What's the difference between hermeneutics and homiletics?

Answer:

Great question! These two terms—hermeneutics and homiletics—are both essential in understanding and communicating the Bible, but they serve **very different roles**:

Hermeneutics = Interpretation

Definition:

Hermeneutics is the science and method of **interpreting Scripture**. It answers the question:

"What does the Bible mean?"

Focus:

- Understanding context, culture, language, and genre
- Interpreting biblical texts accurately
- · Avoiding misinterpretation or distortion
- Applying principles like:
- Scripture interprets Scripture
- Literal vs. symbolic meaning
- Historical and grammatical analysis

Example:

When reading Revelation, hermeneutics helps you know that a "beast" may not be a literal animal but a symbol (Daniel 7:23 helps interpret that).

Homiletics = Preaching

Definition: Homiletics is the art and method of **preparing and delivering sermons**. It answers the question:

"How do I proclaim what the Bible says?"

Focus:

- Structuring a message
- Creating a clear introduction, body, and conclusion
- Applying Scripture to real life
- Using illustrations, transitions, and calls to action
- Connecting emotionally and spiritually with the audience

Example:

Once you interpret Revelation 13 correctly using hermeneutics, homiletics helps you preach it powerfully so the church understands its relevance today.
