Freshman Student Q.1: Does God punish those who aren't sure if He is real?

Does God Punish Those Who Aren't Sure If He Is Real?

No, God does not **punish** people simply for having doubts or being unsure of His existence. Instead, He **patiently invites people to seek Him** and provides evidence of His reality. The Bible shows that **God understands our struggles and meets us where we are**.

1. God Welcomes Honest Doubt and Questions
