Junior Student Q.1: Is being gay and homosexual okay with God?

- **Figures of Speech** (e.g., "If your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off" Matthew 5:30) Jesus was emphasizing the seriousness of sin, not instructing literal amputation.

- The Bible interprets itself many symbols in Revelation, for example, are explained in Daniel or other Old Testament books.

Junior Student Q.3:

Junior Student Q.7:

Why is Satan sometimes described as a lion and other times as a snake?

Junior Student Q.9: How can I have or build a routine with God?

Junior Student Q.10: Why did God tempt Humans to sin by putting fruit in the garden?
