Key Observations

- **Genesis 1:2** sets the stage for God to **speak light into the darkness**.
- **Revelation 20** portrays a world where **light has been removed**, and Satan is left in a **spiritual vacuum**.
- The term "*bottomless pit*" in Revelation 20 is the Greek word *abussos*, the same used in the Greek Old Testament for the **deep** in Genesis 1:2.
- **The Holy Spirit's presence** marks the beginning of creation. His **absence** marks the earth's desolation before final re-creation.

Conclusion

From Genesis to Revelation, the **withdrawal and return of divine light** symbolize the grand arc of salvation history. Just as light broke into the formless void at creation, **so it will again** after the 1,000 years, when God makes a **new heaven and a new earth** (Revelation 21:1–5).
