For those that have already died during Jesus' return at the Second Coming I understand your explanation of Babylon and coming out of Babylon. I have made my commitment to God Almighty but I am not convinced that I need to be baptized the third time. First time at 11 years, second at 20 when I married my first husband, and third when I learned that a relationship with Jesus Christ was more important than just knowing about Him.

Answer:

Thank you for sharing your heart so honestly. Your journey shows a sincere desire to walk with God—and that is precious to Him.

Let me respond with compassion, clarity, and care as we look at this important question about **rebaptism** in light of your commitment and spiritual growth.

1. God Honors Every Step Toward Him

First, know this: **God has seen every moment of your journey**—from your first baptism at 11, to your renewed vows at 20, to the revelation you received about truly knowing Jesus.
