Questions About Coming Out of Babylon, the Sabbath, and Baptism

The pastor answered a previous question about "how to come out of Babylon".... through baptism!? Does this mean that any previous baptism is invalid? Is there a video link or study available from the SDA that teach about the other kinds(?) of baptism written in the Word of God?

Spiritual and symbolic baptisms

Baptism of the Holy Spirit: This is described as the Spirit's anointing at the time of salvation, bringing about new life and repentance.

Baptism into Moses: A symbolic baptism of the Israelites through the Red Sea, described in the Old Testament.

Baptism of suffering: Christ's baptism of suffering, where he was "baptized" with suffering, as referenced in Mark 10:38.

Baptism of fire: Mentioned in the context of John the Baptist's prophecy, it refers to the purifying work of the Holy Spirit.

Baptism for the dead: A practice mentioned in the Bible, particularly in 1 Corinthians 15, which has various interpretations today.

Answer:

Great questions — thank you for being so thoughtful and attentive to what the seminar is teaching. Let's unpack the two topics you raised — **baptism** "to come out of Babylon" and **various** "kinds" of baptism — and clarify how they align with the doctrine of the Seventh-day Adventist Church and what is found in Scripture.

1. "Coming out of Babylon" by Baptism

When Pastor Ed Anderson said that "coming out of Babylon" is achieved through baptism, the emphasis is likely on entering a committed relationship with Christ,

symbolized by **water baptism**, which marks one's identification with Jesus, His death, burial and resurrection (Romans 6:3-4).

- SDA official belief states: "Baptism by immersion is the outward sign of repentance, of dying to the old life and rising to a new life in Christ."
- It does **not necessarily mean** that *every previous baptism* is automatically invalid, but rather that one must **personally accept Christ, repent, and be baptized accordingly** in accord with biblical teaching (and sometimes the church's process) to truly stand outside the power of Babylon (Revelation 18:4).
- If someone was baptized previously (in another denomination, or without a clear personal commitment) the church may recommend a "rebaptism" when the person understands the meaning and makes a personal decision, rather than declaring the former baptism always invalid.

So you would want to ask:

- Was your prior baptism by immersion?
- Did you understand it as an expression of faith in Jesus and repentance?
- Are you now making that personal commitment with full understanding?

If yes, then that stands. If no, then the church may encourage baptism now in light of current understanding.

2. "Kinds of Baptism" — Spiritual & Symbolic Elements

You listed several "baptisms": water, Holy Spirit, into Moses, suffering, fire, for the dead. Let's clarify how these are treated in Scripture and by the SDA church.

Recognized by Adventists / Scripture

- Water Baptism: The church emphatically teaches and practices baptism by immersion in water as the public symbol of repentance and new life in Christ.
- **Baptism of the Holy Spirit**: While not always emphasized as a separate "event" in every believer's life by the SDA church, it is agreed that believers receive the Holy Spirit when they accept Christ (Galatians 3:27; John 7:39).

Other "kinds" you mentioned (symbolic or debated)

- **Baptism into Moses**: Paul uses this symbolism: "For our fathers were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea; and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea." (1 Corinthians 10:1-2) It's a metaphor of identification with Moses and the deliverance from Egypt.
- Baptism of Fire / Baptism of the Holy Spirit and Fire: The phrase "baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" (Matthew 3:11) has been interpreted in various ways

(purification, judgment, power). The SDA church doesn't have a standard teaching listing several discrete "fire baptisms" as separate rites.

- **Baptism of Suffering**: The concept finds support in Mark 10:38-39 ("baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with..."). It is more an analogy of sharing Christ's sufferings rather than a literal rite.
- **Baptism for the Dead**: Mentioned in 1 Corinthians 15:29 ("Else what shall they do who are baptized for the dead..."). Its meaning is uncertain, and Adventist teaching does not incorporate it as a practice.

What the SDA Position Emphasizes

- "One Lord, one faith, one baptism" (Ephesians 4:5) is highlighted.
- Baptism is primarily about water immersion and union with Christ (Belief #15).
- Symbolic analogies (like baptism into Moses) are *metaphors* for spiritual truths, not separate rituals.

3. What You Can Do to Study and Prepare

- Visit the official SDA site on *Baptism* (adventist.org) for doctrinal statements.
- Find the "Baptismal Manual / Study Guide" used by the Adventist church for new members and baptismal candidates.
 - Ask your pastor specifically: "Does my prior baptism meet the biblical and denominational criteria?" Be ready to share the mode (immersion), your understanding, and your personal commitment to Christ.
