

May be given to an educational exhibit of exceptional quality that is clearly labeled and informative in Special Exhibits, Section E. Need not score 95.

### **STAGING AWARD (1)**

May be given by the judges if the staging of the show scores 90 or above.

#### TREVOSE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY AWARDS

#### **ERICH AND VIRGINIA MEITZNER AWARD**

May be awarded to a Trevose Horticultural Society member who has won the most blue ribbons in Division I: Horticulture, Section F, Dahlia Classes 50 to 56.

#### RACHEL SCHWARZ AWARD

May be awarded to a Trevose Horticultural Society member who has won a blue ribbon in Division V, Botanical Arts, Section D, Class 6.

#### **JOSEPH and JOSIE CARAVAN AWARD**

May be awarded to a Trevose Horticultural Society member who has won a blue ribbon in Division V, Botanical Arts, Section A, Dish Garden, Class 1.

### STELLA MATCZAK AWARD

May be awarded to a Trevose Horticultural Society member who has won the blue ribbon in Division I: Horticulture, Section K, Horticulture Display, Class 85.

#### ARNOLD YOUNG AWARD

May be awarded to a Trevose Horticultural Society member who has won the most blue ribbons in Division I: Horticulture, Sections I, J, K, Container Grown Plants, Classes 69 to 85.

#### TREVOSE AWARD OF APPRECIATION

May be awarded to an Educational Exhibit, Division III: Education, Section A, Classes 1 and 2.

#### SWEEPSTAKES AWARDS

Sweepstakes Awards can only be won by Society Members. All blue ribbons count toward the Sweepstakes Awards. In case of a tie, red ribbons, then yellow ribbons will be considered to break the tie. In the event a tie still exists, co-winners will be declared.

#### DR. ETHEL R. HANKELE TROPHY

May be awarded to a Trevose Horticultural Society member who has won the most blue ribbons in Division I: Horticulture, Classes 1 to 123. Blue ribbons must be won in two or more sections in horticulture.

#### TREVOSE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY TROPHY

May be awarded to a Trevose Horticultural Society member who has won the most blue ribbons in Division II: Design, Classes 1 to 4.

### **DIVISION I: HORTICULTURE RULES**

- 1. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the Handbook of Flower Shows, Chapter 6, exhibiting in the Horticulture Division.
- 2. All exhibits must be **FRESH**. Dried and preserved specimens may be entered in the Botanical Arts Horticulture Division.
- 3. All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 4. Plant material must be in its natural state and may not be altered by application (treatment) of oil, commercial 'shine' products, etc., that change the natural appearance. No wiring of specimens is permitted.
- 5. Only foliage and/or flowers naturally grown and still attached to the specimen are permitted. Unattached foliage is never included with a cut bloom specimen.
- 6. All plant material must have been in the possession of the exhibitor the appropriate number of days listed:
  - a. 90 days for cut specimens (annuals/perennials), bulbs, container-grown plants, vegetables and fruits.
  - b. 6 weeks for combination plantings.
  - c. 6 months for arboreals and troughs.
- 7. The rules for a single species cut or container-grown specimen are listed in the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows or its supplement Horticulture Exhibiting and Judging. 'Container Grown' is a single species of one or more of the same plant grown in a container.
- 8. In order to receive an NGC Top Exhibitor Award, the exhibitor must identify her/his entry by its binomial name or currently acceptable scientific designation. (Consult 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division, Chapter 6.)
- 9. Entry cards are to be filled out in advance if possible. May be typed, written in waterproof ink, labels, or pencil. Refer to the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 6 for a correctly filled out entry tag. An example of how to fill out an Entry Card is also described on page 26 of schedule.
- 10. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line, except for *Gladiolus*.
- 11. If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower, but should be exhibited as foliage plant if they are grown for their leaves.
- 12. Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the 'Any Other Worthy' class.
- 13. The Horticulture Classification Committee Chairman and/or General Show Chairman are free to subdivide classes by color, form, size, cultivar, variety or other distinguishing characteristics.

### **DIVISION I: HORTICULTURE RULES (continued)**

- More than one entry per class may be made by the exhibitor provided each is of a different species, variety, cultivar, type, or color
- 15. Clear containers for cut specimens and 9" paper plates for vegetables are provided unless otherwise noted.
- Pot size is determined by measuring across the inside diameter of the pot.
- 17. Double potting (placing pot having drainage hole inside another, e.g., Jardiniere) is permitted.
- 18. A protective dish or base should be provided by exhibitor for container grown plants.
- 19. Hanging plants are viewed at eye level.
- 20. Specimens should be well groomed. Leaves should be clean with no evidence of damage.
- 21. Wedging (using a small, inconspicuous "plug" in neck of container to prop specimen upright) is permitted. The Club will supply the wedge.
- 22. Collections Classes 44 (Herbs) and 56 (Dahlia) are limited to four entries and require advance registration by August 14, 2023. Each specimen must be displayed within the space allotted in five different clear, unmarked, identical or compatible containers, supplied by exhibitor. All specimens must be labeled/identified with a single chart or individual placards. Judged for cultural merit. Contact Advance Registration Chair Lenis Van Aken, 215-322-4154.
- 23. Class 85 Horticultural Display, requires advance registration by August 14, 2023. All specimens must be labeled/identified with a single chart or individual placards. Space allotted is 30" x 30". Artistic effect is of equal importance to cultural perfection, featured plant specimens must dominate. Staging materials are permitted but used only to enhance materials. Each specimen must be correctly and clearly identified with the current scientific designation and easily identified in the display. The lowest scoring specimen will determine the highest ribbon possible. Classes will be closed when the required number of entries is recorded. - 24. Challenge Classes 110 to 113 seeds may be obtained March 21 from Christine Dopp, 570-474-5484.
- 25. The Scales of Points for Horticulture are located in Chapter 14 of the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows and page 26 of the Schedule.

### **DIVISION II: DESIGN RULES**

- Registration begins <u>Thursday</u>, <u>June 1</u>, after 10AM, and must be registered with the Advance Registration Chair, Lenis Van Aken (215-322-4154). Classes will be closed by <u>August 11</u> or when the required number of entries is recorded.
- The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the 2017 Handbook of Flower Shows, Chapter 7, Exhibiting in the Design Division, NGC Policies and Guidelines.
- 3. The exhibitor is required to conform to the stated description and limitations of the Design Type if named in the class.
- 4. Rules for Design Types, Advanced Design Types, Table Designs and Table Appointments are printed in the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 14.
- 5. The Designer has the freedom to choose Traditional or Creative Style with any Design listed unless restricted by the Schedule.
- Designer is on her/his honor that the design being entered has not been previously entered or previously judged in an NGC Flower Show.
- 7. Exhibitor may enter multiple classes within the Design Division, but only one (1) exhibit per class.
- 8. Design must be the work of and placed by one individual.
- 9. All entries must pre-register with the consultant. If the designer is unable to fulfill the assignment, it is the designer's responsibility to provide a substitute. They must also contact the Design Entries Chairman.
- 10. If the designer is unavailable to transport and/or set up her/his completed design, a substitute person may enter the exhibit for the designer. The designer may still receive exhibiting credit if needed. This is permitted only for completed designs.
- 11. Some plant material must be used in every exhibit. This includes fresh and/or dried plant material. Plant material need not be grown by exhibitor.
- 12. A single flower is not a design. Container-grown plants are fresh plant material and are permitted where appropriate, but they are **never** considered floral designs.
- 13. In an effort to educate the public, plant material used in the design must be listed on a card provided by the exhibitor and included with the entry card. (Botanical and/or common name acceptable).
- When design techniques are required, they must be listed on a card.
- 15. Landscapes, scenes or anything representing an actual item of clothing, person, animal, etc., are not considered acceptable in the Design Division.

- Religious symbols used in a design must be displayed in a respectful manner'
- 17. The following are permitted in all classes.
  - a. Products manufactured from plant material whose natural state has been so altered as to be given a new identity and a specific name, i.e. rope, basket, mat, etc.
  - b. Decorative wood (weathered and/or polished or otherwise treated.)
  - c. Altering the exterior appearance of dried plant material.
  - d. Using absorbing solutions such as glycerin, bleach, etc. on fresh plant material to change the natural dried state.
  - e. Contrived plant material.
  - f. Dried man-made constructed components retaining their recognizable character as plant material (and not used as a container), such as grape vine forms, etc. are consider dried plant material.
  - g. Living plants with roots attached, e.g. leek, bromeliad, moss.
  - h. Plants on state conservation/native plant list, grown by exhibitor
    - or obtained in a legal manner and so marked.
- 18. The following are Not Permitted: Painting, flocking, glittering or dyeing of fresh plant material in any manner, artificial flowers, foliage, fruits, or vegetables, silk, plastic or other imitation plant material, manufactured items simulating plant material (i.e., motorized items, metal cattails, etc.) Refer to 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 7, page 81.
- 19. Classes 1 and 4 will be viewed from the front. Use of a staging panel and underlay is advised. Height, width and depth not to exceed stated class dimensions. Unless otherwise noted, designs are staged on a table top approximately 29" from the floor.
- 20. Class 1, "Victory Garden" is a Still Life Design and is described in the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 15, page 152. A Still Life is an image of an arrangement of mostly inanimate natural objects (such as food, flowers, dead animals, plant, rocks shells, etc.) and/or man-made objects (such as plates, vase, jewelry, etc. Objects are more dominant and more important to the theme than plant material. Plant material may or may not represent a floral design.
- 21. A Creative Design is described in the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 7, page 72.
- 22. The scale of points for design is found in the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 14, page 130 and page 26 of the Schedule.

This made victory gardens a part of daily life on the home front.

Still Life. Creative Style. Designer's choice of plant material/s and other component/s. Staged against a yellow wall. Space allotted is 30" wide x 30" deep. (See Design Rule 20.)

### CLASS 2

### "Time Capsule"

Limited to 6 Entries

A time capsule is a historic cache of goods or information, usually intended as a deliberate method of communication with future people, Time capsules are sometimes created and buried during celebrations such as a world's fair or other ceremonies. The term "time capsule" appears to be a relatively recent coinage dating from 1938. An era in history.

Functional Table Design. A Celebration. Formal setting for two. Name the historic Era of time. Designer's choice of plant materials and other components. Floral design, coverings and appointments supplied by exhibitor. Staged on a card table supplied by exhibitor; table must be draped to the floor. Viewed and judged from all sides.

The future is the time after the past and present. Projection of our planet in the future, in regard to climate change, space exploration, cultures, generations and creative inventions.

Creative Style. Designer's choice of plant material/s and other component/s. Displayed on a 17" square pedestal top; 46" from the floor; height unlimited. Viewed and judged from the front. Staged against a neutral gray wall. Entrant must choose one theme from list provided on first-come basis. A theme may be used only once. (See Design Rule 19.)

### "Kodachrome"

The color rendering of Kodachrome films was unique in color photography for several decades after its introduction. Today the term 'Kodachrome' usually refers to a very colorful object or scene.

Creative Style. Emphasis on color. Designer's choice of plant material/s and other component/s. Staged against a yellow wall. Space allotted is 30" wide x 30" deep.

- 1. Educational Exhibits may be the work of more than one individual or organization unless a Student Judge or an Accredited Judge is seeking exhibiting credit for preparing an education exhibit.
- An exhibit must occupy a minimum of 18 square feet surface area.
   Displayed on a 6' x 30" table; against light grey background. Green colored cloth covering supplied by Club or exhibitor may use covering of their choice.
- 3. Some plant material is encouraged if appropriate to the theme.
- 4. Exhibits are competitive. The Scale of Points for judging are listed in Chapter 14, page 130 of the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows and page 26 of the Schedule.

### "Art Deco"

The 1930's jewelry designers looked to the latest modernistic movement for design inspiration (now called Art Deco). Jewelry trends shifted from simple to extravagant sparkling 1930s jewelry styles in the form of necklaces, pins, earrings, dress clips, buttons, buckles, and bracelets. They were made cheaply with faux materials such as painted glass instead of real pearls or bakelite, a form of plastic, instead of gemstones.

6. Interpretative brooch design. Items must be ready-to wear with fasteners, clasps, etc. as needed. Non-plant material may be used for construction, but must not show. Plant material may not be carved into figural forms; however, such forms may be assembled from plant material. Clipping, cutting or shaping of material is allowed. Composed of only dried material. May include flowers, foliage, seeds, pods, dried vegetables such as peas, beans, corn; nuts, twigs, reeds, grasses, etc. Will be displayed on a black velvet easel provided by the Club on a table top 29" from floor. Refer to NGC 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows, page 95 and page 26 of the Schedule.
