# **Self-monitoring**

Self-monitoring means paying close attention to how you feel. Everyone should routinely monitor for symptoms of COVID-19. Record your temperature if you feel chills or feverish. You may also need to help children or close contacts who are older or chronically ill to self-monitor.

# **Testing**

A COVID-19 test is recommended when a positive or negative result will inform decisions about treatment or care. Testing is recommended for people with symptoms of COVID-19 and who are:

- hospitalized
- pregnant
- at risk of more severe disease and <u>currently eligible for</u> treatment

# **Long COVID**

If you still have symptoms more than 3 months after your initial illness, you may be experiencing post COVID, or <u>long COVID</u>.
