

# Seven Simple Actions to Help Birds

Excerpt from birds.cornell.edu

In 2019, scientists documented North America's staggering loss of nearly 3 billion breeding birds since 1970. Helping birds can be as simple as making changes to everyday habits. Here's our quick list of 7 Simple Actions you can take to help birds.

- 1. Make Windows Safer, Day and Night. On the outside of the window, install screens or break up reflections - using film, paint or other markers spaced uniformly 2 inches apart across the entire surface of the glass.
- 2. Keep Cats Indoors. A solution that's good for cats and birds: Save birds and keep cats healthy by keeping cats indoors or creating an outdoor "catio."
- 3. Reduce Lawn, Plant Natives. Birds have fewer places to safely rest during migration and to raise their young. More than 10 million acres of land in the U.S. were converted to developed land from 1982 to 1997. Add native plants, watch birds come in: Native plants add interest and beauty to your yard and neighborhood, and provide shelter and nesting areas for birds. The nectar, seeds, berries and insects will sustain birds and diverse wildlife.

- 4. Avoid Pesticides. A healthy choice for you, your family, and birds: Reduce pesticides around your home and garden.
- 5. Drink Coffee That's Good For Birds. Three-quarters of the world's coffee farms grow their plants in the sun destroying forests that birds and other wildlife need for food and shelter. Sun grown coffee also often requires using environmentally harmful pesticides and fertilizers. On the other hand, shadegrown coffee preserves a forest canopy that helps birds survive.
- 6. Protect Our Planet from Plastic. Plastics have polluted our oceans and harmed wildlife such as seabirds, whales, and turtles that mistakenly eat plastic or become entangled in it. Avoid single-use plastics including bags, bottles, wraps, and disposable utensils. It's far better to choose reusable items.
- 7. Watch Birds, Share What You See. Enjoy birds while helping science and conservation: Join a project such as eBird, ProjectFeederWatch, Christmas Bird Count, Breeding Bird Survey or the International Shorebird Survey to record your bird observations.



So you want to start a garden.

Find a good location, get basic tools, improve the soil, fertilize, pick your plants (the best part), plan where each one will go, keep id labels, maybe do a raised bed, plant seeds and water.

After several days or weeks of prep, you are tired. Get a good night's sleep. Next morning you awake full of anticipation...
