Question About Exegesis of Isaiah 44:24

Please exegete this Scripture. Doesn't "alone" and "by myself" mean One Person? ...not Three Persons?

"Thus saith the LORD, thy redeemer, and he that formed thee from the womb, I am the LORD that maketh all things; that stretcheth forth the heavens alone; that spreadeth abroad the earth by myself;" Isaiah 44:24 KJV

Answer:

That's an excellent and sincere question—one that touches the heart of both biblical theology and how we understand the **oneness and plurality of God**. Let's carefully exegete **Isaiah 44:24 (KJV)** and then look at how "alone" and "by myself" harmonize with the full testimony of Scripture.

Isaiah 44:24 KJV

"Thus saith the LORD, thy redeemer, and he that formed thee from the womb, I am the LORD that maketh all things; that stretcheth forth the heavens **alone**; that spreadeth abroad the earth **by myself**."

Key Words in Hebrew:

- "LORD" (YHWH) the covenant name of God, uniquely tied to His identity as the one true God of Israel.
- "Alone" lĕbaddî meaning by oneself, in isolation, without assistance.
- "By myself" mē'ittî (from "'et" + preposition) meaning from within myself, without help from another.

What the Text Emphasizes:

1. God is the Sole Creator

The *emphasis* of this verse is on **God's exclusive role as Creator**. This is in **direct contrast** to the surrounding pagan nations who believed in multiple gods or demiurges working together to create the world.

Isaiah is confronting **polytheism**—the belief in many divine beings working in tandem. He's declaring:

"No one helped me. I created the heavens and the earth without assistance. There are no other gods beside Me."

See also:

- Isaiah 45:5 "I am the LORD, and there is none else, there is no God beside me."
- Isaiah 40:25-26 God names and numbers the stars, and none is missing.

The text **does not say** how God's essence or inner being is structured. It simply proclaims that **no other deity or being** assisted or shared in the act of creation.

Does This Contradict the New Testament Revelation of Christ?

Not at all. In fact, the New Testament affirms that Jesus, as the Word of God, was the very active Agent in creation—yet not separate from God.

John 1:1-3, 14 (KJV)

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God...
All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made...
And the Word was made flesh."

Jesus is with God and is God—this expresses unity of being yet distinction of person.

Colossians 1:15-16

"For by him [Christ] were all things created... all things were created by him, and for him."

Hebrews 1:2

"God... hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son... by whom also he made the worlds."

So how do we reconcile this with Isaiah 44:24?

Harmonizing Isaiah 44:24 with the Godhead

Isaiah affirms:

- No *other gods* participated in creation.
- God acted entirely out of His own will and being.

This does not deny the multi-personal nature of the one true God. Instead, it confirms:

- The unity of God's essence
- The exclusivity of Yahweh as the Creator
- The **nonexistence** of any outside power assisting Him

The **Trinity** teaches:

One **Being** of God (divine nature), eternally existing in three **Persons**—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

So:

- When God says "by Myself," it means without any help from outside Himself.
- The **Son** and **Spirit** are not "other gods" or beings, but fully and eternally part of **God's own divine being**.

Analogy:

When you speak a word, is your voice separate from you? No—it is an extension of your being. So when God created through His **Word** (John 1:3) and His **Spirit** (Genesis 1:2), He was creating **by Himself**, through the **fullness of who He is**.

Summary:

- Isaiah 44:24 strongly affirms the oneness of God and His exclusive power as Creator.
- The words "alone" and "by Myself" refer to the fact that God did not create with help from other deities or external agents.
- The **New Testament** clarifies that the **Word (Jesus)** and the **Spirit** were fully involved in creation, yet **not separate gods**, but part of the **one divine Being**.
- Therefore, Isaiah 44:24 does not contradict the Trinity—it supports monotheism, and the Trinity defines how the one God exists in perfect relational unity.
