When people are on there death beds sometimes they tend to say they see there love ones could that be good or bad before they take there last breath?

Answer:

This is a profound and tender question that touches both the **spiritual** and **emotional** realities of death.

When Dying People See Loved Ones — What Does It Mean?

1. A Common Phenomenon at Life's End

Across many cultures and religions, it's not uncommon for dying individuals to report:

- Seeing deceased loved ones
- Speaking to invisible figures
- Describing beautiful places or light
- Reaching out to someone unseen

These moments often occur in the **hours or days** before death. Medical professionals call this the **"deathbed vision"** or **"end-of-life vision."**

2. Is It Good or Bad? Spiritual vs. Medical Perspectives

Medical Explanation:

- The brain, in its final moments, may create vivid hallucinations due to **oxygen deprivation**, **chemical changes**, or medications.
- Yet many doctors and hospice workers note that these visions often **bring peace** and **aren't random or distressing** like typical hallucinations.

Spiritual Explanation:

- Many Christians and believers interpret these moments as:
- A comforting grace from God
- A glimpse of what awaits beyond
- Angels or heavenly beings sent to prepare the soul

Some even view them as God's mercy to assure the dying they are not alone.

Hebrews 1:14 — "Are they not all ministering spirits, sent forth to minister for them who shall be heirs of salvation?"

Could It Ever Be Bad?

In rare cases, people report **frightening visions** before death. This could mean:

- Unresolved spiritual conflict
- **Guilt or fear** over sin
- The enemy trying to sow fear at the end of life

But remember: **Satan is the deceiver**, and **God is the Redeemer**. Even at death's door, a person can still **turn to Christ and find peace**.

What Should We Do or Say?

If you're with someone experiencing this:

- Stay calm, warm, and present
- Ask gentle questions: "Who do you see?" or "Do they bring you peace?"
- If appropriate, **pray aloud**, read Scripture, or play worship music
- Affirm God's love and the hope of resurrection

Romans 8:38–39 — "For I am persuaded that neither death nor life...shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Final Thought: God's Mercy in the Final Moments

God is often closest at the edge of eternity. Whether those visions are spiritual or neurological, if they bring peace, it may be a final **gift of grace**.

Recap: What Many Experience at Death

As shared earlier, many dying individuals report seeing:

- Deceased family members
- Glowing figures
- Angelic voices or heavenly light
- Beautiful, peaceful places

Now, let's examine what **the Bible teaches about death** and how these two realities can fit together—or possibly clash.

What the Bible Teaches About Death

1. Death is a Sleep (Not a Conscious Journey Yet)

The Bible consistently describes death as a **sleep-like state** — a peaceful, unconscious rest.

Ecclesiastes 9:5 – "For the living know that they shall die: but the dead know not any thing..."

Psalm 146:4 – "His breath goeth forth, he returneth to his earth; in that very day his thoughts perish."

John 11:11–14 – Jesus called Lazarus's death "sleep" until He raised him.

This view means that **humans do not ascend to heaven or descend to hell** immediately upon death. Instead, they "sleep" until the **resurrection** at Christ's second coming.

2. Resurrection Is Our Hope, Not Disembodied Life

1 Thessalonians 4:16–17 – "The dead in Christ shall rise first..."

John 5:28–29 – "All that are in the graves shall hear His voice and come forth..."

This places the hope not in **floating in heaven** after death, but in the **bodily resurrection** when Jesus returns.

3. Satan Can Masquerade as an Angel of Light

2 Corinthians 11:14 – "And no marvel; for Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light."

If the dead are unconscious, then any *appearance* of deceased loved ones before death could potentially be:

- A comforting neurological effect, or
- A **spiritual deception**, especially if the message contradicts Scripture

Reconciling Deathbed Visions with Biblical Death

So... how can people see loved ones if the dead "know nothing"?

Three possibilities emerge:

1. God's Grace Through the Dying Brain

Some experiences may be purely neurological, but **God still uses them** to comfort the dying. He can work even through the failing physical body to bring peace in the final moments.

2. Spiritual Comfort Through Angelic Presence

While the dead are asleep, **angels are active** in both life and death.

Hebrews 1:14 – "Are they not all ministering spirits, sent forth to minister for them who shall be heirs of salvation?"

Perhaps God allows some **form of comforting presence** that feels like a loved one, but is in fact a divine messenger.

3. Deceptions in Some Cases

Not every experience is from God. Scripture warns about **lying spirits** (1 Kings 22:22) and deceptive signs, especially in the last days.

Final Takeaway: Walk By Faith, Not Sight

End-of-life visions should never override clear biblical teaching. But we also acknowledge that **God** is **merciful** in the final moments of life. Whether it's through:

- A whispered prayer
- A loved one's presence
- A peaceful "vision"

God often gives **peace to the dying** — not because of mystical powers or afterlife journeys, but because **He is near to those who call on Him**.
